

Michigan Holds Poll Leads

Oklahoma Pushing Maryland AP Ballot

When four football teams which had been listed in the nation's top 10 got licked on one weekend and several of the others win without looking particularly good, there is some understandable confusion among the men who pick them.

The sports writers and broadcasters who rate the teams weekly in the Associated Press poll responded to this situation today by putting Michigan, Maryland and Oklahoma in the top three positions for the third straight week—with Oklahoma creeping up on a Maryland team that once was rated first.

The four losers, Notre Dame, Georgia Tech, Wisconsin and Texas Christian, dropped out of the first 10 ratings with the impressive winners of the topsy-turvy weekend moving up to take their places.

Michigan, in spite of a rather rocky game against Northwestern, remained almost stationary in first place with first-place votes of 76 of the 183 participants in this week's poll. Michigan's point total was 1,603. Last week it was 80 firsts and 1,662 points.

Points are scored on the basis of 10 for each first-place vote, 9 for second, etc.

Maryland's support for the No. 1 position weakened as Jim Tatum's Terrapins had to stage a strong finish to beat North Carolina 20-7. But there were enough ballots for Oklahoma to keep the Terps in the runner-up spot with 1,487 points to Oklahoma's 1,434. Maryland got only 33 firsts as compared to 45 a week ago while the Sooners drew 29.

Navy, which flailed to an exciting aerial victory over Penn State, losing its unscathed status but winning its fourth straight game, moved up from eighth place to fourth and Duke, a 20-14 winner over Ohio State, vaulted from 11th to fifth.

Then came Notre Dame's conqueror, Michigan State, followed by UCLA, West Virginia, Auburn and Southern California.

Syracuse Tops Army, But Terps Come Next

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (UP)—Garry Ben Schwartzwalder, admittedly pleased with the performance of his Syracuse University football team in upsetting Army, 13-0, mapped new strategy today for the invasion of mighty Maryland, the nation's No. 2 team.

Still following his original plan of concentrating on one game at a time in Syracuse's toughest schedule of all time, Schwartzwalder strove to perfect an offense which could piece Maryland's stout defense when the two teams meet at Archbold Stadium next Saturday.

"We had everything our way in the mid of Michie Stadium last Saturday," said the sandy-haired, chunky coach with the crew cut. "We won't be as lucky against Maryland. The Terps are big and fast. Their line is massive and we will be at a distinct disadvantage in manpower. My kids are improving but this is no time to stick out our chests and predict a win."

This did Schwartzwalder deflate the wave of optimism which swept the campus after its tremendous win over the Cadets. Syracuse's second victory in a row since its opening loss to Pittsburgh.

"It will give us just the lift we need against Maryland," Schwartzwalder continued. "We know we are way out of our class against Maryland but my boys will be mentally and physically sound for the game."

Syracuse suffered no serious injuries in the Army tussle and quarterback Eddie Albright, who played most of the game against the Cadets, should be completely recovered from his cracked hand by next Saturday.

"We've come up with some pretty good sophomore reserve strength in the line," Schwartzwalder said. "In fact, we are a very much improved club from the one which lost to Pittsburgh. In that game, we didn't rotate the linemen fast enough and they tired. Against Boston University and Army we tried to keep a fresh team in there and the results were much better."

"I understand Maryland rotates every six minutes. Well, we're going to try to stay with them."

In other Eastern games, Columbia at Army, Princeton at Cornell, Harvard at Dartmouth, Navy at Penn, Boston University at Holy Cross, Colgate at Yale, Lehigh at Rutgers, Rhode Island at Brown, Bucknell at Lafayette. In intercollegiate games, Pitt is at Duke and Penn State at West Virginia, while Villanova entertains North Carolina State.

Hamline Rook Leads Nation With Passing

ST. PAUL, Minn. (UP)—A gambling 18-year-old freshman from Hamline University is making the passing carnival of the pro football leagues look like a routine penny arcade.

The records compiled by shy Jerry Foley, king of the nation's small college aerialists, are enough to frighten the bookkeepers.

In his last three games Foley has completed 74 out of 146 throws.

In his last two he has averaged 58 passes a game, has a five-game total of 87 for 1,677 and a cool 32 per cent completion average.

