Pianists Plan KF Concert

Duo-pianists, Alfred and Herbert Teltschik, will be presented in concert Wednesday, October 26, at 8 p.m. in the Pelican Theater. The concert is the first of a series of four to be presented by the Klamath Community Concert Association. Now on their seventh sold-out tour of the country, the Austrian descent Teltschiks are described as possessors of a unique and thrilling talent, masters in the art of duo-pianistic precision. They had their earliest musical training under their father, an old-world musician in Floresville, Texas, where they were born. When the family moved to Houston, the boys continued their studies under Aldree Kidd, until they entered the Julliard School of Music. After graduation, they returned to Houston where each got married, and then they began to teach piano in the city's public schools and in their own studio. During World War II, the brothers were assigned to military orchestras and gave numerous two-piano recitals for the Armed Forces. This was the start of what is proving a successful career. To insure having two evenly matched pianos, the Teltschiks provide their own instruments, which they haul in a converted school bus. They carry an 88-key silent keyboard on which they can practice — without benefit of sound — whether in their bus or hotel room. For their Klamath Falls performance, the Teltschiks promise a program of universal and sustained interest, blending the familiar with the new and ingratiating.

Speed Zone Warning Given

DUNSMUIR—Larger speed zone signs and patrolling has not curbed speeding through Dunsmuir, according to a report from the chief of police to the Dunsmuir city council. The report stated that 83 speeding citations had been given between October 6 and 17. Judge A. A. Smith of the Dunsmuir judicial court stated that as many northbound motorists as southbound motorists had been cited. "It isn't the downgrade," he said, "it is the sight of four lanes of blacktop that sets them off." A recently completed four-lane freeway has magnified Dunsmuir's problems. Councilman Richard Renaud suggested that a letter be sent to the state division of highways requesting a 45-mile-per-hour speed limit sign to be posted at the city limits, a 35-mile sign 300 yards north of the present oversize sign and a 25-mile sign at the north end of the Sacramento River bridge. The council approved the suggestion. Mrs. Helen Hauff, hotel owner, asked for greater patrolling of the business district, with particular emphasis on speeding trucks. Following the recent inspection of installation of fire hydrants in north Dunsmuir, the Pacific Fire Rating bureau has been asked for an insurance rate revision. The council approved the writing of letters to all trucking firms making local deliveries informing them of a \$20 business license which is now required.
