### Jet Crash In Japan Takes Crewman's Life

**TOKYO** (AP) — A U.S. Air Force medium jet bomber on a training flight to Japan crashed on takeoff in northern Honshu Friday, killing one crewman and injuring three others.

The plane was one of several from Mountain Home Air Force Base in Idaho on a "mobility exercise" to Japan and Okinawa.

Col. W. C. Bacon, commanding officer of the Idaho base, said he had been informed the other three crew members received minor injuries. They were identified as 1st Lt. Charles W. Clark, co-pilot, Roseburg, Ore.; Capt. George M. Wentsch, pilot, San Angelo, Tex.; and S. Sgt. William A. Trueba, Barre, Vt.

### Asian-African Bloc Stumps United Nations Diplomats

**UNITED NATIONS, N.Y.** (AP) — When a major issue pops up in the United Nations these days, diplomats are apt to ask: "How about the Asian-African bloc?"

It isn't an easy question to answer. The group of 17 nations, representing more than 650 million of the world's 2 1/2 billion people isn't a solid bloc at all. But they represent a vigorous coalition with enough potential strength to wrinkle the brows of U.N. diplomats.

The bloc includes Afghanistan, Burma, Egypt, Ethiopia, India, Indonesia, Iran, Iraq, Lebanon, Liberia, Pakistan, the Philippines, Saudi Arabia, Syria, Thailand, Turkey and Yemen.

Six of the 17 are members of the pro-Western Baghdad Pact. Turkey, Pakistan and Iran belong to the Baghdad Pact. Turkey is a member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. The Philippines, Thailand and Pakistan have lined up in the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization (SEATO).

Egypt and other Arab nations bitterly oppose the Baghdad Pact, in which Britain is an associate and the United States a prospective associate.

India does not like Pakistan's participation in the Baghdad Pact and objects to her acceptance of U.S. military aid. India and Pakistan have long unsettled issues, chief among them the future of Kashmir state.

India, which played a leading role in the organization of the

Turkey opposed airing the Algerian issue at this time. Ethiopia abstained.

### Loel Pleads Self-Defense

**OKLAHOMA CITY (UP)**—Otto Austin Loel, 44, one-time Oregon police chief charged with the fatal stabbing of a California woman, pressed a surprise plea of self defense today as his trial drew to a close.

Jurors were expected to begin deciding Loel's fate before noon. The trial picked up speed late yesterday when Loel took the stand to present the most sensational testimony of the trial.

The former Sandy, Ore., police chief admitted plunging a hunting knife into Mrs. Elizabeth Jeanne Henderson Jan. 10, 1954, but he said it was in a "fit of pain" while defending himself. The two had taken a motel room together here.

During his two hours on the stand, Loel first repudiated the confession given to the FBI following his arrest at Orlando, Fla., stating he knifed the 31-year-old Compton, Calif., woman.
