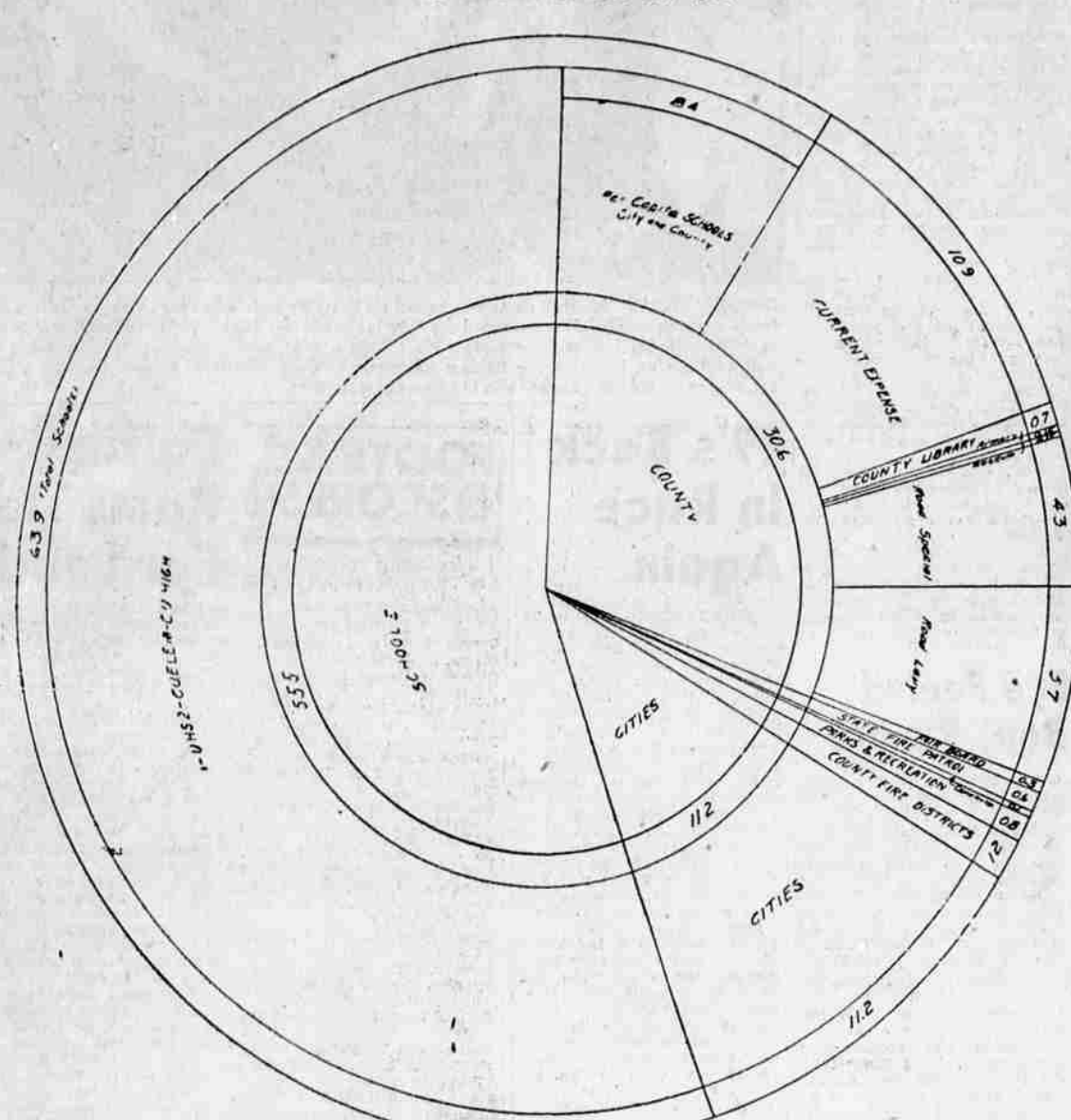

## Much Decorated Marine "Chesty" Puller Retires After 37 Years Of Career

CAMP LEJEUNE, N.C. (AP) — Maj. Gen. Lewis B. (Chesty) Puller, 57, the only marine to win the Navy Cross five times for heroism and gallantry in action, retired today after more than 37 years of active service, 27 of them at sea or overseas.

Gen. Puller's retirement becomes effective tomorrow. He will be retired as a lieutenant general.

One of the most colorful and highly decorated marines in the history of the corps, Gen. Puller participated in World Wars I and II, the Korean War, and the Hainan, Nicaragua and Chinese campaigns. He commanded the 1st Marine Div. in its offensive operation as a division at Hoesong, Korea, in 1951.

