### Boxcar Board Seeks Action

SALEM (AP) — The Governor's Emergency Transportation Committee, which has been trying to solve Oregon's box car shortage, has recommended that punitive action be taken against railroads and shippers.

It authorized Lloyd C. Mason, Salem, who is the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation's representative on the committee, to represent the committee next Monday at a meeting of the U. S. Senate Agriculture Committee.

Mason will tell of the Oregon committee's recommendation that congress pass a law to enable the Interstate Commerce Commission to charge penalty rental rates against railroads which are forced to use cars owned by other lines because they don't build enough of their own.

The recommendation also includes a proposal to penalize railroads which don't repair their freight cars fast enough.

In the other action, the committee recommended that the ICC penalize shippers who hold cars more than 72 hours. This also would apply to recipients of freight who don't unload within that time.

The committee approved the action of its counsel, Clifford W. Ferguson, in opposing the effort by Eastern railroads to get a bigger share of receipts from transcontinental freight shipments.

Ferguson, who is state supervisor of rail transportation, said that if the Eastern roads are successful, it would cut the Southern Pacific's revenue in half, and make it impossible for the SP to carry out its program of building new freight cars.

### CDA Announces Potato Order

SACRAMENTO (UP)—The California Department of Agriculture announced today it had issued a marketing order for Long White potatoes, as amended, for the

written approval of producers and handlers.

The amended order differs from one that has been in effect since November, 1953, by providing for an advisory board of eight producers and three handlers, rather than 16 producers and three handlers.

It provides also the authority for regulating Long White potatoes for fresh table use only, whereas the current order provides for regulation of all Long White potatoes. The new order also would ease maturity requirements on Long White potatoes.

### Former Convict Faces Charge

Sheriff Murray Britton said Wednesday that Kenneth Lee Wells, alias "Dusty" Roads, former Oregon and Idaho prison inmate, wanted here on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, has been apprehended in Dorris.

According to Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon, Wells, who was released two weeks ago from Idaho State Prison, assaulted James W. George during a fight Saturday night in front of a South Sixth Street dance hall.

In a complaint issued by Deputy District Attorney Robert Nichols it is charged that at the time of the attack on George, the defendant was armed with a knife.

In 1951, Wells was sentenced to three years in Oregon State Prison after his conviction for larceny in Klamath County. Later he was sentenced to the state prison in Idaho for forgery.

California officials said Wells agreed to waive extradition and would return voluntarily to face the assault charge here.
