Oregon Girl Killed In Crash

BARSTOW, Calif. (AP) — Nineteen-year-old Lillie Oleana Ebarb, Mt. Vernon, Ore., was killed Saturday night when struck by a car a mile and a half east of here on U.S. Highway 66. Dept. Coroner P. H. Evans reported Sunday. He said Miss Ebarb was driving from the Oregon town to Albany, Texas, with Everett W. Redd, 31, of that Texas community, and James L. Roach, 17, Mt. Vernon, when their car broke down here. Unable to get it repaired, Evans said, they had started hitchhiking and Miss Ebarb was struck by an automobile driven by Jesus M. Griego of Barstow. The latter said he was temporarily blinded by the lights of an oncoming vehicle. He was not held. Miss Ebarb was killed outright. Redd and Roach were unhurt.
