Solons Urge Impeachment Of Two Federal Judges

WASHINGTON (UP) — Two Senate senators pressed today to ward possible impeachment of federal judges who authorized jury eavesdropping.

Chairman James O. Eastland (D-Miss) and Sen. William E. Jenner (R-Ind) hinted at impeachment proceedings when they said they would urge the Senate internal security subcommittee to send the transcript of its two-day hearings on jury-tapping to the House Judiciary Committee.

Under the Constitution, the House institutes impeachment proceedings against judges. If the House votes for impeachment, the case is tried by the Senate, sitting as a court.

Forest Pest Project Held

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — To help reduce forest insect losses that cost the Northwest more than forest fires each year, a new research project on testing of insecticides for control of the various damaging pests has been started at Oregon State College.

Scores of insecticides will be tested under laboratory conditions and the most promising pest killers will then be field tested to find which are best.

The project will give foresters a reference in time of need for determining what chemicals are effective against a particular pest. It would, it is hoped, make it possible to prevent or control many insect outbreaks before they could reach epidemic proportions.

Such information has not been available in the past and the results have been costly. In the case of the present spruce budworm outbreak, for example, a control program had to be delayed until some testing could be done.

And in 1945 and 1947 when severe outbreaks of hemlock looper and Douglas fir tussock moth occurred, emergency applications had to be made with insecticides which had not had thorough testing beforehand.

The project is being sponsored by the Northwest forest pest action committee, the Oregon state board of forestry, Oregon State College forest experiment station and the OSC department of entomology. Dr. Julius Rudinsky, who joined the college staff this summer, is project leader. Earlier, he had done forest entomology work for Weyerhaeuser Timber Company and is acquainted with forest pest problems of the Northwest.

RCAF Rescues Marooned Men

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — Three men who were marooned on a North Pacific island after the sinking of their fishing boat were rescued by the Royal Canadian Air Force Thursday.

An RCAF plane spotted the men on an island in the Anderson group, 300 miles north of here. They were taken off by a tug which moved them to calm water where they boarded the rescue plane, and were flown to Ocean Falls, B.C.

The men were reported in good condition. They are Capt. Riddy Clouston, Dick Clouston and Scott Armstrong, of Cordova, Alaska.

The three left Seattle last week in the fishboat Joseph Balestreri II, owned by the Buena Fishing Co. of Eureka, Calif., en route to Cordova.

Tuesday they radioed the vessel had struck a log and was sinking in Milbanke Sound. That was the last word of the men until they were sighted by the RCAF search plane Thursday.

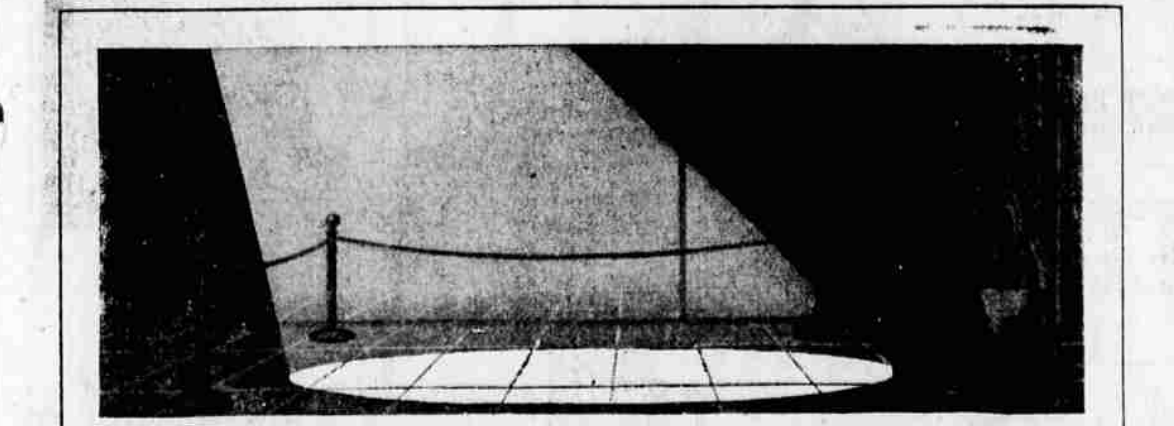
Women To Hear Water Discussion
