

Smith Defends Crown In Mixed Up Decision

CINCINNATI (AP)—In as merry a mixup as you'll find in boxing annals, Wallace (Bud) Smith held on to his lightweight championship last night.

Smith, the 26-year-old Cincinnati, halted three-time champion Jimmy Carter's bid for a fourth title. But no one is certain today whether the decision was split or unanimous.

Smith weathered a bruising 13th round, in which he was in rubber-legged trouble all the way, and

finished the 15-rounder in good shape. Then the 6,693 paying customers and a nationwide television audience sat back to await the verdict.

Judges' scorecards were collected from Willie Purcell, Joe Blink and Gene Nitschke. The collector handed the cards to Paul D. Cain, chairman of the Cincinnati Boxing Commission, who looked 'em over. The collector went back to Blink's side of the ring, card in hand, for a hurried consultation. The ring announcer then said:

"Judge Purcell, 143 for Smith, 139 for Carter, Judge Blink, 140 for Smith, 140 for Carter, Judge Nitschke, 143 for Smith, 139 for Carter."

That made Smith the winner on a split decision. Ten minutes later Commissioner Cain told newsmen he had rechecked the cards and found that Blink's added up to 143 for Smith, 139 for Carter, and that the decision was unanimous.

But Blink, who at 70-odd is the retired city circulation manager of the Cincinnati Times-Star, tossed everything into confusion again by stating:

"I don't care how they add it. I voted for Carter, 144 to 140. That made it a split decision again, but by that time the television audience was watching some other program."

Commissioner Cain observed: "We must go by the figures on the card. It was unanimous for Smith."

But Blink, still judging two bouts after the main event, was adamant in his declaration that "I decided the fight. The referee, Tony Wardoff, had no hand in the balloting."

There were no knockdowns in the scrap, which attracted a gross gate of \$30,441 and a net of \$25,789.35, of which the principals received \$9,000 each in addition to a cut of the television receipts.

Carter, who suffered cuts requiring 20 stitches when he lost the title to Smith last June 29, was cut in the right eye in the third round and fought from the eighth on with the eye closed.

Smith was unmarked, although he took a terrific battering in the 13th when Carter belted him into the ropes with a series of rights and lefts to the head and body, and had him hanging on like a leech.

Californians Pay In Opening Week Game Infractions

Federal game management agents and California game wardens cracked down on opening week migratory waterfowl violations this past weekend in the Tularelake-White Lake area with three arrests totaling \$115 in fines.

Saturday, October 15, the opening day of the California duck and goose season, brought the arrest of Alfred Joseph DelChiaro, Albany, California, for exceeding daily bag limit on dark geese. DelChiaro appeared before Judge Victoria Thaler and paid \$45. The following day officers apprehended Jose Claudio Kleisch of Redding for exceeding possession limit of dark geese, and he paid a fine of \$28 after appearing before Judge Thaler. The third arrest was made by game officers when they found Claude Ralph Fay of Arcata, California with an over-possession of ducks. Judge Thaler fined Fay \$45. The birds convicted by Judge Thaler, 13 ducks and 11 geese, were turned over to the Tularelake Chapter of the Red Cross.

Game officers reported that during the first weekend of California shooting there had been no reports of swan killings and issued another warning to hunters that the birds will be moving into this area in mass before long, and not to shoot them.

Grade School Athletic Study

Editor's Note: This is a report of a statewide committee for the study of elementary school athletics, physical education and health sponsored by the County Superintendents' Association. Included in the series of three articles to be published by the Herald and News will be principles and policies governing the administration of elementary school athletics in Oregon. The third article will follow this week. The first appeared in Wednesday's Herald.

This report is entitled Principles and Policies Governing the Administration of Elementary School Athletics in Oregon. The report is the result of a four-year study of elementary school athletics. The County School Superintendents' Association was instrumental in initiating the study and sponsored the formation of the Statewide Committee.

The report represents the work of the sixteen agencies and organizations represented on this committee. It was adopted by the Oregon State Board of Education at its meeting on Wednesday, September 21. It is to be printed as a supplement to the Standards for Elementary Schools in Oregon, 1951.

The State Department of Education has requested that the Statewide Committee, which was responsible for the development of these principles and policies, continue as an Advisory Committee to the State Department of Education in the administration of his phase of the elementary school activity program. The State Board of Education indicated that these principles and policies were to go into effect immediately.

PART II

The following regulations are established to meet the previously stated purposes:

1. Participation in elementary interschool athletic competition (as defined in this section) shall be limited to grades six, seven and eight.

2. A pupil may compete in interschool athletics only with the written consent of a parent or legal guardian.

3. All pupils taking part in the interschool athletic program are to be examined by a doctor before participation in the sports program each school year. A physician's certification of the pupil's fitness to engage in interschool sports must be on record in the school, and a suitable entry made on the Oregon School Health card. Any limitation of activity is to be stated clearly, showing the duration of restriction. The physician is the best judge of the need for and frequency of repeated examinations. (See "Health Services for the School-Age Child in Oregon," page 19, for recommended procedures.)

4. Following illness of five days or more, or any disabling injury or other incapacity, further participation by a pupil in interschool athletics is to be permitted only on the written recommendation of a physician and under his supervision.

5. A pupil should have a period of practice adequate to insure proper physical condition before engaging in a contest.

6. Practices should be conducted in the daytime outside school hours. Practices should not exceed one hour exclusive of dressing and showering time.

ganzed rooting sections or rally squads, shall be under the control and financing of the school district.

