STOCKS

WALL STREET — High-priced securities, many of them split candidates, made strong advances Friday in a generally higher stock market.

Prices were up 1 to 2 around 5 points in almost every division of the list. There were few losers.

Business was brisk and came to an estimated 2,500,000 shares. That compares with 2,200,000 shares traded in Thursday's buoyant market.

Standard Oil (N.J.), which was up 7 1/2, Thursday as directors proposed a split and boosted the dividend payment, ranged on upward Friday. In the fifth hour of trading, a block of 2,300 shares sold at 145 up 3/4.

Chrysler directors meet Friday for dividend action and a chance to voice their views about a split. The stock was up around a point early in the day and then fell to that amount to the losing side later.

California Weather

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — California weather summary:

It is cloudy over Northern California this morning and light rain is falling as far south as Ukiah and Red Bluff at times. Rain is expected to spread southward to San Francisco and Sacramento this evening but to be quite light at all points affected. An improvement is expected Saturday but another storm appears to threaten rain in Northern California again Sunday.

It is fair over Central and Southern California except fog on the South Coast. Early morning visibility is less than a sixteenth of a mile on parts of the Los Angeles coastal plain.

It was a little warmer yesterday as compared to Wednesday over Central and Southern California. High temperatures over the state ranged from about 70 in the north interior and on the Central Coast to 80 on the South Coast. It was near 90 on the southern desert and about 60 on the North Coast. Low temperatures this morning are mostly in the 40s.

Salvage Timber Bidders Listed

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Southern Pacific Railway yesterday announced the successful bidders for some 37 million board feet of salvageable lumber caught in the disastrous forest fires in the Haystack area of Siskiyou County last September.

The largest parcel went on high bid to the Cheney-Sierra Lumber Co., Central Point, Ore. Successful bidder on the remaining four parcels was the Siskiyou Mills Co., Happy Camp.

Southern Pacific declined to announce the amount of the two bids.

Weed Court Has Busy Week

WEED — Three men were sentenced by Judge Kenneth Stone in the Weed court this week and another was awaiting hearing.

John Martin Sweet, 32, of Chicago, was released from the Weed jail the same day of his arrest, following a routine investigation of his "untimely wanderings" about Weed.

Vern Alvin Swensen, 18, of Walport, Oregon, pleaded guilty to vagrancy and was sentenced to four days in the Weed jail.

Leonard William Enos, 43, of Weed pleaded guilty to charges of speeding and reckless driving and paid a fine of \$116 in lieu of 56 days in the county jail. He was arrested after his car failed to make a turn from Highway 97 on to the Angel Valley Road and left the road, ripping 63 feet of fence, from the property of Jack Linville.

Orlando Overson, 49, LaCrosse, Wisconsin, was arrested November 1 for being drunk and was awaiting a hearing before Judge Stone.

The Weed police department answered 305 calls during October, according to Harold Barnum, police chief.

Arrests and citations for the month included 63 traffic citations for moving violations, 14 illegal parking citations and 10 warnings. Four vehicle accidents were investigated. Six felony arrests were made, four of which were for burglary, one for auto theft and one felony held for the sheriff's office. Nineteen misdemeanors were arrested for driving while intoxicated, driving while licenses were suspended, drunk in and about an auto, drunkenness, vagrancy and one juvenile held for an auto theft.

The patrol car traveled a total of 3,330 miles during the month.

Family Battle Ends In Court

A battle over a second-land matters during which a brother and sister were reported to have engaged in fistfights was aired Friday morning in District Judge D. E. Van Vactor's court.

Deputy District Attorney Robert Nichols told the court that Leanne T. Carlie, 53, Merrill, charged with assault and battery, beat his sister, Mrs. Pearl Flaug, 50, also a Merrill resident. Nichols also said Carlie threatened Mrs. Flaug and her husband, James Flaug, 51, with a gun.

Judge Van Vactor imposed a 60-day suspended sentence on the defendant.

"This looks like a family quarrel to me," the judge said. "If you can't get along with your sister, you better leave her alone."

Party Finishes With Fight

A Klamath Falls man suffered minor cuts on the head when he was hit in a fight which apparently followed a party at his home, Klamath Falls police reported today.

Police were notified at 10:05 p.m. yesterday when Kaler's Ambulance Company received a call from an unidentified person to the residence of Jose Salazar, 628 Walnut, the victim. According to a spokesman for Kaler's, the person calling was highly excited, and gave a telephone number and hung up. The address was traced through the telephone number, the spokesman said.

Police reported that they found Salazar in a bedroom at the house, which was very neat except that there was blood splattered about and much furniture had been overturned. An empty wine bottle led police to believe a party had been going on.

Salazar said he did not know who hit him, or what he was hit with. Police believe a broken chair lying nearby was the weapon used.

After being treated for incantations on his face, Salazar was questioned by police and released.
