Texas A&M Rated Biggest Surprise Team Of The Year

Texas A&M won't play in any bowl game this year but they will go down as the surprise of the 1955 college football season.

Most of the September hotshots have faded and the top teams are beginning to seek their own level. But the sophomore-laden Aggies, winners of only one game last year, persist in astounding their opposition in the Southwest Conference — perhaps the roughest league in the country.

Bear Bryant's lads were penalized by the Conference for recruiting too vigorously. They were barred from postseason competition this year. That didn't bother Bryant because even he thought his team was a year or two away.

The Aggies still have four SWC games on their schedule starting with Arkansas this Saturday. Then, on successive weeks, they play Southern Methodist, Rice and Texas. Nothing is certain, of course, in this upset-happy loop, but as George Sauer, whose Baylor club took a 19-7 pasting last Saturday, said:

"I don't see who can stop them." No provision has been made by the conference for a substitute team to act as host in the Cotton Bowl New Year's Day, so if the Aggies win the title there will be some hasty executive sessions.

Most of the other conferences

are going according to form with the possible exception of the Southeastern. Auburn, one of the remaining major unbeatens, is riding atop the standings, and Georgia Tech, the favorite, is no better than fourth.

The only hope the Ramblin' Wrecks have of coming out on top is for Mississippi State to whip Auburn this week. Tech, of course, then would have to go through the rest of its slate unbeaten. State, with a 5-1 mark, could prove a problem in Auburn.

Here's how the other major conferences stand:

Pacific Coast—UCLA, the choice, is riding high, the only unbeaten team in league play. Beaten only by Maryland, they have clear sailing until Nov. 19, when they play Southern California in a game that could decide the title.

Big Ten—Michigan, another favorite, is out front, but its 14-13 squeaker over Minnesota Saturday gave a measure of encouragement to Ohio State, which all but eliminated Wisconsin 26-16. Michigan and Ohio State meet Nov. 19, and that could decide the crown.

Big seven—Oklahoma took care of Colorado, the only team figured to give it a run, 58-21. The Sooners now have won 21 in a row and the end isn't in sight.

Atlantic Coast Conference—Maryland seems certain to sail through undefeated and untied and play Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl.

Ivy League—Yale was rated No. 1 at the start but has been unable to shake Princeton. They're tied for the lead and meet Nov. 12. Yale toppled from the undefeated ranks Saturday via a 7-0 defeat by Colgate.

Southern Conference—West Virginia, No. 6 in the country, is tied for lead with little Davidson, each with 3-0. They don't meet, and since Davidson has two more league games to play against one for West Virginia, the Wildcats could win it.

The big game this week will pit unbeaten, untied Yale against once-defeated Notre Dame. The Middies played under wraps in crushing Penn 33-0 Saturday by way of confusing the Notre Dame scouts in Franklin Field.

The Irish rebounded from their defeat by Michigan State by clubbing Purdue 22-7.

This year's picture is reversed, Iowa, with nothing to lose and everything to gain, will be out to avenge last year's defeat and dump the Wolverines from the ranks of the unbeaten.

Michigan, after squeaking by falcons Northwestern and Minnesota on consecutive Saturdays, then must face Illinois, Indiana and Ohio State after Iowa to win the right to represent the Big Ten in the Rose Bowl.

Michigan State and Wisconsin, both with 2-1 Big Ten records, will be out to eliminate each other from further championship consideration at Camp Randall stadium.

Michigan State's 21-7 triumph over Illinois established the Spartans as favorites after Ohio State maintained its record of never losing to an Ivy Williamson-coached team. Wisconsin's 26-16 loss to the Buckeyes was an "almost fatal" blow to the Badgers' Rose Bowl dreams.

The Badgers must now win all their remaining games and hope that Michigan loses twice to keep their Rose Bowl hopes flickering. Michigan hasn't appeared in the post-season battle since 1951 while Wisconsin went in 1953.

In other games Saturday, Purdue (11-1) will travel to Illinois (1-2) and Northwestern (0-2) will be at Ohio State (2-0).

Indiana will entertain Ohio University and Southern California will travel to Minnesota in non-conference activity.

Sooners Using Passing Attack

NORMAN, Okla. (AP)—Oklahoma is famous for its devastating ground game but this season the Sooners are cashing in on a deadly air attack. It's been a potent weapon in five victories.

They have completed 24 of 43 passes for 393 yards and a percentage of 55.8. They've thrown an average of 8.6 passes per game.

Only one pass has been intercepted. That was by Corky Coit of Pittsburgh, who hauled in one of quarterback Jim Harris' throws. He was nailed in his tracks.

Halfback Tommy McDonald has been Oklahoma's best passer as well as its rushing leader and top scorer. He has completed 10 of 13 passes for 156 yards.

The Sooners have scored only two touchdowns on passes and both of these were thrown by Billy Sturm of Muskogee, Okla., who runs the third team. However, they have taken to the air to set up numerous touchdowns.

