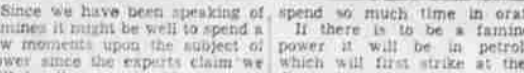

Since we have been speaking of famines it might be well to spend a few moments upon the subject of power since the experts claim we will be threatened with a power famine long before we will be faced with the specter of starvation. At least, that is what our political book of demagoguery continues to preach to us in the effort to sell the public on the idea that electric power, especially that produced by the federal government has some specific qualities not possessed by any other source and it's practically "free."

Unfortunately partisan politics cloud the whole power problem and politics decrees the thesis that electric power, especially hydro power, is the only source of power in the world without which industry is kept from moving in to your community, "Industry?"
