

# Unknown Sparks Illini Win Over Michigan; OSU Victor

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP) — Super-charged Illinois Saturday unveiled a rampaging unknown, sophomore halfback Bob Mitchell, who streaked 64 yards for a back-breaking touchdown and led the Illini to a smashing 25-6 upset of unbeaten Michigan, the nation's No. 3 team.

Mitchell, a 20-year-old Negro speedster from Hot Springs, Ark., hit vaulted Michigan like a ton of bricks as he entered the game in the third quarter and then streaked to 173 yards in 10 carries.

Mitchell, infrequently used by Illinois earlier, stepped into the game to launch the Illini to a 12-6 lead which came on the old-fashioned field goal strategy for a touchdown on a 24-yard screen pass midway in the third period.

Mitchell got his big chance when the No. 1 left halfback, Harry Jefferson, suffered a rib injury early in the third period. Until he was sidelined, Jefferson had been the chief Illini threat with 14 carries for only 17 yards.

Mitchell's explosive performance contributed heavily to the surprising total of 338 yards rushing by Illinois compared with only 173 for heralded Michigan. Michigan had a sad passing attack, despite the futile efforts of end Ron Kramer, completing only 3 of 21 tosses for only 17 yards.

The first defeat of the season for Michigan in seven starts dealt a serious blow to the Wolverines' Rose Bowl hopes and dropped them to second behind unbeaten Ohio State in the Big Ten race.

Illinois followed a tradition of handing bitter defeats to Michigan dating back to Red Grange.

Michigan State joined the Big Ten Saturday the razor-sharp Spartans were outgained from scrimmage but they grabbed five Purdue fumbles and intercepted four Purdue passes.

## OSC Racks Up No. 4 By Smashing Vandals

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Striking swiftly in the first and fourth periods for four of their five touchdowns, Oregon State spilled winless Idaho, 33-14, Saturday as the Beavers racked up their fourth Pacific Coast Conference victory before a crowd of 9,000.

Oregon State scored in the first 3 1/2 minutes when fleet back Dick Mason gathered in an Idaho punt on his 20-yard line and raced 80 yards into score territory. Ted Searle booted the extra point.

But Idaho roared right back to equalize only minutes later. The

Vandals recovered an OSC fumble on the Beaver 32, and nine plays later Ron Braden sliced through tackle from two yards out for the Vandal score. Jerry Kramer added the tying extra point.

OSC made it 14-7 in the same period with Bob Sutton setting up the score on a 69-yard run to the Idaho 17. Mason made the last eight yards on a sweep.

OSC scored its third TD in the second period when guard Ron Daniels blocked an Idaho punt and Dave Jesmer recovered on the Idaho 2. Tom Berry smashed over from the one.

Idaho closed the gap to 21-14 early in the fourth quarter, eating up 36 yards in four plays with Ray Bittner carrying over from OSC's one-yard line and Kramer again adding the extra point.

Then OSC, which had played slugishly through the third period, came to life. Mason intercepted an Idaho pass at midfield as a Vandal gamble went amiss, and seven plays later Berry smashed over for his second touchdown from a yard out.

Two minutes later, Sam Wesley hauled in a 10n Westfall pass good for 32 yards and Oregon State's fifth touchdown.

Idaho rolled up 13 first downs to OSC's 10, and gained 105 yards to OSC's 95 in the air. The Beavers had the advantage on the ground however, 170 yards to Idaho's 139.

## Bobby Boyd Tops Johnson

CHICAGO (AP) — "I'd like to see him go against Tiger Jones or Gil Turner," said fight manager Bernie Glickman after watching his middleweight contender Bobby Boyd batter George Johnson at the Chicago Stadium Friday night.

"He's ready for either of them, now," continued the jubilant manager.

Boyd was his usual sporadic self in scoring an 8th round technical knockout over the 25-year-old Trenton, N. J., middleweight in the nationally televised bout.

After dropping Johnson for an 8-count in the opening round, Boyd, 21, failed to follow through and by the sixth round found himself on the deck taking a 9-count.

"He never hurt me," said Boyd. "He just surprised me, that's all." Johnson was bewildered in his dressing room. "I just couldn't pull myself together after that first round, said Johnson. "My timing was off. I'd like to fight him again and if I do I'll fight him."

Johnson said he didn't remember a thing in the eighth round after the young Chicagoan dropped him the first of three times. The third time Johnson went sprawling into the ropes and referee Frank Sikora signaled the end with five seconds remaining in the round. Boyd weighed 160 1/2 to 157 for Johnson.

Boyd was slightly ahead on all official cards at the end of seven rounds but Johnson had won the sixth and seventh rounds decisively. In fact, when he dropped Boyd in the sixth round and came back to take the seventh, it appeared as if he could have gone on to win.

## Maryland Terps Top LS; Auburn Triumphs

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) — Maryland's top rated Terrapins scored on a shocking 32 - yard pass play and a grinding 53 - yard drive Saturday to down hard-hitting Louisiana State 13-0 and remain unbeaten.

Frank Tamburello, Maryland's cocky quarterback, hit halfback Jack Healy with a pass midway of the second quarter to break open a titanic defense struggle. Healy grabbed the ball on the 13, juggled it and went over.

The first time the Terps got the ball in the second half they put on one of their famous drives traveling 56 yards in 10 plays. Steady Ed Vereb carried the last four yards.

The victory was the eighth straight of the season for the undefeated Terrapins.

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## Miami Whips Boston Eagles

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — His football team had been beaten, but Boston College's coach Mike Holovak were a contented grin when he left the Orange Bowl Friday night.

His Eagles, 21-point underdogs, had just held Miami's Hurricanes to a tense 14-7 decision.

"We've won three games," Holovak said, "but I wouldn't trade them all for any of our victories. That was the best any team has ever played for me."

"We could have beaten most teams but Miami was great. Luck and desperate defensive play enabled Miami to salvage its close victory after Jack Losch, a sprinter on the Hurricane track team, had delighted 42,249 homecoming fans by racing 73 and 44 yards to touchdowns in the first half.

It looked then as if the Hurricanes could run the score as high as they pleased but Boston College suddenly took charge behind its sharp-shooting quarterback, Bill Donlan.

Three times the Eagles drove to first downs inside the Miami 10.

Once, they were thrown back by the Miami line after marching to a first down on the 4. On two other occasions, their hopes were blasted when Larry Plenty and Ed Desiva fumbled on first down plays at the six and the five.

The Eagles scored, finally, late in the last quarter on a 14-yard pass from Donlan to Desiva after Plenty had put them in range of the goal by dropping in a fumble at the Miami 17.

Donlan's passes enabled Boston College to win a statistical victory. He completed 9 of 20 throws for 171 yards. The Eagles gained 106 on the ground for a grand total of 277. Miami netted 286, all except 12 yards on running plays.

A daring lateral gave Miami its first touchdown. Fullback Don Boseler crashed into the Boston College line and as he went down under a burd of tacklers he gambled on a throw to Losch. The speedy halfback snatched the ball and outran his pursuers in a 3-yard journey.

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