Rams Hold Top Pro West Spot

LOS ANGELES (UP)—The Los Angeles Rams held undisputed first place in the National Football League's Western Division today after downing the Detroit Lions, 24-13, before 68,690 fans in Memorial Coliseum.

The Rams, in scoring the victory, rolled up their fourth win in five starts this season. The winless Lions, plagued by injuries and minus the services of star passer Bobby Layne, remained in the cellar.

The Rams played what was considered their best all-around game of the season thus far, rolling up 353 yards offensively and scoring two touchdowns and four field goals.

Norman Van Brocklin played his best game of the season, his completed 17 of 23 passes for 263 yards and two touchdowns. On five punts, Van Brocklin averaged 51.40 yards. He's the league leader in punting.

But it was Maryland rookie Ron Walker who stole the show with his spectacular running. He carried the ball 132 yards on 16 attempts for a 7.9 average. His teammates presented him with the game ball in recognition of his outstanding performance.

Larry C. Gilmer who replaced Layne in the Lions' passing department came through in fine style, but he was unable to tip the scales in favor of Detroit. He tossed 25 passes, completing 21 for a total of 233 yards.

Lion Coach Buddy Parker said Layne would return to play next week. But Parker has some bad news, too—Dorner Dibble, former Michigan State end, suffered a badly sprained ankle against Los Angeles.

Parker praised the Rams as "a better team this week than when we met them in Detroit two weeks ago."

"The sad fact about this league is that one team is not going to go on winning forever," he said.

Ram Coach Sid Gillman praised Walker, saying, "It certainly is tough in this league for a rookie to break in as he has."

Paul Brown and Otto Graham today credited savage play by the Cleveland Colts' defensive line with the 41-10 victory over the Green Bay Packers that affected the leadership in both divisions of the National Football League.

The key triumph Sunday at Cleveland enabled the champion Browns to remain tied with the surprising Pittsburgh Steelers for the Eastern Division lead. It also helped the Los Angeles Rams take undisputed first place in the Western Division. The Browns, Steelers and Rams have 4-1 records.

Los Angeles, Green Bay and the Baltimore Colts started the day tied for the Western lead. The Rams whipped the Detroit Lions, 24-13, and took the undisputed lead when Green Bay lost and the Washington Redskins upset Baltimore, 14-13. Green Bay and Baltimore now are second in the West with 3-2 marks.

Pittsburgh was an underdog for the fifth straight time but edged the New York Giants, 19-17. In the other games, the Chicago Bears upset the San Francisco Forty-Niners, 34-23, and the Chicago Cardinals tied the Philadelphia Eagles, 24-24.

Coach Brown and quarterback Graham praised their team's defensive line after it shuttled Packers' passer Tobin Rohe before 51,342 Cleveland fans celebrating the club's 10th anniversary in professional football.

Quarterback Ed Littleton scored both Redskins TDs to ruin the day for 51,397 — Baltimore's largest pro football crowd. Billy Mann's scoring heavy to Don Snider in the first minutes enabled the Cardinals to tie the Eagles before 24,620 Chicago spectators.

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Old Pros Head List This Year

Pro football fans in Cleveland and Los Angeles can be glad Otto Graham and Crazy Legs Hirsch aren't the retiring type.

The two old pros called it quits at the end of last season, then changed their minds. Today their clubs are leading the National Football League.

True, the surprising Pittsburgh Steelers are keeping pace with Cleveland in the Eastern Conference, but they were far less impressive yesterday in a 19-17 victory over the New York Giants than the Browns were in walloping Green Bay 41-10.

Graham, completing 7 of 12 passes for 187 yards, guided the Browns on touchdown marches of 74, 97 and 71 yards and scored once himself.

Hirsch took a pass from Norm Van Brocklin for the winning touchdown in Los Angeles' 24-13 victory over the toothless Detroit Lions. By winning, the Rams emerged from a three-way tie for the Western Conference lead as the Packers were beaten and Washington edged Baltimore 14-13 on Vic Janowicz's accurate conversion kicking.

The Chicago Bears won their second straight after a miserable start as Ed Brown ran for two touchdowns and passed for a third in a 24-23 victory over the San Francisco 49ers.

Philadelphia, the September champion, Cleveland for the Eastern crown, was left with a 1-2-1 mark after a 24-24 tie with the Chicago Cardinals. Cleveland and Pittsburgh are 4-1 with seven games to go.

Although the Green Bay-Cleveland game was close on the scoreboard for three quarters, the statistics tell a far different story. Cleveland rolled up 454 yards while their hard-hitting defensive platoon held the Packers to 161. A 100-yard kickoff return by Al Carmichael supplied Green Bay's only touchdown.

Al Carmichael ran a second quarter kickoff 100 yards for the longest scoring run of the season and Fred Conkle kicked a 27-yard field goal for the Packers points.