Excluding medals from foreign governments, Gen. Puller has won 14 personal decorations in combat, plus 39 campaign medals, unit citations and numerous other awards. He holds five Navy Crosses, a step below the Medal of Honor, the Army Distinguished Service Cross, the Silver Star, the Legion of Merit with one star, the Bronze Star, the Air Medal with two clusters and the Purple Heart.

Gen. Puller was promoted to his present rank in 1953 and took command of the 2nd Marine Div. here, until he was named deputy commander of Camp Lejeune in February of this year. Gen. Puller suffered a stroke last year and was in critical condition several weeks.

Gen. Puller won his first Navy Cross in November, 1930, and his second in October, 1932, while fighting in Nicaragua. He earned his third Navy Cross, the Bronze Star and Purple Heart at Guadalcanal in the early days of World War II. His fourth Navy Cross came for "extraordinary heroism" during the Cape Gloucester campaign in 1944. He was awarded his fifth Navy Cross and the DSC for heroism in action as commander of the 1st Marine, 1st Marine Div. during the bitter fighting in Korea's Chosen reservoir area.

Gen. Puller's action for his third Navy Cross involved Henderson Field on Guadalcanal. He was then a battalion commander, and his outfit was strung out over a mile on the front lines, facing a division of seasoned Japanese troops. For hours in a driving rain, Puller moved up and down the line encouraging his men and directing the defense. When reinforcements arrived the following day, his battalion had killed 1,400

PORT LEYDEN, N.Y. (AP) — James A. McAllister, 89, a key witness in the "American Tragedy" murder trial of Chester Gillette in 1906, died yesterday in a nursing home in this Adirondack village.

McAllister, driver of a horse-drawn stage between the railroad station at Big Moose and Big Moose Lake, testified at the trial in Herkimer that he had waited long for a departure time for Gillette and Miss Grace Brown to board the stage on the day she was killed. He said he left without them. Her body was found later in the lake.

## Probers Eye Record Of Strobel

WASHINGTON (AP) — House investigators called General Services Administrator Edmund F. Mansure today to tell what he knows of the private business of Peter A. Strobel, a top aide.

The GSA which Mansure heads is the government's housekeeping agency. Strobel as public buildings commissioner heads one of its big divisions. He has supervised government real estate activities and selected architects and contractors for new buildings.

A House judiciary subcommittee is seeking to learn whether there is any conflict of interest between Strobel's role in that job and his financial interests. A New York engineering consultant's firm, Strobel, whose salary is \$14,800 yearly, has testified two clients of his firm, Strobel & Salzman, have received architectural contracts from the public buildings service and he said neither he nor his firm profited from the contracts and he hadn't even known about one of them until weeks afterward.

He has denied any wrongdoing, pledging that he would disqualify himself from considering any former clients of his firm for federal jobs.

Rep. Celler (D-N.Y.), the subcommittee chairman, said last week the FBI had been directed to determine whether there has been any violation of law, and that he understands the recommendation for such an inquiry came from Mansure's GSA.

Mansure may be asked also about Strobel's testimony that Mansure strongly recommended a New York architectural firm, DeYoung and Moskowitz, to help plan new headquarters buildings for the Central Intelligence Agency.

Strobel said he and Mansure gained the impression that this arrangement was satisfactory to CIA Director Allen W. Dulles, but that Dulles objected after he had noticed DeYoung and Moskowitz and directed that the notification be canceled.

Dulles had selected the New York firm of Harrison and Abramowitz as the principal architect for the projected 36-million-dollar building. Strobel said he and Mansure urged that another firm be taken on an associate basis on the ground the job was too big for any one firm.

Strobel said his own firm earlier this year signed a contract to do about \$30,000 worth of work on a New York City project which DeYoung and Moskowitz was designing, but that he ordered it canceled upon learning they were under consideration for government work.

He said he had no personal interest in seeing that DeYoung and Moskowitz had a role in the CIA building, and that the chief impetus came from Mansure.

## Mexico Set For All Saints Day

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexico doesn't observe Halloween, but it has a reasonably grisly facsimile. Tomorrow is All Saints Day. Wednesday is the day of the dead when bakeries become gruesome with sweets in the form of skulls and skeletons. There will be bizarre costume balls, and street vendors will sell "calaveras," free verse compositions satirizing politicians and others.

The custom is said to date back to Aztec empire times—almost a thousand years ago. Indian peasants saved milk and honey to provision departed spirits with the best of their products. After the dead had "eaten" the peasants consumed what was left amid carnival festivities.
