Lake Uranium Report Given

LAKEVIEW — Dr. Garth W. White King and the Lucky Lass Thorns, of Thorns Bros. Mines, which Thorns have leased.

Thorns states they expect to work in the area until heavy storms prevent drilling. He said, "No definite report can be made as yet on the core drilling but our findings so far are more than satisfactory."

Tests were made from pulp run through the sampling plant at Murray, Utah. The buyer of the Lakeview ore is Vitro Uranium Company of Salt Lake City. The Lakeview Mining Company, which is owned by the Thorns Brothers, now has twelve employees with office headquarters in the Marius Theater building. Two core drilling crews are operating at the

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
