

Sooners Roar Over Colorado; SM Victor

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — For three minutes in the second quarter Colorado lived in football heaven with a 14-0 lead over third-ranked Oklahoma Saturday. Then the Sooners exploded the dream with 21 points at halftime and wound up with a 56-21 victory to roll on undefeated in 24 straight games.

The game which keeps Oklahoma at the top of the Big Seven Conference was a crowd-raising thriller in the second quarter. Five touchdowns were scored in the same of the fastest, most exciting action ever seen by a partisan, overflow crowd of 59,000.

Oklahoma had figured on trouble from Colorado's big obstacle in the path of its eighth straight conference title—but nothing compared with what the Buffs started dishing out at the beginning of the contest with their single-wing formation.

Colorado turned two Oklahoma fumbles into touchdowns within five minutes of the second quarter in what appeared to be the making of the day's biggest football upset.

But the Sooners who had played listlessly in the first 20 minutes and didn't get past the 50, suddenly awakened like a sleeping giant annoyed by ants.

The Sooners brushed Colorado aside for three touchdowns in quick succession to take the 21-14 lead at the intermission.

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — Slashing halfback Don McIlhenny scored four touchdowns Saturday as opportunistic Southern Methodist, capitalizing on virtually every major break that came its way, whipped Kansas 33-14 in an intercollegiate football game played before about 20,000 spectators.

The prolific McIlhenny scored three times on plunges of a yard each and skirted left end for 12 yards for the other tally. Fullback Hal O'Brien dived a yard for the fifth Mustang score.

AMES, Iowa (AP) — A 39-yard field goal by Jim Rusher, Kansas State's rugged end, ruined Iowa State's homecoming Saturday.

The big fellow, booting in front of a favoring wind, sent the ball sailing over the uprights late in the third period for a 9-7 victory.

Uclans Outpower Iowa 33-13

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Iowa had more plays, more yardage and more first downs but UCLA won the game Friday night by a solid 33-13. The difference — heads-up play and a guy named Sam Brown.

The speedy Bruin fullback, who started the season a third stringer, scored three touchdowns, one on a 67-yard punt return, and averaged 6.81 yards for each of the 11 times he carried the ball.

Opinion was just about unanimous on Brown's value in the Bruin victory. UCLA coach Red Sanders, Iowa coach Forest Evashevski and Jerry Reichow, the Hawkeyes' brilliant quarterback and probably the outstanding Iowa on the field, all praised the 173-pound flyer.

"I thought Sam played real well," said the conservative Sanders who also had high praise for the blocking of fullback Bob Davernor. "Everybody would pick Brown," added Evashevski and Reichow added, "he was the big factor."

SEVEN CARRIES

Brown's other touchdowns came on plunges of two and four yards. He also set up the first Bruin score by moving 45 yards in seven carries.

His publicized replacement, Ronnie Knox, added another score with a seven-yard sweep and tossed a pass to end Hal Smith in the waning minutes on a play good for 75 yards.

Iowa made a tight game of it the first half and trailed only 13-7 at the midway point.

The first Hawkeye touchdown came as Reichow engineered a drive of 78 yards with Mike Hagler scoring from nine yards out. The other Iowa score came in the first quarter with Reichow plunging the final three after a march of 69 yards.

KNEE INJURY

Iowa played without the services of its giant guard and captain, Calvin Jones, who suffered a knee injury at Iowa City last Monday that was kept secret until shortly before the game. Evashevski was uncertain about his availability for the Michigan battle.

Right end Jim Freeman suffered a back injury and was hospitalized Friday night for X-rays to determine how badly he was hurt.

Halfback Eddie Vincent, kayoed on the opening kickoff, came back in the second half to turn in a 70-yard gallop from scrimmage. On the long run, Vincent was caught from behind by the Bruins' Chuck Hollaway and the dash went for naught as UCLA held.

