Defense Department Takes Blame For Senators' Plane

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department says it—and not two independent Democratic senators—is responsible for a \$10,000 special plane flight to bring them home from Europe. The Pentagon put out its public apology yesterday not long after Senators McClellan (D-Ark.) and Stennis (D-Miss.) stepped off a regularly scheduled Military Air Transport Service plane from Paris. McClellan and Stennis bridled at reports they had demanded special treatment. Earlier, the Defense Department had said it dispatched a 48-passenger plane to pick up the touring Senate Appropriations Committee members at Madrid because it didn't have regular transport from that area on the dates the senators wanted to return. The new Pentagon statement said that at the request of Sen. Chavez (D-N.M.), another Appropriations Committee member who plans to fly back from Europe Nov. 3, a special flight planned to fetch him has been canceled. Chavez said last week he had requested nothing by way of a special flight. The round-trip costs for the two big four-engine craft had been estimated at \$20,000. McClellan suggested to newsmen

Stevenson Lauds UN Progress

CHICAGO (AP)—The United Nations during its first 10 years has shown "vitality and survival power," says Adlai E. Stevenson. Stevenson, 1952 Democratic presidential nominee and outgoing U.N. delegate, predicted that history will say of the first 10 years of the U.N. "that mankind has stood closer to the brink of annihilation and also moved farther in the direction of peace—than in any decade in civilization's history." "Scores of nations and myriads of men have learned in these 10 years the methods of cooperation," the former Illinois governor told some 500 persons at a United Nations awards luncheon Monday.

Giant Skeletons Found in Italy

TURIN, Italy (AP)—One of the reasons for Hannibal's early successes against Roman legions 2,100 years ago may have been soldiers seven feet tall. Excavations made of Pecetto Hill, three miles from here, have uncovered an ancient Roman town, skeletons of men and horses and what apparently was part of a temple. Seven of the skeletons indicated that the men were seven feet tall of an African race. If they were Carthaginian followers of Hannibal, as some antiquities experts believe, it would partially explain Carthage's conquests in the second Punic War, 218-201 B.C. Hannibal's forces wiped out a Roman force at Placentia (Battle of Trebia) before slaughtering another Roman army at Lake Trasimeno and then routing Rome's Fabius at the Battle of Cannae.

Oldsmobile Announce Retail Deliveries

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Oldsmobile which sold 636,732 passenger cars in the 1955 model year expects to boost its retail deliveries to approximately 700,000 in the 1956 model year. The 1956 Oldsmobile line which will go on dealer display Nov. 3, were shown at a press preview Tuesday. Engineering and styling details of the new cars were withheld until this public presentation. So, too, were the probable prices.

Moroccan Politicos Offered Chance To Show Leadership

RABAT, French Morocco (AP)—Moroccan politicians are finally getting their chance to show if they can bring peace and home rule to this troubled country. Political firebrands, bomb throwers and guerrilla fighters have held the spotlight recently in North Africa. Now it remains to be seen if men armed only with briefcases and typewriters can do a better job. France has removed one of the major obstacles. It ousted unpopular Sultan Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafat, whom the French themselves had virtually placed on the throne. In a new building next to his Rabat palace, a four-man Council of the Throne has taken over. The next step is to set up Morocco's first representative government as a move toward home rule. Whether they succeed depends to a great extent on the peace and quiet the bomb throwers allow them. Men who look to violence as the means to win freedom are doing their best to make them fail. Violence has a great appeal in North Africa, where history tells of little but conquest after conquest and the ultimate defeats of each by fierce local resistance. In Tunisia, the easternmost area of French North Africa, months of guerrilla warfare ended with the beginning of talks on home rule, which now is well under way. The Algerian rebels have been particularly violent, because the French insist Algeria is part of France itself and will listen to no talk of independence. Morocco seems to have calmed down for the moment but the calm may not last. Moroccans generally will admit

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP)—Faced with a demand by Negroes for integrated beach facilities, the Sarasota County Commission has suspended all plans for additional public beaches until May 1. The commission also said in effect yesterday that all public county beaches will be sold to private owners after that date if Negroes do not accept a segregated beach. Beaches now in operation will stay open until then.

A-Plan Hopes Expressed

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI)—United Nations officials expressed firm hope today that unanimous agreement could be reached on formation of an international agency to control peaceful uses of atomic energy. The United Nations' 60-nation main Political Committee resumed debate on plans to constitute such an agency. Committee Chairman Sir Leslie Knox Munro of New Zealand called Monday's meeting to give delegations an opportunity for full consultation in efforts to reach agreement on a resolution. Chief objection to the American proposal was that it provided that negotiations for creating the agency should be carried on outside the United Nations. In the main political committee, the United States, with strong Western support, pushed for adoption of a resolution calling for an international conference to set up an atomic energy agency. The General Assembly's special political committee moves forward this morning with its annual debate on South African racial segregation, confronted by the second walkout of this session. South Africa's W. C. Du Plessis led his four-member delegation from the committee room Monday after announcing that his government would take no part in the debate. But it was a "limited" walkout. Du Plessis reserved his country's
