Mrs. Worlow has eight daughters—and all of them were there with their families. Her only son, Jim, was also at the party from Rocky Point, and is pictured with her as she cut one of her birthday cakes.

The intervening years since her birth in Denmark and the open house on her 80th birthday have been busy ones for Mrs. Worlow—and, perhaps because they were so busy—the years themselves have rested lightly upon her—to the extent that it's difficult to reconcile her actual age with her "years younger" appearance.

She left Denmark when she was 11. Her parents brought her to Oregon, where she went to school in Medford and later to the (then) normal in Ashland.

In 1900 she married James Lindsey Worlow. In 1926, as his widow, she operated their sawmill on Bryant Mountain for a couple of years. After she sold the mill she lived in Malin. At present she lives most of the time with her daughter and son-in-law, Emma and Jack West at Wagonville—and by popular demand—divides her time with her other children and their families.

Her daughters, other than Allie and Emma, are Mayme (Mrs. Mickie) Wampler, Rocky Point; Charlotte (Mrs. Bob) Derra, San Francisco; Annie (Mrs. Jimmie) Pierce, Oakland, California; Oia (Mrs. Johnny) Vaughn, Sacramento; Lillian (Mrs. Johnny) Derra, Malin; and Zena (Mrs. Dick) Stevenson, also Malin. Individual tepes motifs marked the places and decorated the banquet tables and introduced the outdoor theme of the Indian decor used at the hall for the official visit.

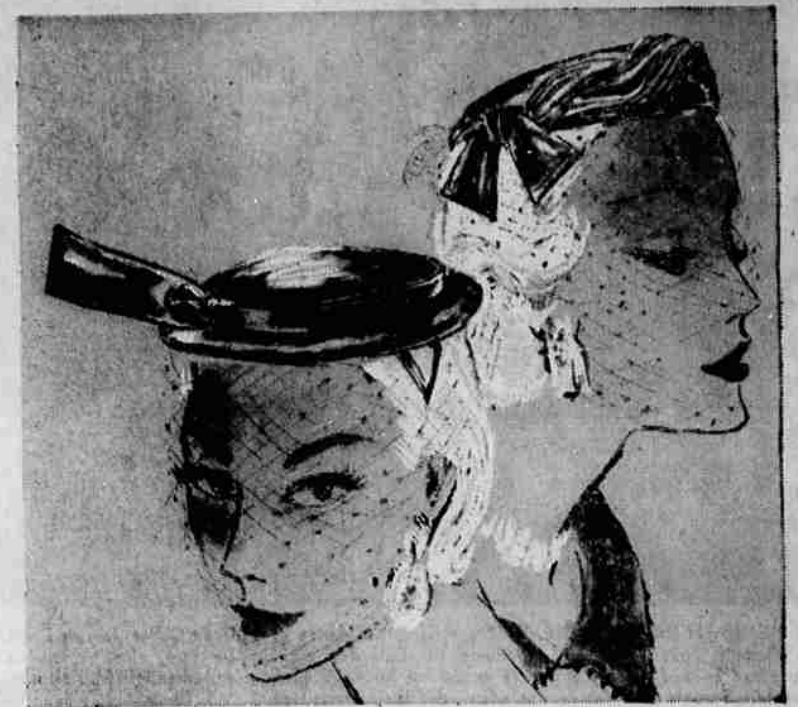