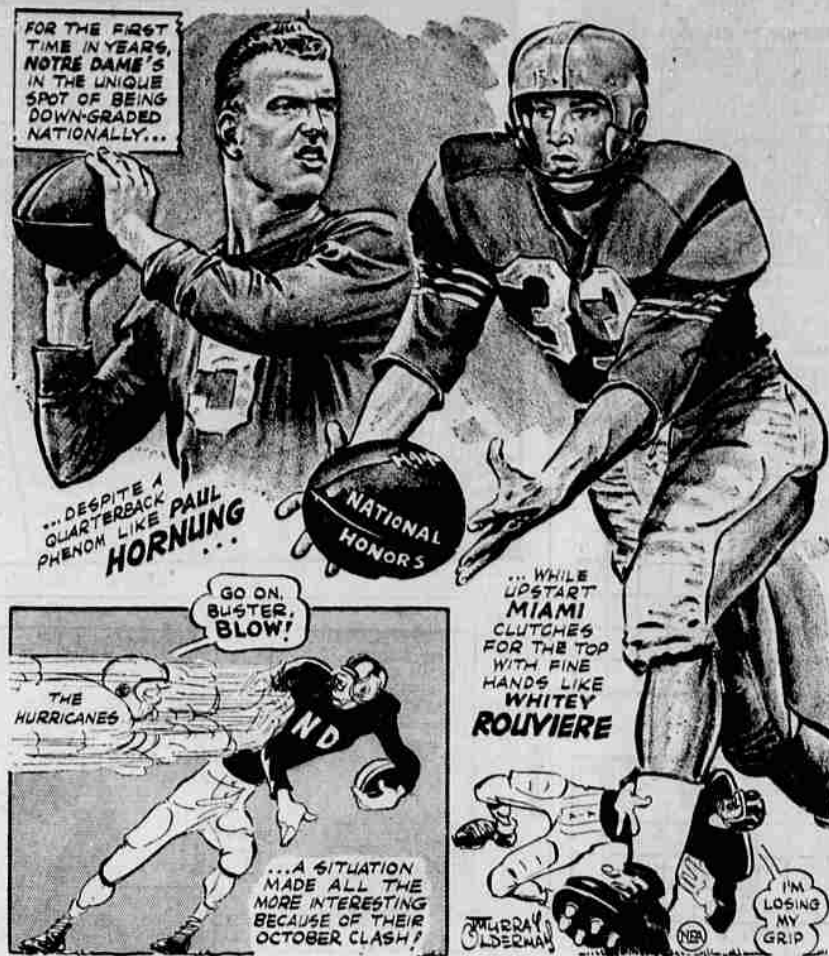
"UCLA has a very fine ball club with strength all the way," commented Evashevski. "There really was no turning point. It was just a case of them wearing us down. We felt we could swap them touchdowns but they showed a great defense. We moved too much between the 20-yard lines and not enough when we got close to their goal."

The Hawkeyes ran off 78 plays to 44 for the Bruins, gained 67 more yards—384-267—and had the edge in first downs 21-14.

Duke Beaten By Pitt

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — Pittsburgh's twice-beaten football team rose up to smash previously unbeaten Duke, the nation's fifth ranking team, 26-7, Saturday.

The Panthers held fumble-plagued Duke, the nation's fifth ranking rushing team to 92 yards on the ground and ran up 249 themselves as they spoiled Homecoming Day for a crowd of 31,000.

Pittsburgh's one-two quarterback punch of Pete Neft and Corney Salvaterra added enough aerial threat to round out Pitt's devastating attack.

MORGANTOWN, Va. (AP) — West Virginia passed its stiffest football test of the season Saturday as it came from behind to beat inspired Penn State, 21-7.

It was the only time in the history of a series dating back to 1904 that the eighth-ranked Mountaineers have defeated the Nittany Lions three years in a row. This was their most decisive victory by far, and WVU's fifth this season.

AUBURN, Ala. (AP) — Mighty Auburn, remembering its own days of hunger not so long ago, took pity on Furman Saturday but still emerged with a 52-0 football victory.

One-sided as it was, the margin would have been even greater if the undefeated Plainsmen had kept the pressure on throughout the game. Instead, Coach Ralph Jordan alternated his first, second and third teams playing sophomores much of the time.

ATLANTA (AP) — Georgia Tech unwrapped its passing game for the first time this season Saturday and mixed it with a strong ground attack to trounce ambitious but out-manned Florida State 34-0 in a football mismatch.

Tech Coach Bobby Dodd used his first two units to build a 20-0 lead and then emptied the bench to complete the rout before a shirt-sleeved crowd of about 30,000. It was Tech's fifth victory against one loss this year.

UNIVERSITY, Miss. (AP) — Full-

back Paige Cothren ripped the University of Arkansas line to shreds and used his skillful toe to lead the University of Mississippi to a 17-7 football victory Saturday.

Cothren scored 11 points on a touchdown, a field goal and two conversions to boost his season's scoring total to 44. He was the leading scorer in the Southeastern Conference when the game began.

ATHENS, Ga. (AP) — Baby-faced Gene Newton, a slick split-T operator and a fancy-dan runner, sprinted 49 yards for an early touchdown and guided Tulane to a 14-0 upset victory over Georgia in a Southeastern Conference football game Saturday.

Tulane stopped Georgia's touted air attack when it counted and the Bulldogs couldn't punch over a score on the ground.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — An alert Tennessee football team turned Dayton errors into touchdowns Saturday to route the Oilers 53-7.

SPORTS WORLD SHORTS

WASHINGTON (UP)—Halfback Leo Elter and end John Carson were listed today as "doubtful starters" on the Washington Redskins' offensive platoon for Sunday's National Football League game with the Baltimore Colts. Coach Joe Kuharich said only "they'll be in uniform — whether they can see action is unknown."

CARACAS, Venezuela (UP) — Chico Carrasquel, the Chicago White Sox' brilliant defensive short stop, will begin playing for Caracas in the Venezuelan League immediately — but as an outfielder.

Pablo Morales and Oscar Prieto, owners of the Caracas Club, said Chico would play the outfield because his brother Domingo and cousin Manuel, already are performing well as Caracas' double play combination.

