# Squabble Over MacArthur Recalls Old Controversy

WASHINGTON (UP)—The MacArthur controversy is in a new spin, recalling that the general's luck with recent presidents has been bad. It has not much improved even though an old-line Army buddy is in the White House now.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur knew the White House parlors for long years before he was even aware there was a dog house on the premises. At age 26 and only three years out of West Point, MacArthur began in 1926 a brief tour of duty as aide to President Theodore Roosevelt. By 1933 he was a youthful member of the Army General Staff.

President Woodrow Wilson promoted MacArthur rapidly in World War I. He was the Army's youngest major general. The Harding administration's favor was indicated when MacArthur was named superintendent of the United States Military Academy in 1919. That's a blue ribbon job which often leads to the top.

It led to the top for MacArthur who was named chief of staff by President Herbert Hoover. He was reappointed to the post by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. It was in that job that MacArthur discovered a bright young officer

familiarly known as Ike. The brilliance of MacArthur's mind and military career persuaded FDR to put the entire Southwest Pacific under MacArthur's command in World War II. Thereafter the charm was broken. This week's Defense Department publication of the so-called MacArthur papers is a minor incident in the storm which has swirled about the general in his later years.

The papers were published in response to pressure and controversy. It is Democratic Party doctrine that MacArthur was responsible, along with the American

chiefs of staff, for the Yalta arrangements which obtained the promise that the Soviet Union would come into the war against Japan. Democrats contend FDR at Yalta merely took military advice.

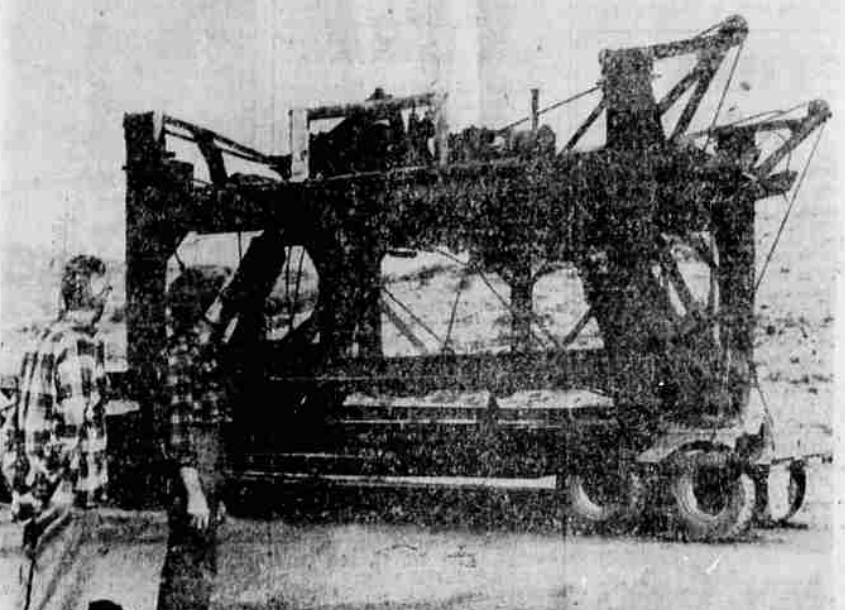
There is no record of any recent defense by President Eisenhower of his former military boss nor any evidence that the Defense Department was in MacArthur's corner in this public controversy.

The breach between Mr. Eisenhower and MacArthur seems to be complete if unacknowledged. The record shows that Mr. Eisenhower

