

Scholarships Listed By Firm

Sons and daughters of employees of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company have until January 15 to file application for collegiate scholarships provided by funds of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Foundation. It was reported here today.

Winners are selected from those applying by the Weyerhaeuser Scholarship Board, made up of persons who are not in any way employed by the timber firm.

Ten scholarships are given each year to high school seniors, and scholarships may be renewed for sophomore, junior and senior students whose academic performance meets the requirements established.

Winners may receive up to \$1,200 per year, and may attend any accredited university.

Highway Test Results Given

BOISE, Idaho (AP)—A committee of the Western Assn. of Highway Officials has released its findings on a 370-day test completed last year on an experimental highway in Southeastern Idaho.

And the committee calls for thicker road surfacing, paved highway shoulders, said a heavy tandem axle-load does no more damage to a road than a lighter single axle load, and decided frost and spring thaws will damage pavement no matter how thick it is.

A report listing the findings was issued Tuesday by Earle V. Miller, Idaho's state highway engineer and chairman of WAHO's road test advisory committee.

"Highway engineers will have a much clearer picture of effects of traffic and loads and will now be able to design highways with more of an objective and analytical goal rather than on supposition," Miller said, adding:

"Many of the things that were proven by this test have been submitted by engineers and others but the findings now verify much of our thinking of the past."

The test was financed by highway departments of California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Texas, Wyoming and Alaska. Miller said copies of the report would be sent to state highway departments throughout the country.

He said a complete review of the findings will be presented Nov. 4 at a meeting of the Council of State Governments in Denver.

Suit Claims Wife, Profits Gone

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Walter Desmond says while he was interned in China his partner took not only their importing business but also his wife.

The Japanese held Desmond in 1938 and the Communists from 1947 through 1953, he asserted in a suit filed yesterday seeking to dissolve the partnership with Jack Zatulovsky and force an accounting of profits.

When Desmond returned to the United States, he said, Zatulovsky refused him a share in the firm's profits. The partner had also married Desmond's ex-wife, who had divorced Desmond in 1937 while he was in China, the suit added.

Horses Get Loose, Roam Freeway

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Several horses belonging to the famed Riders of the Andes from Chile broke loose from the Cow Palace last night and galloped down busy Bayshore Freeway into South San Francisco.

They were quickly rounded up by sheriff's deputies, police and highway patrolmen. Their regular riders were then driven down to ride them back.

The horses escaped through a gate temporarily left open for livestock. Their absence went unnoticed for about five minutes. Coca Cola, the prize horse of the troop, led the runaways.

The Riders of the Andes, a mounted drill team, are here for the Grand National Livestock Show opening Friday.

Inspector Eugene Osuna said the gang is suspected of stealing more than \$35,000 in loot from parked automobiles, mostly those of tourists parked near Fisherman's Wharf, the Cliff House and Fisherman's Wharf.

Osuna said Floyd Austin, 22, a seaman, admitted being ringleader of the gang.

Collier Okays Lift Contract

A contract with the Heron Engineering Company of Denver, Colorado, has been approved by Senator Randolph Collier, chairman of the Mount Shasta Chair Lift Development Committee, according to George R. Shrader, executive secretary.

This contract calls for the Heron Manufacturing Company to make a thorough engineering survey of the Mount Shasta Ski Bowl terrain, location of possible lift lines and a study of snow depth, slides, weather conditions and other data pertinent to the construction of a chair lift in the area.

The approved contract was sent air mail last Saturday. It is expected that the Heron Company engineering staff will be in the area in a very few days.

These engineering studies and other administrative costs are being underwritten by businessmen in Mount Shasta, Dunsuir, Weed, Yreka and Redding. Shrader stated that he believed the \$5,000 which the Mount Shasta Chair Lift Development Committee agreed to raise for preliminary engineering and administration will be raised within the week.

Actual fund raising started Friday, October 21, and to date four thousand dollars has been received.

Dunsuir Mart Slates Opening

DUNSMUIR — Caruso's supermarket will open on Thursday, October 27, according to Edgar Link and Tony S. Caruso, partners in the new enterprise. The 18,000-foot market of concrete and steel has been under construction since mid-summer about six miles north of Dunsuir. The location was selected to serve Dunsuir, Mount Shasta and McCloud.

It will be a complete shopping center under one roof. Link explained. There will be 65 feet of pre-cut meat selection, 65 feet of frozen food cabinets, a complete grocery, meat and produce store plus a thrift shop of hardware and sundry items including a shoe department.

Argel Ackley, formerly of Medford, will manage the meat department. Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Ager, formerly of Klamath Falls, will manage the grocery and thrift store.

There are parking accommodations for over 100 cars. Link explained. He recently sold his supermarket in Medford to engage in this new venture. His partner, Caruso, comes from San Francisco where he was in the wholesale vegetable business.

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Miller Marks 20th Year

Dick B. Miller Sr. marks his 20th year as the Klamath Falls General Motors dealer for Cadillac and Oldsmobile with the introduction this week of the 1956 Cadillac and the showing on November 3 of the 1956 Oldsmobile.