GREENWOOD LAKE, N.Y. (UP) — Sugar Ray Robinson declared today that he would seek to "score a quick knockout over a weakened" Carl (Bobo) Olson in their middleweight title bout on Nov. 4. Robinson insisted the middleweight champion "would be weak from making the 160-pound weight limit."

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Connie Mack, the 92-year-old former owner and manager of the Philadelphia Athletics, was discharged Saturday from Presbyterian Hospital, just three weeks after he broke his right hip in a fall from his bed at home.

He was carried by stretcher from his hospital room to a waiting ambulance and driven to his home.

His physician said he did not know how long it would be before Mack would be up and around again.

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (UP) — Former Ohio State football player Dick Helinski was killed Friday night when the car in which he was riding swerved to avoid another car and crashed in an open field near here.

Police said Helinski was riding in a car driven by Sylvester J. Blake, Blake, who was treated for head injuries, told police an oncoming car crossed over the center line of the road and he lost control of his car when he swerved to avoid the other car.

Helinski, who lived in Euclid, Ohio, was a member of Ohio State's 1955 Rose Bowl team.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The sixth annual all pro bowl football game, featuring 60 selected players from Coliseum Jan. 15, managing announced Saturday.

Thirty players are chosen from each conference for the post-season classic. The Western Division holds a 3-2 lead in the series.

Selection of the players and rival coaches is withheld until the regular pro season is over.

Al Andrews, Superior, Wis., middleweight boxer, plays the accordion.

Wustin Laramie, San Jose State tackle, was selected to the Syracuse Herald All-New York State prep team for two years while attending Wilesboro High.

Alabama's highest football score was 110-0 against Marion Military Institute in 1922. The worst setback for Alabama was by 78-0 at the hands of Vanderbilt in 1906.

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Maryland, Navy Win

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (AP) — Powerful Maryland, ranked No. 2 in the nation, bolstered its chances of an Orange Bowl trip, Saturday by manhandling Syracuse 34-13 behind a solid line that opened the holes for Ed Vereb, Phil Perlo and Jack Healey.

Smashing over two touchdowns in the first period with Vereb blasting 6 yards for the first and Vereb throwing 17 yards to Russ Dennis for the second, Maryland was threatened seriously only once.

The Syracuse team that upset Army last week clicked for an eye-popping 30-yard touchdown pass from Mark Hoffman to Don Allhouse early in the second period but that strong Maryland line quickly closed the gap and helped Vereb score from the 3 for a first-half lead of 20-7.

It was all Maryland in the second half.

Maryland now has won six straight this season and 11 in a row over a two year span.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Unbeaten Navy, with star quarterback George Welsh on the bench, its bag of tricks in the locker room and a junior varsity quarterback

directing the attack, sailed to its fifth straight victory Saturday, smashing down-trodden Penn 33-0 before 34,543 fans at Franklin Field.

Coach Eddie Erdelatz, confident his deep squad could handle anything the peaceful Quakers could muster, used second and third string players most of the way and apparently ordered his quarterback to use nothing but simple run and pass plays.

Navy, the nation's fourth-ranking team, has a date with Notre Dame next week and seemed determined to keep Irish scouts in the dark.

WEST POINT, N. Y. (AP) — A churning 72-yard run by substitute Peter Lash highlighted a cascade of Army touchdowns which smothered fangless Columbia, 45-0, Saturday to break a two-game losing streak for the men of West Point.

After his fleet infantry troops had rolled to four touchdowns in the opening half, Coach Earl Blaik obviously called off the dogs and sought to show the Lions some mercy.

HANOVER, N. H. (AP) — Passing artist Bill Beagle tossed for one

touchdown and scored another as an injury-riddled, but spirited Dartmouth football team gained its first victory after four losses Saturday with a 14-9 upset over Harvard in the 59th game of an ancient Ivy League rivalry.

Beagle, a 6-foot, 170-pound senior who entered the game as the nation's top major college passer, turned in one of his top performances as he sparked the Indians to touchdowns in the second and fourth quarters.

THACA, N. Y. (AP) — The smooth power of Princeton's single wing attack overcame the Tigers' own mistakes and the individual brilliance of Billy de Graaf and Bo Roberson Saturday and Princeton rolled to a 26-20 victory over Cornell.

There wasn't much that was sensational about the Tigers' play except the crispness of their blocking and the consistency of their ground game. The big feature was the emergence of Sid Pinch as a first-rate tailback.

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — Colgate's fast-charging line shook Frank Nardulli loose on a 15-yard run early in the final period Saturday and he scored the touchdown that gave the Red Raiders a 7-0 triumph over Yale, the first defeat of the season for the losers.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Quarterback Eddie West playing with a fractured left thumb, paced the North Carolina State attack as the Wolfpack outdrove a fumbling Villanova University eleven 34-13 before 8,783 fans Saturday.

West, a rangy 196-pounder, passed for two of the Southern touchdowns and scored a pair on quarterback sneaks.
