Potato exhibits will be received all day Thursday in the gymnasium of the high school with Friday, October 21, at 10 a.m. as the deadline. Bob Petrik, chairman of the potato exhibit division of the festival, requests that entries be in as early as possible. Exhibits are open for state competition. There will be classes for Netted Gem and White Rose Commercial potatoes and White Rose and Netted Gems certified seed. First prize in these divisions will be cash and a cup. Cash prizes will go to winners in the second and third places. Cash prizes are also offered for the least number of U.S. No. 1 Netted Gems to weigh 100 pounds; for U.S. No. 1 bakers, and largest single potato and the freakiest potato. Other divisions are open to 4-H Club, high school entries and Future Farmer of America competition with cash prizes to be given. Competition is open for canning, vegetable garden, grains and seeds and junior flower show exhibitors. All inside booths for exhibitors are ready. Exhibits will be open all three days of the festival, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, October 21-22-23.

Brownell's Trip To Denver Raises Political Pondering

WASHINGTON — Atty. Gen. Brownell is flying out to Denver tomorrow and the trip raises speculation that President Eisenhower may now want to discuss the political situation with his top adviser in that field. It is generally recognized that the 51-year-old attorney general is "the wizard" in political matters for this administration, and that the President frequently turns to him for advice in such matters. In announcing the other day that Brownell had been invited to the President's bedside, White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said that Justice Department business would be discussed. This might well concern two presidential nominations — from Justice Department ranks — to two judgeships, both of which were sidetracked in the last Congress. The men involved are Solicitor General Simon E. Sobeloff of Baltimore, nominated for the 4th Circuit Court of Appeals at Richmond, Va., and Asst. Atty. Gen. Warren E. Burger of Minneapolis, proposed for a place on the U.S. Court of Appeals here. Both nominations evoked opposition and never got out of committee before the session ended. The question of resubmission in the January session now has to be settled. Discussion of this business of course would not preclude some other talk about politics, perhaps including the President's heart

New Episcopal Bishop Named

The Very Rev. James Frederick Carman, dean of Trinity Cathedral, Phoenix, Arizona, Tuesday was elected bishop coadjutor for the Episcopal Church, diocese of Oregon. The 52-year-old son of an Episcopalian minister was ordained a deacon in 1929 and a priest in 1930. He has served in Denver and Pueblo, Colorado, and took up his Arizona post in 1946. He was elected a member of the national council in 1947 and served in that body until 1952. He has a D.D. degree from Seabury Western Theological Seminary in Evanston, Illinois. He also holds a B.A. from Carleton College, Northfield, Minnesota. He received a B.D. in 1930 from Seabury Divinity School, Fairbault, Minnesota. Two Oregon ministers were also contenders for the bishopric. They were the Rev. L. B. Keiter, Portland; and the Rev. Perry H. Smith, Eugene. The new bishop is married and has a son and two daughters.

UN Voting Deadlocked UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. — Yugoslavia and the U.S.-backed Philippines deadlocked again last night in new balloting for a disputed Security Council seat. But Russia's bid to snuff the Belgrade Communists appeared crippled by an American maneuver which played the Yugoslavs on another key U.N. council. When voting resumed in the 60-nation General Assembly, Yugoslavia — backed by both Britain and the Soviet bloc — was strongly favored to win. Interest in the outcome was keen, since a Philippine defeat would deal a heavy blow to the prestige of the Asian nation's all-out U.S. backers. After three ballots in which neither side got the needed two-thirds majority, it began to look like a standoff. On the ninth and final ballot of the two-day series, the Philippines had 31 votes to Yugoslavia's 27. The picture changed when the United States, over bitter Soviet opposition, pushed through a proposal postponing the Security Council election and switching to balloting for the U.N. Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) and the Trusteeship Council. On the second ballot, Yugoslavia found herself elected to ECOSOC with 46 votes—seven more than the required margin. No date was set for voting to resume for the Security Council seat. The United States and Yugoslavia secured themselves on ECOSOC. Canada replaced Australia and Indonesia comes in for India.
