Water Studies Report Made

DUNSMUIR—Reports on water studies made by the State Division of Water Resources will be available soon.

She recommended that the county planning commission study the reports, map small projects labeling the water for domestic, industrial and agricultural use and get all of the information to the legislative delegation.

She expressed the hope that the next session of the legislature would establish a state water department through which a fund could be set up to finance small water projects.

Northern California and Siskiyou County in particular are just beginning to feel its potential development, she said, adding that it would be "catastrophic" to send any but surplus water to other areas of the state.

"The Feather River project is apt to set a state policy," Mrs. Davis said.

She proposes to include the upper basin of the Feather River in a project to protect those interests now, rather than attempt to regain them later.

Mrs. Davis also expressed the belief that the state and federal government should begin to work on water projects cooperatively.

Demo Combine Predicted

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont) said today it is a "reasonable assumption" Western forces on a presidential candidate and Southern Democrats may join and platform in 1956.

"The South and the West have a community of interest in many fields, including economics," he said in an interview. "I am satisfied that from a political standpoint the Democrats in those areas are interested in getting the kind of platform and candidate most acceptable to all elements of the party."

The idea even of a Southern coalition was drawing little support, however, at a conference of Southern governors at Point Clear, Ala., though some supported the suggestion, others showed a growing wariness toward it.

But amidst what he called a wealth of material in the Democratic presidential field, he said he would not discount the possibility that Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.) might become a figure around whom Southern and Western Democrats could rally.

Savings Bonds Report Given

Sales of E and H United States Savings Bonds in Oregon according to Ted Gamble, Oregon Savings Bonds Committee chairman, continue at a high level.

The increase in sales for the first nine months of this year is 29.5 per cent over 1954, continuing to lead the nation in sales increase.

Gamble said that sales for September were \$3,294,272 and for the January-September period, \$35,147,865 which is a 10-year high for total bonds sold in the first nine months of this year.

According to Myron E. Shannon, chairman of Klamath County Savings Bonds Committee, sales in this county in September amounted to \$60,346. In 1954 sales were \$35,989 for the same month. For the nine months, Klamath County sales were \$562,226 compared with \$453,543 in the same period last year.

Music Classes Show Increase

Enrollment in grade school instrumental classes in the public schools is at its highest point. There are 130 children taking string instruments, which is an increase of seven over last year and 305 enrolled in wind and percussion classes, an increase of 33 over last year.

Elementary school classes are broken down into three divisions, beginning, intermediate and advanced classes and the course of study is so arranged as to give graded training to students from the fourth grade through high school.

High school music class enrollment is also at an all-time high with 419 electing music in high school. This is broken down as follows: A band, 80; B band, 29; orchestra, 52; a cappella choir, 79; girls' glee club, 71; boys' glee club, 45; mixed chorus, 42; and music theory, 21.
