KU Tops Reno 31-25

For the second straight week, Coach John McGinnis' Klamath Union High School Pelicans have come from behind in the second half to keep from slipping beneath a football defeat.
Friday night at Modoc Field, the Pels, battered and bruised with injuries, rallied for a 25-point second half to whip the visiting Reno High School Huskies in a non-conference prep grid battle 31-25.
Last week, Klamath scored in the waning seconds of the game to tie the Medford 13-13.
Led by old "die hards" such as Dave Leeling, Tommy "T-Model" Ferrell, Donn Taucher and Modesto "Mighty Mo" Jimenez, all of whom are suffering from injuries of one sort or another, and some untired reserves, the Pels surprised their followers by beating Reno to the punch at almost every corner. Playing wide awake football on defense and making the best of their offense, the Pels came from a 12-6 halftime deficit to pick up their third win of the season against three losses and a tie.

own 40, but on the second play from scrimmage, Taucher again saved the day for the locals as he snared a Black-pass on the Reno 45 and raced all the way to pay dirt for the touchdown to tie the game. The clock showed three minutes and 16 seconds left in the third chapter of play as Kimpson attempted to break the deadlock with his conversion, but Reno end Jim Cress blocked the boot and the score stood 18-18.
Three plays into the last quarter, Landeros carried for his fourth score of the evening on an 11-yard sprint between guard and tackle. This time Herrington led the extra point between the cross bars and Reno led by seven, 25-18.
The Pels, evidently their feelings hurt when Landeros scored his fourth TD of the night, pushed in one continuous movement touchdown-bound. Nine plays and 53 yards after Reno's kickoff to Klamath, Taucher boomed over tackle for six yards and a Klamath score. The all-important try for point failed when Kimpson's pass fell incomplete in the end zone, but Reno was off side and the Pels received new life.
On the second chance, Kimpson ran over the point to tie the count at 25-25. At this time, 6:20 remained in the game.
A big break for the Pels came on the next play of the game as Klamath kicked off to Reno. Heat-on booted an on-side kick that was fumbled by a Reno lineman and Bill Steiner pounced on the loose leather for a Klamath recovery on the Reno 45.
Taucher and Kimpson carried to the 37 and a holding penalty against the Huskies pushed the ball to the 22 yard line. Taucher bounced through a large hole opened by his forward wall and moved down to the 11 for a first down. Leeling then bulled his way to the eight. Taucher again carried to the two yard line after an on-side penalty against Reno. On the next play from scrimmage, Taucher shot straight forward and into pay dirt for the winning touchdown. The extra point run by Kimpson was stopped short as Klamath led 31-25.
Reno took the following Klamath kickoff and started a last-minute drive of their own in a determined effort to tie the score.

Klamath took the opening kickoff and in 10 plays moved the pigskin from their own 34 yard line into the Reno end zone for the first score of the evening. Ferrell capped the 66-yard downfield march on a four yard carry over his own right tackle. In the series of 10 plays, Klamath rolled up four consecutive first downs with "T-Model" Tommy and Butch Kimpson doing all of the work. Kimpson's try for point failed with eight minutes remaining in the period. But the Klamath lead didn't hold for long.
On the third play after Ferrell's score, Reno halfback Roy Landeros circled his own left end and scurried 54 yards on a beautiful touchdown ramble. The speedy Husky seatback took little time in breaking into the clear and wasted even less time in showing the Pelican defenders his heels.
The conversion try by Reno's Phil Merrington failed and the score was knotted at 6-6.
In the second quarter, Reno took their first lead of the evening, and again it was Landeros who tallied the six-pointer. With just less than eight minutes remaining in the half, quarterback Fred Black lofted a pass to Landeros in the Pelican end zone for the score. Landeros had shaken himself loose from all possible defenders and took the pitch standing by himself. Again the point-after failed.
Play opened quick in the second half and the situation at hand looked bad for the Pels. Reno marched downfield 87 yards in 11 plays to stretch their lead to 16-6 over the Whitebirds as Landeros raced 47 yards around right end for the TD. Then just as fast as Reno had racked up a 12 point spread, the score was tied by a sterling Klamath offense that couldn't be contained by Reno's defenses.
On the ensuing kickoff by the Huskies, Klamath started on Reno's 49 yard line following a brilliant kickoff return by Taucher from his own 15. Ferrell and Leeling carried the ball to the 46 and a personal foul against Reno placed the pigskin on the 39 giving Klamath another first down. Kimpson then moved nine yards to the 21 and Ferrell carried again, this time for four yards to the 17. Kimpson took two turns at the Reno line and quarterback Jerry Burke tried once to push the ball deep into Reno territory as the pigskin rested on the nine yard line. Burke then hit end Bill Badorek with a perfectly executed jump pass for the score. Klamath then trailed by six points, but not for long.

