By the power of her example, she says to her people that no matter what comes she can TAKE IT.

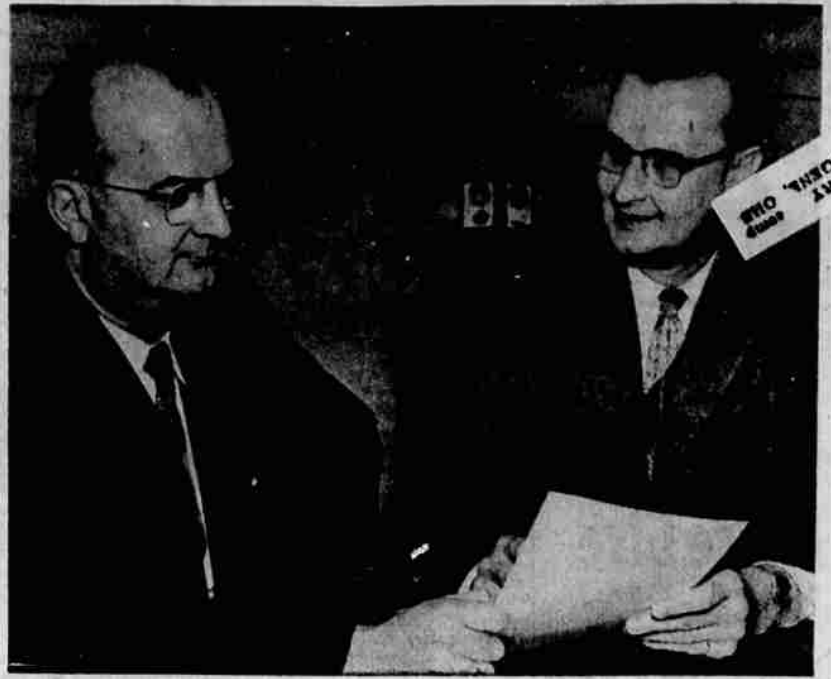