21. School districts which are large enough should operate a self-contained program rather than schedule outside schools.

22. All scheduling should be done under the supervision of the school principal.

23. On trips, teams must be supervised by their coach. When pupils other than players accompany the team, additional faculty members should be assigned to the trip to assure adequate supervision of these pupils.

24. Coaches of teams shall be certified teachers employed by the school district and should possess the personal and professional qualities which will insure a high type of leadership and instruction. Girls groups should be taught, coached, and their games officiated by qualified women.

25. The school administration is responsible for selecting game officials who are competent in the mechanics of their work, and who conduct themselves and the game in a manner which will instill in young players a respect for authority and a desire to abide by the rules of the game.

26. Adequate protective equipment shall be required: Baseball (hardball, boys only). Required equipment - catcher's mask, chest protector, shin guards, batter's safety and headgear. Recommended additional equipment - glasses, goggles (boys and girls). Required equipment - catcher's mask and chest protector. Recommended additional equipment - glasses, goggles.

Spikes or cleats of any type shall not be allowed in any activity. Tennis shoes shall be required for soccer and speedball, and are recommended for all other activities.

Sports World Shorts

CHICAGO (UP)—Hank Sauer, power-house slugger of former seasons who batted only .211 in 79 games this past season, became the first player to sign a Chicago Cubs' contract for 1956 Wednesday. Sauer, who lives in Inglewood, Calif., was voted the National League's most valuable player in 1953.

NEW YORK (UP)—Jim Loscutt of Oregon and Corky Devlin of George Washington have joined the College All Star basketball squad under the direction of Duddy Moore of Duquesne. The collegians will meet the New York Knickerbockers in an exhibition game at Madison Square Garden, Oct. 30.

HAMBURG (UP)—Germany will play host to the United States here, Nov. 1, in an international amateur boxing meet in line with German preparations for the 1956 Olympics. The last U.S.-German boxing meet was held in 1951 at Wiesbaden, Germany and was won by the Germans.

NEW YORK (UP)—Charley Johnston, manager of light heavyweight champion Archie Moore, said today either Volande Pompey or Gerhard Hecht are acceptable as opponents for Moore if the terms are right. Moore originally was expected to defend against Randy Turpin but the latter has quit the ring.

CHICAGO (UP)—Owner-coach George Halas sounded a warning to the three front-runners in the National Football League's western division today about his thrice-beaten Chicago Bears.

"No one team better think they've won it," he said. "I realize what a tough chore it is to go to the West Coast and play, but if we are able to split our two games out there, we'll be all right."

The Bears, who bounced Baltimore Sunday, 38-10, for their first win in four games, met San Francisco Sunday for the second time and then tangle with the Los Angeles Rams tied with Baltimore and Green Bay for the division lead.

Owls, Vikings Clash In OCC Cellar Battle

A battle for the cellar will develop this Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock on the Lincoln High School football field in Portland as the Oregon Technical Institute Owls and the Portland State College Vikings clash in an Oregon College Conference tussle.

Both teams will be seeking win number one in conference play, and the Owls from the Mile High Campus will be after their first triumph of the season. In OCC action so far this year, Portland State holds a 0-2 record, losing to Oregon College and Southern Ore-

gon. OTI was turned back by Eastern Oregon in their only counting action.

Coach Rex Hunsaker's charges from Oregon Tech have dropped four straight games since the season started, but the Owls' head coach said his gridders are definitely "up" for this game and are after "win number one." "It is surprising," Hunsaker said this week, "how a team can take four beatings and yet still hold their heads up high. Our kids are showing lots of spirit and will to win, and you can never tell, this may be the weekend to start our ball-club rolling."

Portland State has picked up one win in four tries, that of a 20-13 triumph over Linfield in the two schools opener. Following the win over Linfield, PSC has dropped decisions to SOC 20-6, OCE 36-14 and last week they fell 14-7 before Pacific.

Viking officials reported that they have apparently found a solid starting backfield unit after the one-touchdown loss to Pacific last Saturday. Head coach Ralph Davis, former Oregon State footballer, is expected to start Bob Gull at quarterback, Chuck Withers at full and Herm Winterholler and Curtis Knight at the two halfback positions. Knight and Winterholler are both returning lettermen from last year's Viking squad and are expected to carry the bulk of the offensive load for PSC. The Vikings use a multiple offense, relying mostly on a single-wing with a balanced line.

Oregon Tech will again be without the services of quarterback Don Stonehill, who is out with a badly sprained toe. Stonehill's absence will again place the signaling chores on the shoulders of letterman Dave Thomas. Halback Cal "Sugar Jet" Smith will also be running the Owls' T-formation to spell Thomas throughout the scrap. Hunsaker and backfield coach Corky Van Loo are grooming quarterback Toby Moore and fullback Scott Hartley for action against the Vikings. Hartley is the former Chiloquin High athletic standout and has just returned home from the armed service.

The Owls hold an edge over the increasing Portland State squads as they have rolled up three wins and a tie in five games. In 1950 when the two clubs met, OTI tied the Vics 13-13, then in 1951 pounded Vanport, as it was known at that time, 27-7. Oregon Tech won '52 by a 54-0 margin, then Portland State stopped Tech on two missed conversions, 14-12. Last year the Owls walked away with a 54-18 triumph in what was regarded as one of the big upsets in last year's OCC race.
