## Dunsmuir Citizens Pay Old Taxes

**DUNSMUIR** — A sheaf of old, improperly recorded tax bills is bringing in revenue, according to Errol Beaughan, Dunsmuir city clerk. He estimated about 10 property owners have come into the city hall and paid taxes after being notified unpaid tax bills existed.

Beaughan sent out about 25 bills with accompanying explanatory letters two weeks ago after the city's auditor advised this be done to clear the city's record. Beaughan explained that he had found the tax bills, dating from 1941 to 1946, shortly after he took office and had never been able to determine whether or not they were outstanding.

As unpaid taxes remain a lien on property forever, property owners are paying these taxes. Beaughan said on Monday and over \$100 has reached the city coffers.
