

# Uclans, Hurricanes Picked As Weekend Action Opens

Defending national champion UCLA, dangerous Miami of Florida, and unbeaten United Boston College are favored to score victories tonight in three big inter-sectional football games that start the college football weekend off in high gear.

UCLA, ranked fifth nationally, is favored by 13 points over Iowa, ranked No. 13, in a clash that is expected to draw another huge crowd to the Los Angeles Coliseum.

Miami of Florida, is favored by just six points as host to Texas Christian, a Southwest Conference powerhouse beaten only once in five games and then by three points. Miami had hopes of national honors this year but has been jolted out of the high ratings by a one-touchdown loss to Georgia Tech and a two-touchdown loss to Notre Dame. The Hurricanes know this is probably their last chance this year, and they're anxious not to tumble again.

Boston College, which has steam-rolled three rivals, is favored by 13 points over Marquette, which has lost three of four games.

**RATED EVEN**

In other leading games tonight, Oklahoma A&M and Detroit are rated even money in a Missouri Valley Conference game and Brigham Young is at Denver in the Skyline Conference.

Actually, the football "weekend" got off to an early start Thursday with the annual "Big Thursday" clash at Columbia, S.C., between old rivals Clemson and South Carolina. Clemson, sparked by sub-quarterback Charley Bussey came out on top, 28-14, for the first time in five years.

Although inter-sectional games highlight tonight's gridiron program, conference battles will provide most of the spice Saturday.

For example, first place will be at stake in the Big Ten, Big Seven, and Southwest Conferences, where teams previously unbeaten in league warfare collide. Wisconsin (2-0) and Ohio State (1-0), defending Big Ten champ, battle for a share of that circuit's lead. Oklahoma (1-0) in league play, the nation's No. 3 team which is unbeaten in 48 straight league games and also is riding a 23-game winning streak that is the longest in the nation, faces probably its toughest Big Seven test of the year in Colorado (2-0) but is a 14-point favorite. And Texas A&M, surprise conqueror of Texas Christian, battles Baylor in the Southwest with the Aggies picked by six.

**FAVORED**

Like Oklahoma and UCLA, all other teams in the nation's "top ten" are favorites Saturday.

## Turner Meets Isaac Logart In Ring Bout

NEW YORK (UP)—Middleweight Gil Turner, who would clearly love to get even with former welterweight champ Kid Gavilan, will try to do it by proxy tonight at Madison Square Garden when he fights Isaac Logart, the youngster they are calling "the new Gavilan."

Turner, 10th-ranking contender in the middleweight division, is a 9-5 favorite over Logart in the TV-radio 10-rounder that brings boxing back to the Garden after a six-week absence.

Turner of Philadelphia was cruising along on a fine welterweight career back in 1952 when champion Gavilan, the "Cuban Koed," spoiled everything by knocking him out. So far at least, that has prevented Turner from scaling the fistic heights.

Logart, 22, hails from Gavilan's home town of Camaguey, Cuba. Moreover, he's adopted "The Koed's" flashy, hurrying style. He even wears high white ring shoes like Gavilan and he's announced he wants to bring the welter crown back to Cuba.

Turner, 25, is favored because of his experience and his persistent aggressiveness.

Contracts for tonight's bout provide that neither man may weigh more than 155 pounds.

Syracuse team that upset Army last week; Navy, No. 4, is "only" a 22-point favorite over hapless Pennsylvania; Michigan State, No. 6, is picked by 13 to follow up its victory over Notre Dame by beating Illinois; Duke, No. 7, is favored by eight over Pittsburgh; Auburn, No. 8, is favored over Furman by so great a margin that no points are quoted; Southern California, No. 9, is favored by 20 over California; and Notre Dame, No. 10, is the narrow favorite among the "top ten" by only seven points over Purdue.

## Grade School Athletic Study

Editor's Note: This is a report of a statewide committee for the study of elementary school athletics, physical education and health sponsored by the County Superintendent's Association. The series of three articles to be published by the Herald and News will be principles and policies governing the administration of elementary school athletics in Oregon. This is the third article. The first two appeared in Wednesday and Thursday's Herald.

This report is entitled Principles and Policies Governing the Administration of Elementary School Athletics in Oregon. The report is the result of a four-year study of elementary school athletics. The County School Superintendents' Association was instrumental in initiating the study and sponsored the formation of the Statewide Committee.

