Three Teams Try For Top US College Spot

Out of the rubble of fallen giants of college football today there emerged three shining lights—three teams that will fight it out for the mythical national title.

Michigan, Maryland and Oklahoma, all undefeated and all powerful, could go all the way. Yet, even these three are not invulnerable.

The Wolverines still have a solid five-game Big Ten schedule to face starting with Minnesota this week. After that, they have Iowa, Illinois, Indiana and Ohio State, any one of which could rise up and whip them.

Maryland heads northward this week for a game with tired-up Syracuse, which bounced Army 13-0 Saturday. If the Terps get by Syracuse, they'll have a clear path.

Oklahoma, with a streak of 22 wins against another undefeated outfit this week—Colorado. The possibility of another Big Seven team beating Oklahoma seems remote.

But then look what happened in Notre Dame, Georgia Tech, Texas Christian, Washington, Rice and Princeton. All were favored at from one to three touchdowns and all had been undefeated. But when the blacked Saturday of the football season was over, all had tumbled.

Notre Dame hadn't even had its goaline crossed until they came upon Michigan State. The Spartans cracked Notre Dame's 11-game winning streak and did it emphatically 21-7. Gerry Blumka, the goat of last year's game when he missed two extra points in the Irish's two-point triumph, was the big man for the Spartans this time. He scored one touchdown, set up another and kicked three extra points.

Huskies 'Tricked' By Baylor

SEATTLE (AP) — The Washington Huskies can say "we were tricked" and mean it not as an alibi but a compliment to the Baylor Bears who knocked them out of football's unbeaten ranks Saturday 13 to 7.

Such a ball-handling wizardry hasn't been seen in Washington Stadium since the days of Don Heinrich. The Huskies, well stocked with capable linemen and string defensive backs, lacked just one thing—a detective.

It was junior quarterback Bonny Jones who pulled off the now-you-see-it, now-you-don't for Baylor's two touchdown rally. Washington had powered 80 yards in the opening quarter, only to lose the ball on a fumble a handspan from the goal.

And the Huskies rolled 43 yards to tally in the second period—a smashing, muscle-busting drive that wound up with quarterback Steve Roake plunging the final yard.

"I thought they were going to run us out of the stadium," said Baylor Coach George Sauer. The opinion was shared by 42,000 fans who watched the sunlit tussle.

But then Jones doped the ball in invisible paint and the Bears began to roll. They were out-weighted 10 pounds per man and nobody thought they could go on the ground against a Washington team which had bottled and corralled the Southern California might just a week earlier.

Mostly Jones used halfback Weldon Holley, who clipped off eight-yard runs while the Huskies were tackling somebody else. The Jones boy mixed three passes into his tossed-sailed attack and the drive carried 87 yards. There were only 31 seconds left on the clock when Jones dived the last yard and the halftime score was 7 to 7.

Baylor took the second half kickoff to a touchdown in 15 plays, chewing out 68 yards with another great show of deception. When Jones tossed the final 6 to end Henry Greminger, it was the first Washington this year.

The Huskies never got into Baylor territory in the second half and managed once to stop a Baylor drive on the Washington 10. And Washington, which meets Stanford here this week, hopes it never again sees the likes of Jones, Holley, Del Scholmer, and sophomore halfback Bobby Peters.

Missing from the Washington lineup was quarterback Snaury Lederman, who quit the squad Friday night as a protest over his No. 2 role. Coach Johnny Cherberg announced Lederman was off the squad for "uncooperativeness," but indicated he would take the Santa Monica, Calif., senior back. Lederman said he would seek reinstatement.

Colleges List Winners, Ties

Bird Hunters In For Fair-Very Good Year

Editor's Note: This is the first of two articles on Oregon's upland game birds, their propagation and habitat.

PORTLAND (AP) — Fair to very good hunting for the upland game bird season opening Oct. 22 is forecast by John McKean, chief of the game division of the State Game Commission.

Despite a poor nesting season, surprisingly good Chinese pheasant population in the Willamette Valley this year has brought an extension of the season in Western Oregon to coincide with that of Eastern Oregon. Normally the Western Oregon season is shorter.

Weather conditions during the nesting seasons from April through August play a big part in determining the bird populations. McKean said, and this year's has not been particularly favorable.

The long cold spring and rainy June made hatching of broods late, and pheasant hunting isn't expected to be up to the usual standard in Eastern Oregon. Willamette Valley shooting should be good.

Quail shooting should be very good in Central Oregon and fair in the rest of the state, McKean forecast.

Stanford, Huskies Tiff Eyed

Stanford's comeback kids got their third crack in three weeks at a once-beaten team—this time Washington—in what stacks up as the highlight game of the Pacific Coast Conference football week-end.

The Indians, who threw a mammoth scare into UCLA's Bruins before losing, 21-13, last Saturday, travel to Seattle to face the Huskies, upset by Baylor, 13-7, in an inter-sectional duel for their first 1955 grid los. Both UCLA and Michigan State had single defeats in advance of their games with Stanford.

Two other conference contests match Southern California and California and Berkeley and Washington State and Oregon State at Corvallis. The Trojans rose up to trounce the Big Ten's Wisconsin Badgers, 33-21 Friday night. WSC checked up a 9-0 win over Idaho while OSC was losing, 13-7, to College of the Pacific.

