Many Bonanza and Langell Valley friends who were unable to attend sent gifts and good wishes to the couple.

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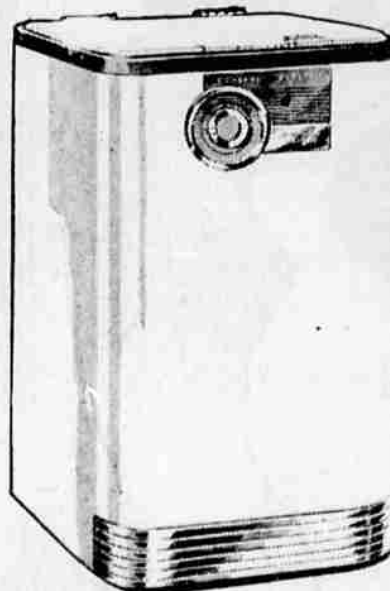
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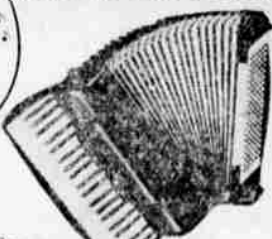
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