The report represents the work of the sixteen agencies and organizations represented on this committee. It was adopted by the Oregon State Board of Education at their meeting on Wednesday, September 21. It is to be printed as a supplement to the Standards for Elementary Schools in Oregon, 1951.

The State Department of Education has requested that the Statewide Committee, which was responsible for the development of these principles and policies, continue as an Advisory Committee to the State Department of Education in the administration of this phase of the elementary school activity program. The State Board of Education indicated that these principles and policies were to go into effect immediately.

### PART III (Final)

27. Limitations on sports and types of events:

(a) There shall be no boxing on the elementary school level.

(b) In view of the fact that tackle football on the elementary school level has been disapproved in reports of the American Medical Association, the American Association for Health, Physical Education, and Recreation, the Educational Policies Commission, the National Education Association, the National Association of School Administrators, the National Council of State Consultants in Elementary Education, the Department of Elementary School Principals of the NEA, and the Society of State Directors of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation, the value of this activity in the elementary schools is highly questionable. Therefore, school districts which choose to undertake a program of tackle football below the ninth grade should do so only under regulations and policies formulated in JOINT CONSULTATION WITH THE LOCAL MEDICAL SOCIETY AND PTA OR OTHER PARENT GROUPS.

(c) Maximum playing time and field and court sizes. All court and field sizes should be scaled down for elementary school games. (See handbook "Physical Education in Oregon Elementary School," 1953.)

Baseball and softball should be limited to five innings for a regulation game.

Football (touch or flag, boys only) 8 - minute quarters, 2 minutes between quarters, 10 minutes between halves.

Soccer, Speedball, and Basketball (boys and 7th and 8th grade girls) 6 - minute quarters, 2 minutes between quarters, 10 minutes between halves.

(d) Track and field events approved for boys: Endurance events shall not be held.

Broads jump (running or standing) - grades 6-7-8. Hop, step, and jump (running or standing) - grades 5-7-8.

High jump - grades 6-7-8; Pole Vault - grades 7-8; 5 pound Shot -

Throwing: Baseball, softball for distance - grades 6-7-8. Soccerball for distance - grades 6-7-8. Basketball for distance - grades 6-7-8.

(f) Events and activities not listed may be included as interschool contests if these activities are selected in accordance with the interests and abilities of the children involved. (See handbook "Physical Education in Oregon Elementary Schools, 1953," for activities suitable to grade level.)

Examples of such activities are: Judo, Judo, Endball, Captain Ball, Fieldball, Line Soccer, Kick Football, Deck Tennis, Paddle Tennis, etc.

## PCC Grid Spotlight On Conference Tilts

West Coast football moves into the back stretch of the 1955 race this weekend with Pacific Coast Conference action taking the spotlight from inter-sectional activity for the first time.

Three conference clashes are on the Saturday slate and two have a definite bearing on the championship. A pair of inter-sectionals and a backyard battle between two strong independents wrap up the mid-October schedule.

The top PCC tilts match Stanford against Washington at Seattle and Southern California against California at Berkeley. The third slate at Corvallis.

As usual, a Friday night game at Los Angeles puts the show on the road. Friday night's clash between UCLA and Iowa once was billed as a possible Rose Bowl preview. But the Big Ten Hawkeyes have been a disappointment.

Oregon goes to Arizona for a Saturday night non-conference contest and San Jose State entertains arch-rival College of the Pacific. UCLA's beaten five straight times, has an open date.

Stanford, still seeking its first conference win, will throw the best passing offense against the Huskies' second best aerial defense. The Indians' have averaged 129 yards a game overhead while

Washington has limited its foes to a modest 76. The Huskies, with southpaw Sandy Lederman reinstated as second-string quarterback, need a fourth triumph to remain deadlocked with UCLA for the league lead.

Third-running Southern California presumably gets a soft touch in California. The young Bears, who looked to be improving, slumped to a 21-0 shutout by Oregon last week while the Trojans were belting Wisconsin. The only hope at Berkeley was that the team would become fired up by campus criticism of Coach Pappy Waldorf and the squad.

Neither Washington State nor Oregon State has a finger in the title action, but both are eager for a second conference triumph and the game should be close.

UCLA, scared by a second-half Stanford splurge a week ago, is expected to go all-out against the Hawkeyes, who have been clobbered by Wisconsin and tied by Purdue in Big Ten play. A Bruin win would give the PCC a 4-2 bulge over Big Ten opposition.

Oregon needs a victory over Arizona to maintain overall inter-sectional superiority for the Coast. In 17 games, PCC teams have won only eight.
