Reflection Seismograph Busy In Silver Lake Area

FORT ROCK—A 10-man reflection seismograph crew of Humble Oil Company, Houston, Texas, has been in the Fort Rock and Silver Lake areas during the past week. In looking for anomalies (traps) for petroleum, Gregg F. McReynolds likened the process to determining the width of a canyon which is dense with fog. By calculating the time required for sound to cross the canyon and the echo to return, the distance can be charted at intervals along the side of the canyon, he said. By drilling a hole 100 to 200 feet deep and exploding from five to 25 pounds of dynamite, waves of movement are produced underground and picked up by "ears" placed at eight-foot intervals for 800 feet each way parallel to the road.

When the graph papers are properly in place on the recording instruments, the order is given to fire. J. B. Keyes, Red Bluff, touches the electric detonator key and in about 10 seconds there is a muffled thud, the ground shakes

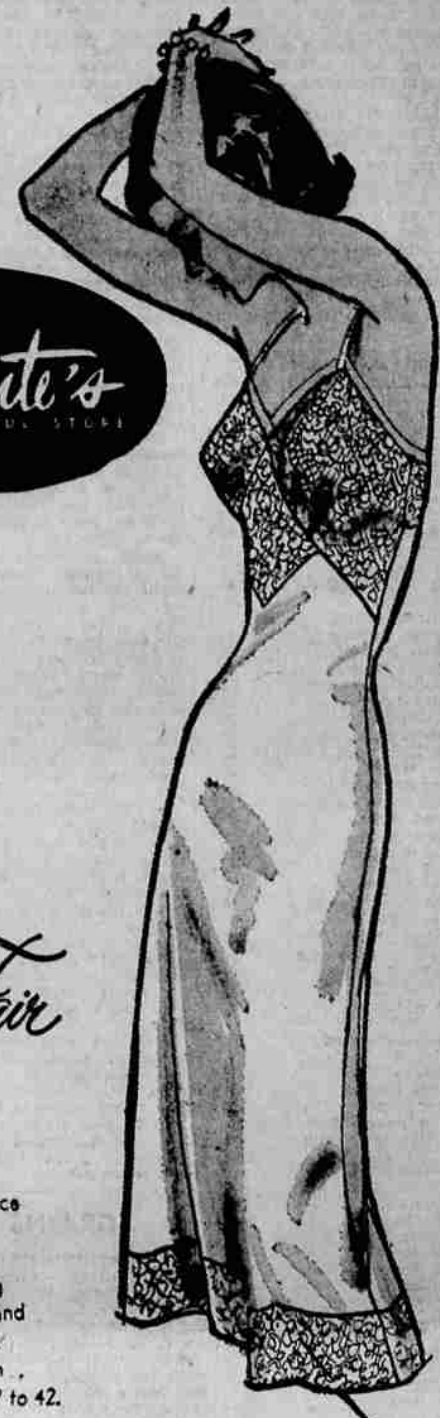
