## Klamath County Teachers Planning Education Week

Klamath County's scheduled observance of American Education Week, slated for November 6 through November 12 in 24 of the county's schools, received official sanction today.

Mayor Paul Landry, representing the city of Klamath Falls, and County Judge U. E. Reeder, heading the committee for Klamath County, penned their signatures to a proclamation designating next week as American Education Week.

The document was signed at 3 p.m. this afternoon in the mayor's office, and was witnessed by Charles Woodhouse, executive-committee chairman for the local educators.

The proclamation, dedicating a full week to the county schools, declared that education is our biggest business, and is our planned fulfillment to the American promise of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. It further appealed to Americans that our present era represented critical days in which all of our citizens should realize the importance of education in the American way of life. It further accentuated that the future of our country may well depend on how well our people recognize and ac-

cept the responsibility for the education of American youth.

Four schools announced their exhibit plans for the Klamath County Open House, which will highlight the special week, November 9. Riverside will furnish an international exhibit. Roosevelt will display an art exhibit representing the work of pupils from grades one through seven. Gilchrist, most distant participant, will present "Hunter's Paradise," and Peterson pupils will supply a Mexican exhibit.

The "Open House" set for Pelican Court at Klamath Union High School will be held November 9, with doors opening at 6 p.m. No admission will be charged, and entertainment supplied by both students and parents is included on the agenda.

American Education Week began in the first week of November 1921, established by Presidential

proclamation, and has continued through the years under the combined sponsorship of the American Legion, the National Education Association, the Oregon Education Association, the National Con-

gress of Parents and Teachers, and the U.S. Office of Education. Klamath County's school participation in the week is headed by Mabel Hanson, ex-officio chairman.

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### Controlled Elk Hunts Planned

Some 2100 elk hunters, those who obtained permits in public drawings held earlier this fall, will participate in nine controlled elk hunts opening on November 11 and closing on November 23.

The nine areas, namely Chesnimus, Wenaha, Walla Walla, Umatilla, Ukiah, Starkey, Minam, Desolation and Heppner will be open to the shooting of either-sex elk

by permit holders only. Hunters holding a general elk hunting tag may hunt in the area after that date but are limited to a bull elk with antlers.

The controlled seasons are designed to keep the elk herds in those areas in balance with the carrying capacity of the range.

Permit holders are not required to check in and out of the above-named areas.

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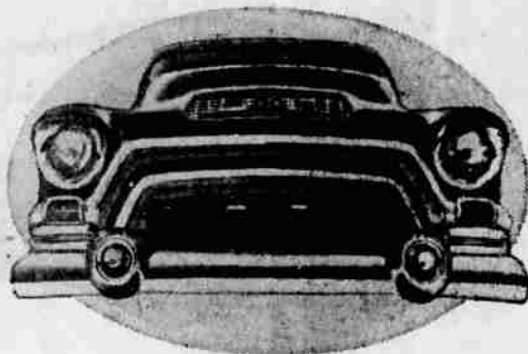


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