Commissioner Rakes Penn Boxing Program

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — One of Pennsylvania's three athletic commissioners yesterday charged that " racketeer elements" have a close association with boxing.
Alfred M. Klein, a Philadelphia attorney, said yesterday "there is a much closer association between boxing and the underworld than I ever thought."
Klein said there was an urgent need for a congressional investigation of nationwide boxing.
Meanwhile, the Pennsylvania Athletic Commission is continuing its own probe, he said, even going out of the state to get witnesses.
Professional boxing in Pennsylvania had been suspended most of the summer after it was discovered Harold Johnson, a light-heavyweight, had been drugged before a May bout he lost in the Philadelphia arena.
Who drugged Johnson, and how, has not been discovered but Klein held hearings for many weeks and suspended Johnson and a number of his associates — is still trying to solve that mystery — and "some day we'll find out."

Trojans Humble Cal 33-6

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Southern California, with Jon Arnett setting the scoring pace, exploded for three last quarter touchdowns Saturday to trounce the clawless California Bears, 33-6 in a Pacific Coast Conference football game.
The Trojans' vaunted offense, most powerful in the conference, stuttered through the first three periods of a dull game, but suddenly jelled in the closing period to slam the Bears' fourth ground Arnett, a whirling dervish off the tackles, ripped through for his trio of touchdowns on two blasts of six yards each and another of four.
Gordy DuVall slammed 58 yards, also off tackle, for a fourth Trojan tally and Jimmy Contratto passed 10 yards to huge Leon Clarke for the fifth.
Ellis Kissinger kicked the conversions after the final three scores, taking over for Arnett who missed on the initial two.
California broke into the scoring in the brief fourth quarter. Jim Carmichael taking a 15-yard pass from Hugh Maguire after the stubby quarterback had intercepted a Trojan pass.
The victory was the fifth straight for Southern Cal over California, the first time the Bears ever have been beaten that many in a row by any team.
Southern Cal, racking up its fifth victory in six starts, moved slightly through the first half, but held a 12-0 lead at the intermission. Arnett's first touchdown and Contratto's pass to Clarke.
The Trojans were held scoreless in the third period, but opened up in the final quarter to win going away.

Three high school teams won berths in the state tournaments in Friday night prep football games and Marshfield again demonstrated its power.
Portland's Jefferson and Washington won first and second place in the city league and earned berths in the state tournament. Jefferson downed Roosevelt 13-7 for a district 1-A berth and Washington blanked Benson for the district 5 contest. In the night prep tournament spot, Eugene, No. 9 in the poll, Marshfield needed only a victory over North Bend to take the district title.
South Salem, ranked No. 5 in the state, was beaten 27-21 by Milwaukie, a strong district 3 contender, in the major upset of the night.
The rest of the top ten performed about as expected.
Gresham, No. 2, beat North Salem 33-20. Corvallis, No. 3, defeated Sweet Home 30-6 in a district 8 contest. Pendleton, No. 4, beat Hermiston 30-6 in a district 7 game. Hillsboro, No. 7, and the district 4 leader, whipped Tigard 33-0 for its seventh straight victory. Vale did not play.

Mississippi Loses Number One Grid Fan

CHICAGO (AP) — Mississippi's No. 1 football roster, blind Jim Ivey, missed his first homecoming football game in 59 years Saturday when Ole Miss took on Arkansas at Oxford, Miss.
The 83-year-old Negro man who won the Rebel's win either but he became an institution on the Mississippi campus after attending his first football game in 1896. He wandered into the stadium one day and asked "what's the score?" when Texas was trampling the Rebel.
Blind since his early teens, Ivey began cheering for Mississippi and the inspired Rebels turned the tide and won the game.
A week ago he came to Chicago to live with his son, James Jr., 41-year-old factory worker, but was hospitalized.
Blind Jim, an ordained Baptist minister who ran a small candy-cigar shop on the campus, called himself "dean of the freshmen."
Members of the freshman class traditionally were assigned to guide Blind Jim about the campus. On several occasions, three generations of freshmen from the same family had guided him.
Endowed with an unbelievable memory, Jim could recognize alumni he hadn't been around in years by their footsteps or voice. Jim's body was to be shipped to Oxford Saturday to be buried alongside his wife.
Flags at the university were flying at half-staff in his honor.

