**THE ART OF GRINDING MEAL** between two stones is becoming a lost art among the Indian tribes of the North American continent. A few women of the Klamath reservation know the almost musical rhythm that cuis wocus seed into edible food. The ground meal is cooked as a cereal after the hulls have been broken by grinding, winnowed by wind or washed away by water, leaving the kernel of the seed which resembles wheat. The seed is first parched to make the hulls brittle. In the old days it was parched between hot stones. Today, the oven of a stove serves for the preparation. Nora Hawk (above) of the Klamath Agency, demonstrated the method of grinding at the recent opening of the Klamath County Museum. Fannie Jackson, also of the Agency, is noted for the fine rhythm she uses while grinding. Mrs. Blanche Jones and Mrs. Olivia Kirk who are considered to be noteworthy basket weavers, were also present for the museum opening.

### Moon Relates 'Jungle' Fight

An alleged robbery which climaxed a hobo jungle wine party was described in District Judge D. E. Van Vactor's court Wednesday during a preliminary hearing for two men charged with the crime.  
 James Moon, 29-year-old farm laborer, claimed Antonio Salas, 48, and Thomas P. Griffith, 40, took \$7 from him through force in a hobo jungle three miles south of Klamath Falls.  
 Moon's charges were corroborated by Clarence Waldrop, 51-year-old Portland laborer, who said he saw the alleged robbery. All of

the witnesses at the hearing agreed that a half gallon of wine had been consumed before Moon was supposed to have been relieved of his money.  
 At the conclusion of the hearing, Judge Van Vactor informed Deputy District Attorney P. K. Puckett, who prosecuted the case, that he would render judgment later. The judge ordered the defendants and complaining witnesses

held in the county jail until he decides the case.

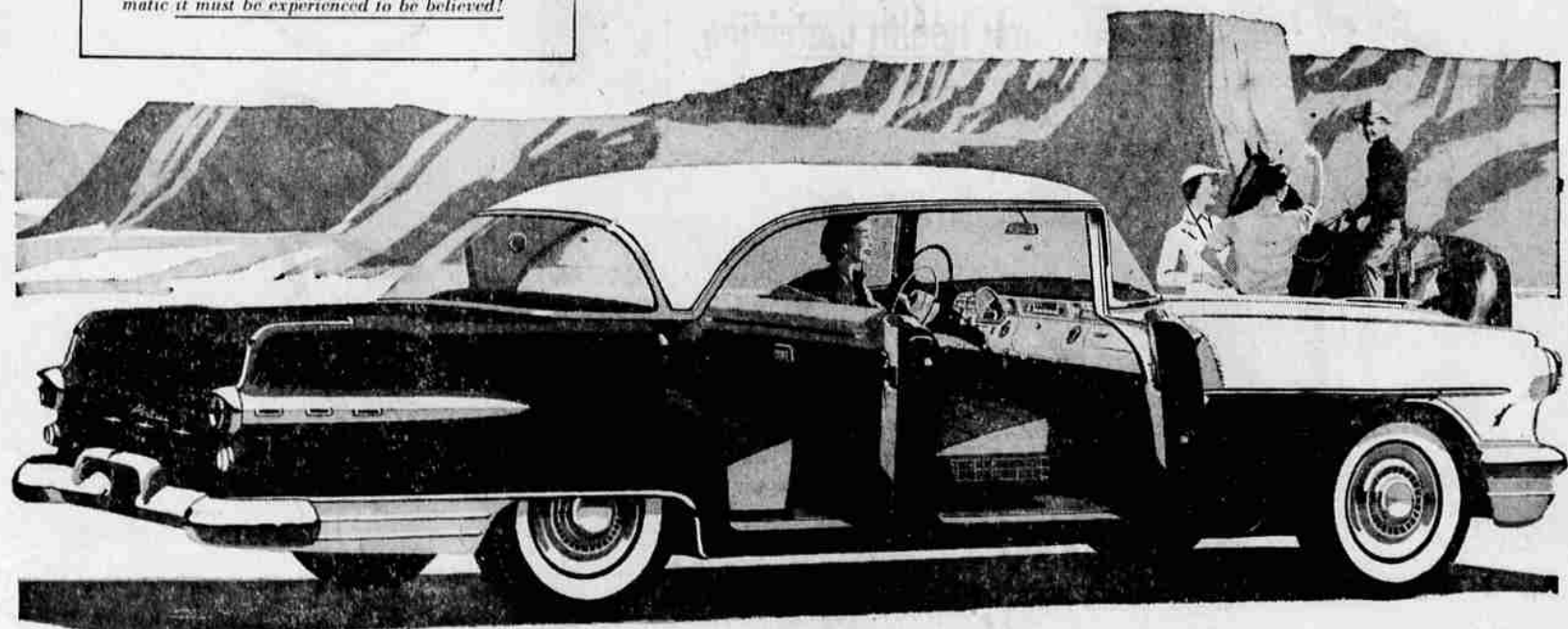
