"I wish now that I hadn't," he said at a news conference Monday. "I did not know about the availability of the atomic bomb and the success of our orthodox bombing against the Japanese homeland."

Gen. Wedemeyer was commander in China-India-Burma during World War II.

Navy To Call Coal Bids

Sealed bids in triplicate will be received at the U.S. Navy Purchasing Office, temporary D building, Room 148, Fourth and Independence Avenue, Southwest, Washington 25, D.C. until 10:30 a.m. Eastern Standard Time, November 1. Bids will be publicly opened at that time. The invitation number is JPB-434-392-56.

Bidders will be asked to deliver 2,000 tons of bituminous coal to be delivered in lots of 800 tons in December, 400 tons each in January, February, and March.

Lugo Brothers Waive Hearing

Two Sprague River brothers accused of a brutal attack on a 64-year-old ranch worker, waived preliminary hearing late Monday when arraigned before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor on charges of assault with a dangerous weapon.

The defendants are Alfred Lugo, 26, and his brother, Leonard, 17. The complaint against them was issued by District Attorney Richard Beesley who said they beat and knifed Shelby Lawver at his home in Sprague River Sunday.

Judge Van Vactor ordered the brothers held for the county grand jury. They were remanded to the county jail in lieu of \$2,000 bail each.

Pacific Northwest Utilities Move Toward Local Needs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Electric utilities in the Pacific Northwest - public and private - moved steadily on paper this year toward their goal of meeting regional power needs, a check of Federal Power Commission records showed Tuesday.

Pending applications for hydroelectric development in the Oregon-Washington-Idaho area propose slightly fewer kilowatts than at a comparable period last year. More of them, however, are nearer the consumer.

Of 6,123,740 kilowatts involved in the various applications, 2,630,000 are at the stage where the commission is being asked to issue licenses for dam construction. This compares with but 803,000 kilowatts ready for license of the 6,123,740 kilowatt potential pending before the commission on Sept. 1, 1954.

Outstanding preliminary permits - holders of which get a priority on a site while conducting engineering studies - account currently for another 3,051,240 kilowatts as compared with 2,804,740 kilowatts in the same category last year.

The increase in outstanding preliminary permits and license applications shows sharply in the comparative figures for applications seeking preliminary permits. Such applications account for only 442,500 kilowatts at the present time, as compared with 2,485,000 kilowatts at last year's check.

The 1955 figures do not include the 783,000 kilowatts involved in the commission's recent issuance of a license to Idaho Power Co. for construction of the controversial Hells Canyon, Brownlee and Oxbow Dams on the Snake River; or the 345,000 kilowatt Tacoma project at Mossyrock and May-

field and Portland General Electric Co.'s 108,000-KWPelton project, both long delayed by court actions.

Several of the pending cases are nearing an early decision.

Major of these is the application by Grant County (Wash) Public Utility District No. 2 for a license to build Priest Rapids and Wanapum dams on the Columbia River.

With the initial installed generating capacity of 1,170,000 KW, the two dams would cost an estimated \$49 million dollars plus the transmission systems.

In another case a commission examiner last week recommended a license be issued the city of Eugene, Ore., to build the 30,000 KW Beaver Marsh project on the

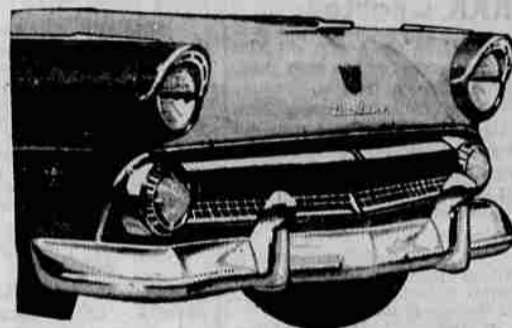
