CIO Electrical Union Men Strike Westinghouse Firm

PITTSBURGH (AP)—CIO electrical workers struck the Westinghouse Electric Corp. today for the second time in little more than a month.

Leaders of the CIO International Union of Electrical Workers issued the nationwide strike order at midnight last night after the deadline rolled around with no contract settlement.

Negotiations continued until 1:45 a.m. There was no indication whether they would resume.

The strike call went out to some 44,000 members in 29 plants. Some 30-odd other Westinghouse operations were not affected.

Disputed issues include wages, rules for time studies of nonincentive workers and length of contract.

Both sides turned down 11th-hour proposals which would have averted the strike for a while at least. Westinghouse proposed a two-week extension of the strike deadline with any wage increase worked out to be retroactive to Oct. 15. It also offered, for the first time in its history, to include a clause in the contract providing for arbitration of disputes.

The union plan called for a one-week postponement of the strike if the company would guarantee at least a 12-cent hourly pay increase plus inclusion in the contract of what it considered satisfactory conditions under which the company could make time studies.

Also, the union suggested a three-year contract instead of the five-year pact advanced by the company previously.

The CIO-IUE was free to strike

under a wage reopening clause in the current two-year contract, expiring next year.

The issue of time studies became a subject of negotiations as the basis for settlement of the union's strike Sept. 12-14 in support of East Pittsburgh plant employees.

Westinghouse contended the matter of job studies was a management right and said they were instituted as a means of helping to improve its competitive position in the electrical industry.

Union officials claimed the company sought to eliminate jobs and change working conditions.

On Sept. 30 the company offered a five-year contract which it said provided a minimum pay increase of 2 1/2 cents an hour during that period. The union demanded a straight 15-cent raise this year within the framework of the existing contract.

CIO-IUE workers employed by Westinghouse now average \$2.10 an hour.

GOP Presidential Nominees Figure In Political News

Prospects for the Republican presidential nomination figured prominently in political talk yesterday.

And "advice" to both parties came from Chairman Joseph L. Rauh Jr. of Americans for Democratic Action, a political action group espousing New Deal and "Fair Deal" principles. Rauh told a New Jersey state ADA convention.

Republicans should "drop" Vice President Nixon as a 1956 presidential

possibility because, Rauh said, the independent voter will "never swallow him." And:

Democrats should remember they are the "party of liberalism and that compromise and timidity have never won elections for them in the past, any more than they will in 1956."

Nixon's name cropped up in New York with the arrival of California's Gov. Goodwin J. Knight for a series of speeches at GOP meetings. Knight had been criticized by Nixon supporters in California for his announced plan to lead the state's big delegation to the Republican National Convention next year as a nominal candidate for president, even if that pitted him against a Nixon-pledged state.

Knight said "I'm not a candidate for president" even if President Eisenhower doesn't seek re-election, and "Nixon is all right with me if he's nominated. It depends on what the President's wishes are."

New York's Republican Atty. Gen. Jacob K. Javits said on a TV program it would be "logical" to assume his state's GOP delegation to the convention would offer former Gov. Thomas E. Dewey as a "favorite son" candidate for president.

Harold E. Stassen, the President's special assistant on disarmament, said on a separate TV program that "I do not consider myself a candidate" even if Eisenhower doesn't run.

Sen. Butler (R-Md.) said it will be harder for the GOP to win if Eisenhower doesn't seek re-election. "But I think it can be done," Gov. Lawrence Wetherby of Kentucky, at Point Clear, Ala., for a

conference of Southern governors that opens tomorrow, said today the odds favor the South voting solidly Democratic in 1956. And, he told newsmen, he sees Adlai Stevenson as the winner in presidential balloting if Eisenhower doesn't run.

Carmine G. DeSapio, New York's Democratic national committeeman who is pushing Gov. Averell Harriman of New York for president, said after a West Coast trip that he found a "surprisingly" large amount of pro-Harriman feeling in California. Sen. Ellender (D-La.) said he hopes Harriman, once a foreign aid administrator

under President Truman, does not win the Democratic nomination because he is "the type to give away all we've got."

