

Tech Meets Boise Saturday

Owl '11' Hopes For First Win

Top caliber football is again expected to unfold Saturday night at MODOC Field as the Oregon Tech Owls, hoping to perch upon the victory trail for the first time this year, tangle with the powerful Boise Junior College Broncos. Game time is 7:30.

The Toketee Lions Club of Klamath Falls is sponsoring this week's OTI grid encounter. Club members will be on the streets selling game tickets Saturday in hopes of drawing a large crowd to back the Mile High Campus. Besides the ticket sale the Lions will also present the halftime entertainment.

According to Walter Hoag, member of the Toketee group, a 15 minute exhibition of relay handball will be held for the MODOC Field fans. Two local dogs who are entered in the National Field Trial and another team retriever which is nationally known and has been selected to an All-American team will be sent through their paces. Jim Sullivan's Ty, a Golden, Hal Shidler's Hal's Spl-Wise-Zee, a black Labrador and Pat Montgomery's Sal, a Chesapeake will be the three dogs used in the exhibition.

The clash between the Broncos and the Owls will be the sixth meeting between the two teams, and so far, the Owls have been unable to claim a win over the Boise club. Last year's score favored the Idaho junior college by a 35-7 margin, but the Mile High Campus crew have been vowing all week to win their first of the year tomorrow evening, and stop the nation's number six JC for the first time since the rivalry started in 1950.

SOLID WALL
Coach Rex Hunsaker reported late this week his boys have recovered from the shock of being battered 60-7 last week by Compton, and have built a solid wall of spirit for the Boise encounter in hopes of surprising the Broncos.

The Tech head coach wasn't sure of a starting unit for this week's clash, but reported either Don Stonich or Dave Thompson would probably open at the quarterback position with Frank Dunn at full when the opening kickoff is booted. Working at the two half-back spots will probably be letterman Cal "Sugar Jet" Smith and freshman Mike Campbell. Although Smith and Campbell seem to have their positions "made," letterman Willie Stinson and freshman Harry Jaul are threatening to make the competition hot and heavy for a starting berth. Bob Fingers, who played a great deal of the Compton game, will undoubtedly see action against Boise Saturday evening by spelling Dunn at fullback.

In the Oregon Tech line, Hunsaker and Dr. George Miller, line boss, have selected freshman Al Van Leuven and letterman Charles Eccleston at the end positions and freshman Leon Eilers and transfer Paul Toagle at the tackle posts of the probable starting line-up. Remaining front line choices will probably be guards Stan Smith and Olen Ragan, two pint-sized but tough letterman footballers, and center Bert Dilly, a freshman.

THREE STRAIGHT
For the Boise Braves who have rolled over three straight foes so far this year, including a 15-6 triumph over a strong San Jose team last Saturday, five letterman and six freshmen are expected to draw starting positions against the Owls. In the backfield will be quarterback Leroy Garland, halfbacks Jim Warner and Rich Hancock and fullback George Kom. Kom is the only letterman in the Broncos backfield. Warner and Kom are the chief threats to an Owl defeat on the ground, while Garland's passing gives the Boise club a solid passing attack. The Broncos run from both the T and a single wing formations.

This will be the last home game for the Owls until October 29 when they meet Southern Oregon College in a conference outing. Next week the Tech Eleven journeys to Portland for a clash with the Portland State College Vikings, this too is an OGC game.

Stanford, UCLA In Top Game

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—This week's key to the Rose Bowl in the Pacific Coast Conference face features UCLA versus Stanford—but if the experts are right, it should be no contest. The Bruins should win in a breeze.

However, the ever-optimistic coach Chuck Taylor of the Indians hasn't given up.

"We've got a chance," he smiles. "We could do like Maryland did. Stomp on them."

Just how he is going to "stomp" on the Uclans with his boys, Taylor is in no mood to describe. But he does have one good chance.

The Indian line may be as good as any on the West Coast. It does a mighty fine job of stopping the opposition's running game. So, if Romie Knox, the highly-punditized and controversial UCLA fullback decides to sit this one out, the Bruin passing game will deteriorate about 70 per cent.

That would mean that Sam (First Down) Brown would be in that slot and so far Sam has collected a total of only 46 yards via the aerial route, compared with 235 for Knox.

While this game will have an important bearing on the conference title, two important intersectionals share the spotlight.

Tonight, the University of Southern California Trojans come off their 7-0 lacing by Washington to tangle with unbeaten Wisconsin in the Los Angeles Coliseum; and Saturday Washington puts its perfect record on the line against a good Baylor team from the Southwest Conference. While neither of these games has any bearing on who will go to the Rose Bowl, both promise good football with some effect on the national ratings.

In other conference games with little bearing on the outcome of the PCC race, California meets Oregon at Portland and Idaho entertains Washington State at Moscow.

Oregon State goes outside the loop to play College of Pacific and San Jose, the other top independent, goes to the Southwest to take on New Mexico.

Campbell Tests Bluebird After Slight Accident

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Don Campbell planned a test run Friday in his jet-propelled hydroplane after a slight accident Thursday which he said did not damage the speedboat.

A foot-square section of the plastic cockpit cover blew off and lodged in the engine air intake duct while Campbell was taxiing away from a dock on Lake Mead.

He shut off the engines immediately, preventing damage to the air compressor engine blades.

"I'm glad it happened now instead of Sunday at 200 miles an hour," said the 34-year-old British pilot.

Drake Favored To Whip Slugger

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (UP)—Middleweight Ray Drake of Far Rockaway, N.Y., a slick boxer, is favored at 8-5 to best slugger Tony Baldoni of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., tonight in their TV-radio fight at War Memorial Auditorium.

Drake, 25, and Baldoni, 23, are trying to crash into the top ten ratings among 160-pound contenders, and an impressive victory by either might turn the trick.

It will be the first television fight for swarthy, black-haired Baldoni son of a Pennsylvania coal mine. His aggressive, slam-bang style could make him an attraction.

Handsome, curly-haired Drake has been on several limited telecasts and on one national show in his last fight, Aug. 24, when he outpointed Danny Giovannelli at Madison Square Garden.

He is favored because of his skill and because he is expected to be "sharper" than Tony as a result of greater ring activity this year.

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