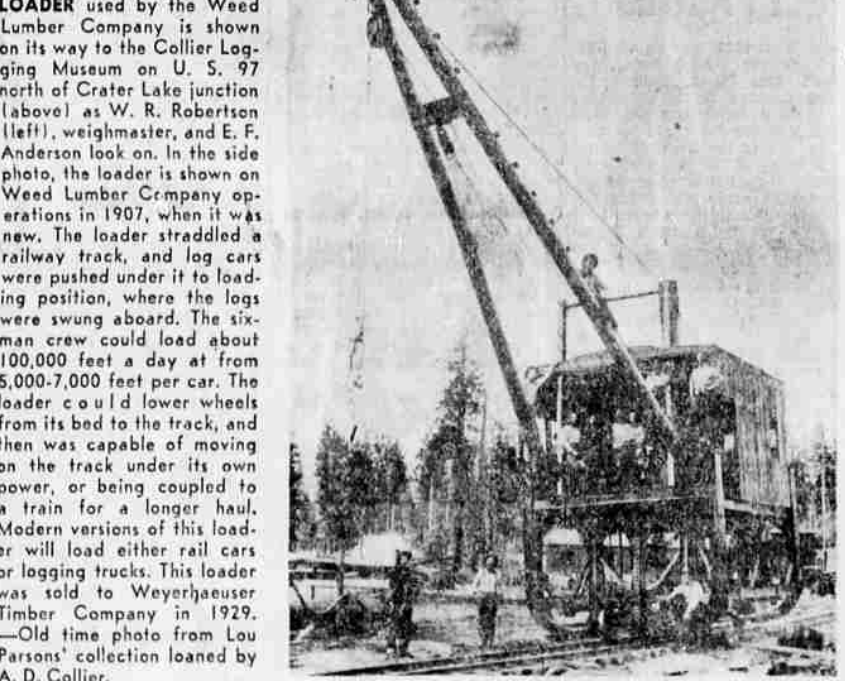
has seen MacArthur only twice since entering politics as a Republican.

MacArthur has confided to some persons that he felt that Mr. Eisenhower lacked the decisive mind necessary to high executive office. And MacArthur was a Taft man in the 1952 pre-convention campaign.

Mr. Hoover was the last president who loved MacArthur for long. FDR had his troubles trying to keep MacArthur happy on short Pacific rations while the great U.S. war machine was created for Europe.

## Roseburg Hunter Dies From Attack

ROSEBURG — David S. Churchill, about 60, Roseburg, who insured an outing hunting despite repeated heart attacks, was found dead in the forest 20 miles west of Roseburg Wednesday.

The coroner said a heart attack had killed him. He added that Churchill had suffered previous attacks, including one so severe he had to be helped home on the opening day of the hunting season.

Churchill had gone out again Wednesday with a hunting companion, Walter Crosier, Roseburg. When Churchill failed to show up at a rendezvous, Crosier began searching. He soon came across Churchill's body.

## M'Fadden Will Under Probate

JERSEY CITY, N.J. (UP)—One-time millionaire Bernard Macfadden was so piqued when he and his wife, Jennie Lee, separated that he cut her off from his estate without a cent, it was revealed Thursday.

The doughy, 67-year-old physical culturist's last will and testament, which will be probated Monday, 10 days after his death, specifically excluded his third and last wife from benefiting from the estate.

The papers, which were filed here Thursday, gave no clue as to the size of the estate, but it was believed small.

He specified a number of moderate bequests to relatives and friends, dividing the remainder among his children, a granddaughter and the Bernard Macfadden Foundation.

As for Jennie Lee, who was battling him in court for alimony when he died and still is fighting to get control of his estate, he said:

"I make no provisions for my wife, Jennie Lee Macfadden, hereinafter, for the reason that she had unjustifiably abandoned me and has left home without my consent and has failed and refused to return to me and my home."

The will was dated March 11, 1953. Newark attorney W. Eugene San Filippo filed the papers on behalf of Macfadden's New York lawyer, Louis M. Wente.

Named executors of the estate were Mrs. Helen Vieggers, of Larchmont, N.Y., a daughter; Edward L. Bodin, acting president of the Bernard Macfadden Foundation in New York; and Paul Winkler, of Danville, N.Y., each receiving \$1,000 under the terms of the will.

Macfadden also left \$1,000 each to several nieces, nephews and friends.

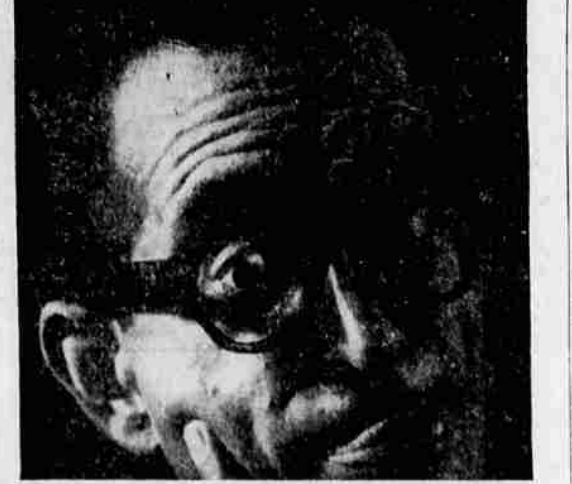
