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Ideas IN PAINT and WALLPAPER

COORDINATE WALL COLORS & DRAPERIES

A well-coordinated color scheme doesn't just happen. It has to be planned... planned around the room's purpose, the tastes and color preferences of the occupants, and, at the same time, make the room attractive and satisfying.

As walls are usually the largest area of color in a room, the color, or colors, chosen for them is of dominant importance. Wall colors should always be coordinated with other colors in the room—the draperies, floor covering, upholstery fabric... even the accessories.

To make a small room appear larger, use light-colored draperies and wall colors. This does an unobtrusive effect that hardly has no effect as a visual space shifter.
