The women took top club honors with Audrey Baxter placing first for women's free style and Esther Hodge taking third spot in the same division. Second and third places in the men's free style went to Merle Hodge and Harley Vroman.

Team members who helped to bring the state trophy to the Klamath Falls club included Fred Spear, Harley Vroman, Earl Cahoon, Audrey Baxter, Merle Hodge, Jerry Bevans, Dale Baxter, Esther Hodge and Walt Bower.

Klamath Archers were reorganized last year. Membership has reached a total of 50 and is still growing. Current officers who will serve until election in the spring are Earl (Curley) Cahoon, president; Harley Vroman, vice president; and Audrey Baxter, secretary-treasurer.

During the summer regular meetings were held at the Klamath archery range in Moore Park. The basement of the Moose Hall will be used for indoor shooting during the winter months.

An indoor state mail tourney will be conducted this winter for five months, starting sometime in November. A 28-target National Field Archery Association limit round will be shot each month. Plans for the winter shooting and the state tourney shoot will be discussed at the Klamath Archers' meeting Thursday evening, 7:30 p.m., in the Coca-Cola Bottling Company's meeting room at Spring and Main.

The U.S. Civil Service Commission has announced that applications are now being accepted for its new federal service entrance examination. This examination will be used for filling positions paying from \$4,670 to \$4,525 a year in a wide variety of occupational fields.

The federal service entrance examination is open to college seniors and graduates regardless of their field of major study, and to college-caliber people who have had equivalent experience. The first written test will be held December 10, for those who apply by November 18. Additional written months since the examination will be open for receipt of applications until further notice.

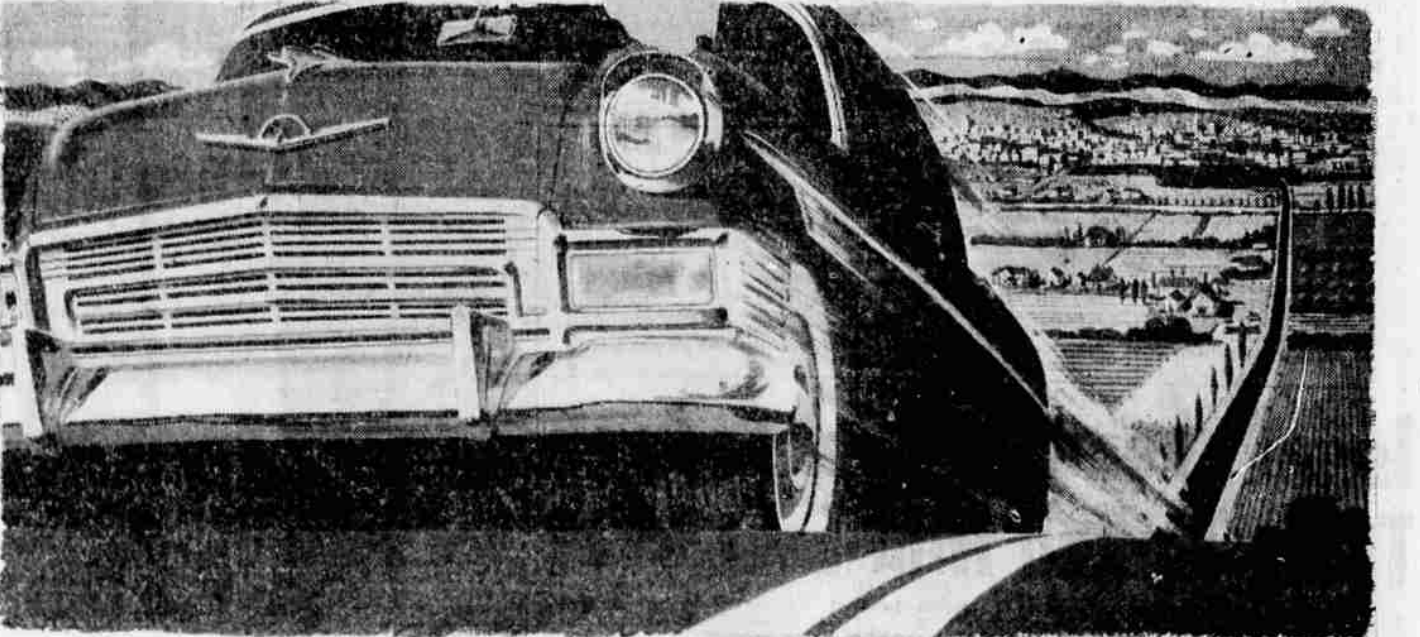