Touchdowns by Graham, Fred Morrison and Maurice Banet plus 33 and 34 yard field goals by Lou Groza earned Green Bay's first and second quarter leads and gave Cleveland a 27-10 margin. George Patterson replaced Graham in the last three minutes and threw TD passes to Dub Jones and Pete Brewster to make it a rout.

Norm Van Brocklin's 47-yard pass to Elroy Hirsch and rookie Ron Walker's 21-yard run gave the Rams two fourth quarter TDs and Detroit its fifth defeat before 68,700 Los Angeles fans. Coach Sid Gillman said he was pleased with his Rams because their first string backfield of Dan Towler, Tank Younger and Skeet Quinlan is "still just a rumor" because of injuries.

A quarter of 27,000 New York fans saw the Colts score the winning TD for the Steelers on a five-yard end run. Quarterback Ed Brown scored twice and threw a scoring pass to Bill McCall to lead the Bears to victory before 58,201 Forty-Niners' followers.

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College Football Picture Sees Michigan In Tough Spot; Maryland In Clear

Michigan, its hold on the No. 1 national ranking among college football teams shaken by a narrow squeak victory over Minnesota, found today that a schedule fraught with peril lies just ahead—in contrast to the rosy prospects facing Maryland and Oklahoma.

The Wolverines were glad to settle for a 13-13 decision over Minnesota, thanks to an extra-point conversion by Jimmy Van Pelt.

But now they must face Iowa's revenge-bent Hawkeyes next Saturday, a team knocked out of the Big Ten running by Michigan last year and anxious to pay that back with interest. If the Wolverines survive this threat, they still must hurdle Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio State to achieve an unbeaten season.

Not so far for Maryland, the nation's No. 2 team, or for third-ranked Oklahoma.

Not only did both of these mighty eleven win impressively on Saturday—Maryland showing no mercy in a 24-13 victory over Syracuse and Oklahoma showing dazzling power in coming from behind to crush Colorado, 56-21—but their remaining schedules hold no terrors to compare with Michigan's. Both teams now are favored to go the rest of the way unbeaten.

The only team among the nation's "top ten" to lose this weekend was seventh-ranked Duke. The Blue Devils were jolted into seven fumbles as they bowed to Pittsburgh, 26-7—Pitt's revenge for that famous 1938 defeat pinned on a Pitt powerhouse by a Duke team led by Eric Tipton.

Among the other major upset victims of the weekend were Yale, whipped 7-0 by Colgate on Frank Nardulli's fourth-period touchdown; Wisconsin, beaten 26-16, by Ohio State; and Boston College, a 13-point favorite forced to settle for a 13-13 tie against Marquette on Friday night.

Yale, Colorado, Duke, Boston College, and San Jose State (which lost to Colgate of the Pacific, 14-7) were knocked from the list of major unbeaten teams. Left are only six teams—Maryland, Oklahoma, Michigan, West Virginia, Holy Cross, and Navy.

Navy must risk that record this week against Notre Dame, a team that rebounded from its loss to Michigan State to beat Purdue impressively, 22-7.

Among other leading individual stars this weekend were:

John Patluck, Pitt's 220-pound end who played in Duke's backfield all day to disrupt Blue Devil plays and also set up a touchdown with a brilliant pass catch; Roy Fendren of Texas, who gained 145 yards in 11 carries, including a 50-yard touchdown sweep, to lead a 32-14 win over Rice; Don McIlhenry of SMU, who scored four touchdowns in a 34-14 victory over Kansas; Bill Beagle of Dartmouth, the nation's leading passer, who tossed one TD pass and ran for another score in 144 yards over Harvard; Jack Pardon of Texas A&M, who scored two touchdowns and ground out 81 yards rushing in 19-7 win over Baylor; Earl Morrall of Michigan State, who passed to two touchdowns in 21-7 win over Illinois; and Gene Newton of Tulane, who ran 49 yards for one touchdown and eight for another in 14-0 win over Georgia; Bobby Moss of West Virginia, who ran to two touchdowns in 21-7 victory over Penn State; Jack Stephens of Holy Cross, who passed for one TD and ran for another in 20-12 win over Boston University; Bill Tarr, who carried the ball 27 times with an average gain of 4.3 yards to lead underdog Stanford to a 7-7 tie of Washington; and Jon Arnett of Southern California, who ran to three touchdowns in a 33-4 victory over California.

The directors agreed to require league members to post a performance bond to guarantee completion of the playing schedule, but put off formal approval until Nov. 20. A bond of \$5000 or \$7500 has been proposed.

The directors also voted to increase the league assessment from \$1000 to \$1500, and fixed the player limit at 15, including men from the armed services.

National awards for scoring top points in hydroplane races throughout the year were given two racers, George Montz, Hayward, Calif., won in the 48-cubic-inch racer class and Ed Fletcher, Bell, Calif., in the E racing runabout division.