Solid South Vote Predicted

POINT CLEAR, Ala. (AP)—Kentucky's Gov. Lawrence Wetherby said today the odds are heavily in favor of the South voting solidly Democratic in 1956. And he picked Adlai Stevenson to win the presidency if President Eisenhower doesn't run again.

Wetherby was interviewed as the chief executives from 10 states gathered here for the Southern Governors' Conference, opening officially tomorrow.

Asked about the possibility of a Southern Democratic revolt, such as those who split the party in 1948 and 1952, Wetherby said:

"All the sentiment I get in my talks with Southern leaders is that the South will be solidly Democratic without Eisenhower in the race. I don't find any sentiment strong enough to bring about a defection such as that in 1952 which cost the Democrats four Southern States (Texas, Tennessee, Florida and Virginia)."

Wetherby said Stevenson was the strongest potential Democratic candidate in Kentucky. Gov. Averell Harriman of New York is second choice, well ahead of Tennessee's Sen. Estes Kefauver, he said.

The three-day conference will discuss problems of highway construction, finances, water conservation and development, and industrial development. But whether the question of segregation will be injected into the meeting remains to be seen.

Alabama's Gov. James E. Folsom was host to the conference. Other governors to attend are from Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia.

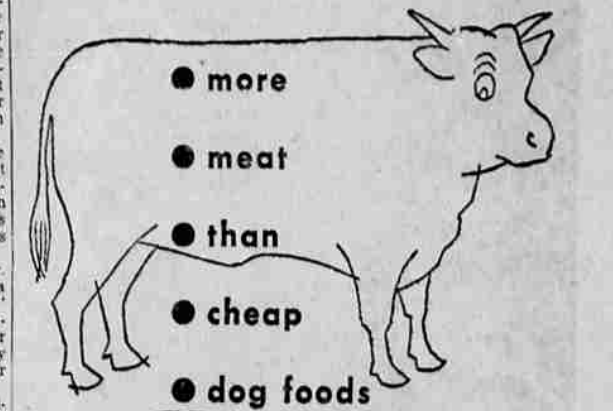

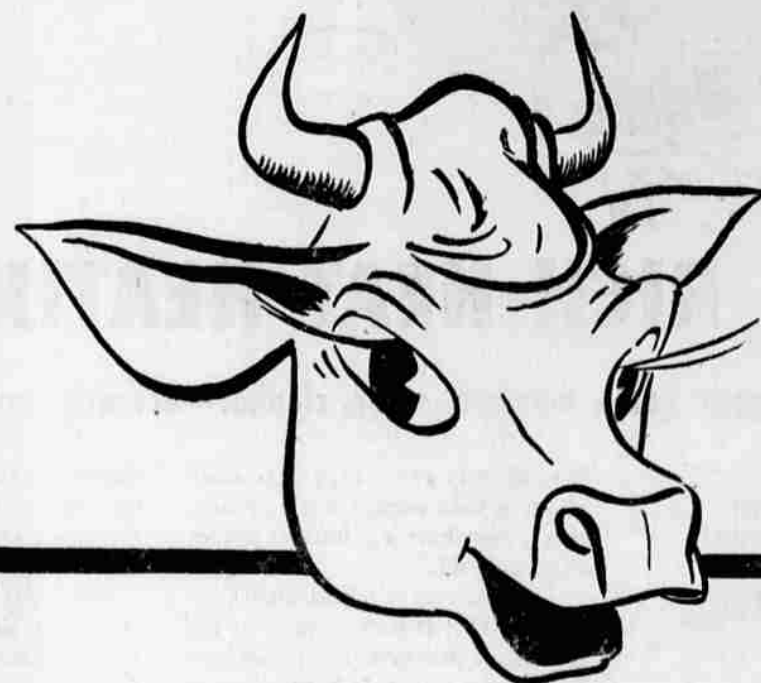
