Heart Attack Takes Minister

Arthur Charles Bates, minister to the First Christian Church in Klamath Falls from January 1933 to 1944, died Wednesday, October 12, in Salem where he has made his home since retirement in 1954. He suffered a heart attack while teaching a Bible School class in the First Christian Church, Salem on October 9. A second attack three days later took his life. Mr. Bates was born in Eugene, Oregon, in 1880. His mother was an early day settler in Eugene. He taught school in Paisley for three years and later in Alvadore, Oregon.

He married Flora Byers in 1905 and at that time began his ministry in the church. Mrs. Bates died in 1923.

He graduated from the Eugene Bible University in 1927 and while in Bible College, preached at Yreka, Oregon. From there he went to Franklin and later to Mill City, Oregon. He ministered in the Klamath Falls church until 1944 when he was called to be Centennial Evangelist for the state of Oregon. He worked for the Oregon Christian Missionary Convention as evangelist for three years and then accepted the call to the church at Silverton where he served until his retirement. He continued to be in demand as supply pastor and Bible School teacher until his death.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Dean Stephens, Klamath Falls, and a son, Arthur Harold Bates in Tokyo, Japan.

Services will be held in Salem with funeral rites and interment in Bell Creek Cemetery.

Indiana Cites Strike Costs

NEW CASTLE, Ind. (AP)—The CIO United Auto Workers and the Indiana Budget Committee dug deeper today to pay the costs of a 12-week-old strike at the Perfect Circle Corp. plants in eastern Indiana.

Maintaining nearly 1,000 National Guardsmen on duty, as the result of a riot last week at the firm's foundry here, is costing the state between \$10,000 and \$11,000 a day. The figure came from Horace Coats, executive secretary to Gov. George S. Crane.

The state budget committee yesterday authorized use of the state's general contingent fund of \$75,000 for Guard expenses. One week of Guard duty had exhausted the state civil aid military contingent fund, which is set up on a basis of \$75,000 a year.

The UAW wasn't saying how much strike benefits it was paying or how many strikers were drawing them, but it has a 23-million-dollar special strike fund, Perfect Circle's normal production force here and at Hagerstown and Richmond totals 1,200, but some are not UAW members.

The union has another weapon in the bitter strike—influence. The Taft-Hartley Act ban on secondary boycotts prohibits the UAW from striking against another company in an effort to prevent it from using Perfect Circle products, but the UAW considers itself within the law in asking the big auto companies not to use them.

"There is blood on those products," said a UAW spokesman at Detroit, referring to the outbreak of violence here last week in which both strikers and non-strikers were wounded.

Chrysler Corp. confirmed that its Plymouth plant began using piston rings from another source after its employees balked at handling Perfect Circle products, General Motors and Ford reportedly still are accepting shipments from Perfect Circle.

Melvin and Dick Miller Jr. of the Dick E. Miller, Oldsmobile, Cadillac dealers in Klamath Falls, attended the showing of the 1956 Oldsmobiles and Cadillacs earlier this month. The Oldsmobiles were displayed in San Francisco and the Cadillacs in Portland.

Cadillac dealers will display their new line locally and nationally on October 24. Oldsmobile will be shown over the nation on November 3, the Miller firm announced.

Oldsmobile and Cadillac are introducing their new Hydramatic drives this year. The transmission is improved but retains all the advantages of the highly successful Hydramatic used by Oldsmobile and Cadillac for so many years. It is the oldest of the automatic drives. The gear train has been strengthened to handle the increased torque of the 1956 engine.

New colors and interiors highlight both the Oldsmobile and the Cadillac. Cadillac will introduce three new body styles: the series 62 sedan style, the Eldorado Seville coupe and the Eldorado Brougham.

Dick Miller Jr. reported that both Oldsmobile and Cadillac have projected increased production schedules for 1956. Both companies plan their biggest production year in history, Miller said.
