

# Stassen Predicts Russian Okay Of Inspection Plan

POINT CLEAR, Ala. (AP)—Harold E. Stassen predicted broadly last night that Russian leaders may accept President Eisenhower's arms inspection plan because Red scientists are telling them the truth about the terrible destruction that would go with an atomic war.

The President's special assistant on disarmament told reporters he thinks the odds are in favor of an eventual agreement with the Russians. And he added "there could be some developments" in this field at the foreign ministers meeting in Geneva later this month.

"Their scientists are telling the Communist leaders the same thing our scientists are telling us—that the alternative to peace is the threat of atomic destruction," he said.

When the Russians achieve a depth of understanding of the awful alternatives to peace, then "we can begin working out the hard issues," he said.

### COPPER COPPED

BURLINGTON, Vt. (AP)—About 30 miles of copper wire have been stolen from telephone poles in the Burlington area. The theft was discovered when a lineman went to remove the wires, which no longer were in use.

Stassen gave his views to reporters after telling the 21st annual Southern Governors Conference that if Russia accepts the President's inspection plan, then the world will have time in which to find a means of controlling atomic materials. The Eisenhower plan calls for an exchange of military information with Russia and mutual aerial inspection.

The Stassen speech pushed aside the discussion of politics by governors who were displaying a marked lack of enthusiasm—at least for the time being—for a suggested Dixie coalition aimed at wielding a balance of power at the Democratic national convention.

Gov. Marvin Griffin of Georgia gave his endorsement to a coalition so far as it might influence the same moderating a platform, but no further.

Gov. Leroy Collins of Florida was the most eloquent opponent of a coalition, saying he "wasn't much of a coalition man" and then adding: "I don't think there is any need for the delegates from various Southern states to meet in a secret conclave and propose a course of action for all the states. I think the South's position should develop normally and naturally, reflecting the will of the people."

The governors in their formal meetings turned their attention to problems of water conservation and development.

# Jaycees Plan Voice Contest

Plans to conduct a community-wide Voice of Democracy contest were announced today by Frank Michaelson, president of the Klamath County Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Voice of Democracy is a script writing and voicing contest which gives high school students an opportunity to consider, write and speak of the democratic fundamentals which have made America great, he said. Contest entries are judged according to content, delivery and originality of five minute scripts on the subject, "I Speak for Democracy." Scripts need not be memorized.

Now in its ninth year as a national program, the competitions have drawn more than 6,500,000 participants from public, private and parochial high schools. Nearly one million students, representing all states, Hawaii, Alaska and the District of Columbia, are expected to enter, Michaelson said.

All students in the 10th, 11th and 12th grades are eligible to compete, Michaelson said. The local winners will enter the state contest, and four co-equal national winners will be selected from the state and territorial winners.

The four winners will receive an expense-free trip to Washington, D.C., during the week of Washington's birthday. While there they will be received by the President, members of Congress and other top level government officials. Each will be given a check for \$500, a television set and a trophy.

Michaelson said that contest participants are now being made available to all high schools in the county. Further information may be obtained from Jack Otterbein, contest chairman, telephone 4241. Michaelson said that the contest is endorsed by the U.S. office of education and the National Association of Secondary School Principals. Sponsors at the National Association of Radio and Television Broadcasters, Radio-Electronics-Television Manufacturers Association and the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce.

George Banich, president of the association, presided at the business session and introduced the guest speaker.

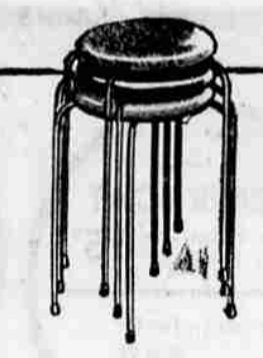
