Morse Announces Parity Policy

ONTARIO, Ore. (AP) — Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) said Wednesday night the flexible farm price supports of the Eisenhower administration have turned out to be "collapsible supports."

"The American farmer wants no more of it," Morse told 300 persons at a dinner planned by the Malheur County Democratic Central Committee.

He said he intends to go back to Washington in January to vote for parity programs for the farmer.

Morse also urged the use of our farm surpluses to help foreign countries that need development. This, he said, would aid the foreign countries as well as aid U. S. farmers for "you can't sell freedom to empty stomachs."

Morse also criticized the decision that gave the Hells Canyon site to the Idaho Power Co., and said it would prevent maximum development of the Snake River.

KF Recruiter Wins Boost

Klamath Falls U.S. Marine Corps recruiting Sergeant Harold D. Moris received notice of his promotion to staff sergeant yesterday from Maj. W. F. Simlik, officer-in-charge of Marine Corps recruiting for Oregon.

Maj. Simlik was in Klamath Falls from his Portland headquarters for a routine inspection of the local office. The Marine officer was scheduled to inspect the recruiting offices in Medford, Roseburg and Eugene during his tour of the state.

S-Sgt. Moris, who recently succeeded M-Sgt. Charles A. West as the Klamath Falls Marine recruiter, is a veteran of 6 1/2 years in the Marine Corps. He holds the Purple Heart and a Presidential Unit Citation from the Korean War where he served with the 5th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, from August 1950 to January 1951.

The local recruiter resides at 218 Upham with his wife, Barbara Jean and daughter Linda Sue. His hometown is Fulton, Missouri. Mrs. Moris is from Hastings, Nebraska.

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
