Malheur Reports More Polio Cases

NYSSA, Ore. — Health authorities continued giving gamma globulin injections Friday after two more cases of polio were reported in the Malheur County epidemic.

These two brought the total number to 39 cases in the county this year. There have been three deaths. The new polio patients are a 24-year-old Nyssa housewife and a 14-year-old boy at Adrian.

Dr. Samuel Osgood and a team from the State Board of Health are directing the public inoculations with gamma globulin for all persons under 35. So far 1,147 have been inoculated.

The county health officer, Dr. Grant B. Hughes, said Adrian residents have asked that the program be extended to their community.

Weed Golf Club Elects Directors

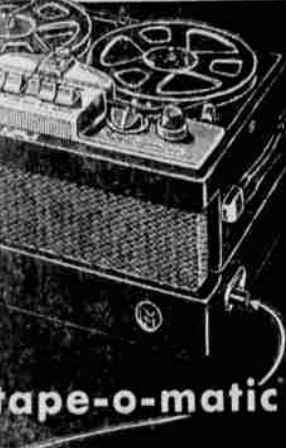
