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## Take it from me girls... stay Smart and Healthy

Halloween is nearly upon us. And any good homemaker is preparing for the day (or night), too. The best defense, in this case, of course, is a good offense. And by taking the offensive with treats for every witch and goblin which comes your way, you're bound to make some friends among the neighborhood kids, too.

Naturally you can't go all out for ALL the marauders that evening. So smart housewives stock up on simple items of candy and fruit which cost little but will let the children move on satisfied with their "haul" at your house.

Nickle candy bars — one for each child — will usually suffice. Or, perhaps to enhance the situation, a polished apple or an orange tossed in would help.

But then comes your own gang of goblins. They will demand — and should get — extra special attention.