He leads the nation in practically every passing statistic worth mentioning and has made his favorite receiver, 6-5 Dick Donlin, No. 1 among the pass catchers.

That is, Foley started throwing on virtually every play. He started out by pitching 13 of 36 and 292 yards against Gustavus Adolphus, hit an improbable 33 of 62 for 362 yards against St. John's of Minnesota, and thumped down to 28 out of 56 for 313 yards against Minnesota's Duluth branch.

To date, the 64 quarterbacks has run up 1,040 yards through the air and tossed six touchdown passes. The 33 completions against St. John's tied the small-college record and Donlin's 18 catches in the same game broke everything in sight.

Middies Jump To 4th Spot UP Ballot

NEW YORK (UP)—Michigan, Maryland and Oklahoma, which weathered the wave of weekend upsets, cling to the top three United Press college football ratings today, but a shakeup of the remaining places in the top 10 vaulted Navy into the No. 4 spot.

Michigan State, Auburn and Southern California all advanced to the select group as the ratings underwent their biggest scrambling of the season thus far. Notre Dame, one of the four major powers upset, dropped six places to 10th.

The 35 leading coaches who comprise the United Press rating board divided all their first-place votes among the four top teams. Michigan received the most, 37, last week; Maryland had eight, Oklahoma six and Navy three.

POINT DISTRIBUTION

However, the point distribution for the three top teams was comparatively close, Michigan attracting 315 points, Maryland 289 and the Sooners 286.

Southern California, which defeated Wisconsin 33-21 Friday night, jumped 10 notches to ninth place, regaining a place in the select group after dropping out for one week. Auburn, which bounced Georgia Tech, vaulted nine places to the No. 8 ranking, while Michigan State, conqueror of Notre Dame, moved up five places to No. 6.

Navy advanced from ninth to fifth place; UCLA moved up two places to fifth, and Duke three rankings to seventh.

Here is how the teams lined up behind the first three: Navy, 218 points; UCLA, 170; Michigan State 160; Duke, 129; Auburn, 71; Southern California, 68; and Notre Dame 59.

TOUGH GOING

Each of this week's "Big Three" may be in for some tough going next Saturday. Coach Bennie Osterber's top-ranked Wolverines face Minnesota, a traditional Big Ten rival; Maryland plays Syracuse, a winner over Army last week; while Oklahoma meets 13th-ranked Colorado, regarded its biggest threat for Big Seven supremacy.

In other games that may produce changes in the ratings, Notre Dame plays 16th-ranked Purdue and UCLA enters 17th-ranked Iowa.

West Virginia moved up to head the second 10 group, followed in order by Georgia Tech, Texas A&M, Texas Christian, Wisconsin and Purdue. Iowa and Colorado were tied for 17th. Baylor was 19th, and Southern Methodist and Washington tied for 20th.

For the second straight week, only 22 teams received points. The last team ranked was Yale, the Ivy League leader, which had a single point.

American League batters found Kansas City's Municipal Stadium the easiest mark last season, connecting for 180 circuit blows in the majors' newest park. The Athletics hit 70 at home with the opposition, collecting 110 Fenway Park, Boston, was next with 163.

Washington's Griffith Stadium was the toughest field in which to hit homers. Only 45 were hit in the capital city, 20 by the Senators.

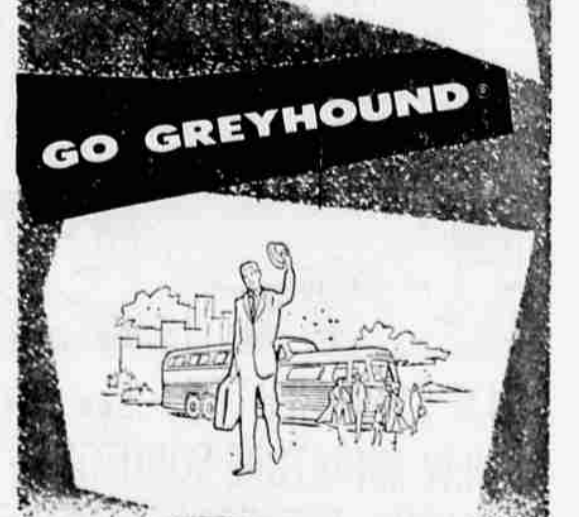