Green Wave on Rise

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP) — Things are looking up for Tulane in the first two games for the Green Wave, sophomore quarterback Gene Newton of Shreveport hit for touchdowns via passes — a 35-yarder to Al Cottrell against VMI and a 24-yarder to Otis Gilmore against Texas. In 1954 Tulane completed only one touchdown pass.
Tulane's Honkers finished strong Friday afternoon on their home field to whip Alturas' Motob Union High Braves 20-0 in a traditional grid scrap. The win marked the second time in the history of the rivalry that Tulane has picked up the winner's check.
Carl Creswell opened the scoring with a 47 yard run on a pass interception. In the third period, Gary Dalhe passed 30 yards to Rom Stump. Tom Procter ran over the point-after-touchdown and Tulane led 13-0. The final score came on a pass from Dalhe to Stump for 10 yards. This time Creswell converted with a run to finish the Honker's scoring parade.

Oregon State Wins 14-6 Over Cougars

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Oregon State scored its second Coast Conference victory Saturday, 14-6, by pushing across two first-half touchdowns and then stubbornly resisting a Washington State uprising in the second half.
The winners, who previously had upended Stanford, pounced on three Washington State fumbles in the first quarter, and eventually converted two of them into touchdowns.
With the fumbles out of the way, Washington State became a serious threat. The visitors scored the first time they got the ball in the second half, and three other times drove into Oregon State territory.
Oregon State managed to stop one drive with a pass interception or the Oregon State 8. Another was halted 1½ yards from the goal line, and the third was blunted on the 36.

Huskies, Stanford Deadlock

SEATTLE (AP) — Stanford's Indians threw Tarr and trouble at Washington all through a sunny football afternoon Saturday, but had to settle for a 7-7 tie that knocked Washington out of its co-ownership of first place in the Pacific Coast Conference.
Both teams turned enemy fumbles into touchdowns in the opening quarter and the sun-washed crowd of 47,500 tingled in anticipation of free-scoring fracas which never developed.
The Huskies took their bite quickly. Stanford received the opening kickoff, but on the second scrimmage play Washington tackle Fred Robinson jarred John Brodie loose from the ball and Ed Sheron recovered for the Huskies on the Stanford 18.
Hard-hitting Credey Green slammed to the Stanford 3 in four plays and from there halfback Mike Monroe angled into the corner to put Washington in front. Dean Derby boot the placement. Stanford came boiling back to march 73 yards to the Washington 5. There, Washington closed the gate on fourth down, took over at the 9 but fumbled the pitchout on the first play and Stanford's Joe Long grabbed the ball on the 10.
Fullback Bill Tarr, a Washington export from upstate Bellingham, slammed through the middle to tally on Stanford's first play.
Mike Raftery kicked a high, wobbly placement which was barely good and, although it seemed unimportant, it proved a point that saved Stanford from defeat.
Twice in the second quarter, Washington fought off Stanford threats, holding the Indians for downs on the 16 and again on the 10. Washington's Tom Procter marched 93 yards after the second half kickoff and failed to score when Stanford checked the threat on its own 2-yard line.

Isaac Logart Jumps With Ring Triumph

NEW YORK (AP)—Isaac Logart, who once fought a main event for \$150 in his native Cuba, today was headed for boxing's big money following his thrilling victory over experienced Gil Turner in Madison Square Garden.
A 25-year-old flash from Kid Gavilan's home province of Camaguey not only earned about \$5,000 for last night's 10-round unanimous decision but clinched a Dec. 2 date in the Garden against an opponent to be selected.
"I was the main event with Don Jordan who beat my rival in California, Virgil Akins, or have him fight Turner again," said Harry Markson, managing director of the International Boxing Club.
"The kid made a big hit and we want to use him often."
All three officials awarded that the thrilling slugfest by copping the feverishly paced last round. The whole fight hinged on the final heat and Ike earned it by beating his 25-year-old, heavier rival in several furious exchanges.
All three officials awarded that frame to Ike. Had it gone the other way, Turner would have won. Referee Al Berl and Judge Jack Gordon scored it 5-4-1 while Judge Joe Angello made it 6-4. The AP card had the Cuban in front, 5-4-1.
