Local Museum Opens Sunday

Thomas Vaughan, director and curator of the Oregon Historical Quarterly, will be on hand for the formal opening of the Klamath county museum next Sunday, according to word received today by Al Ogilvie.

The staff at the museum has been busy all week arranging for the big opening and promise that all displays currently on hand will be ready for public inspection. Ogilvie pointed out that while the museum is asked to accept all donations and loans it will be impossible to properly catalogue and classify any items turned in during the opening ceremonies.

Many of the pioneers in the area are expected to attend, including some from the Medford and Jacksonville areas, and appropriate programs have been worked out in order that those attending will have a chance to visit and exchange information. Tea, under the supervision of Mrs. Guy Hancock and other members of the committee, will be served from 2 until 5 in the afternoon. The opening is slated between the hours of 1:30 to 7:40 p.m. at the library and museum building located on the corner of Third and Klamath.

Mexico Rescue Teams Arrive

MEXICO CITY (UP) — Rescue teams which reached Mexico's storm-battered Pacific Coast reported today a death toll of 50 in one town which was "literally buried" by mud and debris.

Many other sections of the three-state West Coast area flooded by a violent storm which blew in off the Pacific three days ago remained inaccessible today.

Red Cross teams were flown to the town of Atenguique in Jalisco state and reported the "whole place" was covered by mud with "only the church steeple showing."

The teams said 50 bodies had been recovered in Atenguique. At Mexico City, officials said they had had no communications with the little coastal state of Colima for more than two days. It was reported "virtually all under water."

Rescue workers said Tuesday night they were unable to get within more than 75 miles of Colima City because of washed-out bridges and inundated roads.

Authorities in Michoacan State also said no word had been received from a number of towns and villages caught in the sudden floods.

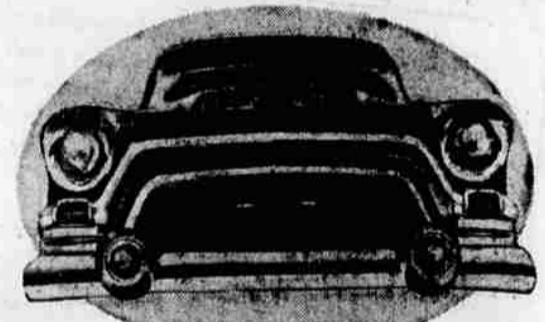