A brace of inter-sectionals also are on the grid menu. UCLA entertains Iowa, tied in the closing minutes by Purdue, 20-20, on Friday night at Los Angeles, while Oregon, 21-0 winner over California, travels to Tucson to face Arizona in a Saturday night tussle.

In a backyard battle at San Jose, the unbeaten Spartans play host to COP. San Jose racked up No. 4 over New Mexico, 14-0, Saturday night.

Washington, finishing non-conference action with the Baylor loss, opens its five-straight PCC windup needing a victory to retain a share of the league lead with UCLA. Stanford, on the strength of its last-half showing against the Bruins, could provide a stiff test.

Jess Hill's Trojans, with only three conference games remaining, are in a comfortable position, at least this week. USC, beaten by Washington, must win to remain in contention but are unlikely to get much of a workout from the green Berkeley Bears.

The Corvallis contest might be tight, but regardless of whether the Cougars or Braves win it will make no difference when the time comes to choose a Rose Bowl representative.

The three night contests all could be corkers.

UCLA rates the edge on a disappointing Iowa in a game which looked six weeks ago like a possible Rose Bowl preview but today has no such luster; Oregon likely will go against Arizona as an underdog, while the hotshot Spartans will have their hands full against the rough-tough COP Tigers at San Jose.

Idaho, still without a victory this year, has an open date.

Bryan Wins Big Car Race

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Jimmy Bryan, of Phoenix, Ariz., made the most of opponents' motor trouble and a crupup yesterday to win the National Championship AAA big car race for the third year in a row.

Bryan went from fourth to first in the last 18 laps of the 100-mile race at the state fairgrounds one-mile dirt track. His time was one hour, 9:36 and his average speed was 82.6 miles per hour.

Johnny Thomson, of East Springfield, Mass., took second and Bob Sweikert, Speedway City, Ind., last year's Indianapolis 500-mile winner, was third.

Sweikert paced the field of 18 starters for 23 laps. His fuel injector failed on the 98th lap and he staggered across the finish line to nose out Andy Linden, Manhattan Beach, Calif.

George Amic, Los Angeles, duelled with Sweikert for the lead from the start until the 88th lap, then crashed his car through the outside rail to avoid a spin-out by Edgar Elder, Fresno, Calif., who plowed through the inside rail. Neither driver was hurt.

Campbell Fails In Speed Try

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Don Campbell of England and his water-soaked jet propelled hydroplane, the Bluebird, hope for another day of speed but not like Sunday.

What happened?

The Bluebird failed to break its own world record.

And then it sank in Lake Mead while being towed back to shore an hour after the attempt.

Swells brought on by Sunday pleasure craft drivers in scores of boats probably were the reason for the twin misfortunes. Campbell and his crew of many helpers, working far into the night, pulled the 4,000-pound craft out of the water from a depth estimated at 50 feet or more and hauled it back ashore.

The engaging young Britisher, who set the international record in England last July with a speed of 302.32 miles an hour, said it would take about four weeks to get the Bluebird ready for any more speed trials.

Events Sunday, before a national television audience, climaxed a run of bad luck for the 34-year-old son of the late speed king, Sir Malcolm Campbell.

The first run of the Bluebird over the measured mile course in front of desolate Burro Island was timed in 147.179 mph.

The second blast-away was timed at 162.822, and the official average for the attempt for a new record was a flat 155 miles an hour.

After the second run was over the Bluebird flamed out, which means in simple language that the turbine engine died. Campbell and the Bluebird floated around while patrol boats tried to keep other craft from getting near.

Then they started to tow the Bluebird in. Apparently the choppy waters, even heavier by this time, sloshed into the jet pipe at the rear and overbalanced the boat. It went down by the stern.

Packers, Rams, Colts Deadlocked For Title

It's been eight years since the Green Bay Packers have had a winning season in the National Football League, but now they're in a three-way deadlock for the Western Conference lead thanks to Fred Cone, who seldom has been spotlighted since coming from the Clemson campus five years ago.

Cone, a 29-year-old Alabamian listed as a fullback on the Packers' roster but specialized as a placement boomer, kicked a 29-yard field goal in the final 24 seconds yesterday, snatching victory from the previously unbeaten Los Angeles Rams 30-23.

The victory sent the Packers into a tie with the Rams and the Baltimore Colts, themselves upset by the Chicago Bears 33-10. The last time the Packers were eating that high off the hog was in 1947 when they finished with a 6-5-1 mark.

In the other Western Conference game, San Francisco's 49ers piled up 21 points in the last quarter to defeat winless Detroit, erstwhile conference champion, 27-24.

Cleveland's Browns gained a share of the Eastern Conference lead with Pittsburgh by whipping the Washington Redskins 24-14 while the New York Giants finally turned the trick with a 16-0 victory over the Chicago Cardinals. It was the Giants' first 1955 success.

Pittsburgh snared Philadelphia 13-7 Saturday night to match Cleveland's 3-1 first-place record.

Cone was practically the whole show at Milwaukee as the Packers gained their 31 record. After booting only nine field goals all last season, he sent three through the uprights against the Rams—for 34, 45 and 26 yards.
