Southern Oregon Chambers Okay Ad Program

It was unanimously decided Saturday afternoon by representatives of five chambers of commerce in Southern Oregon to continue the Southern Oregon Hospitality Unlimited advertising program on a cooperative basis. The meeting was called to review the results of the second year of concerted advertising action and to make plans for 1956. Harry Molatore, Klamath chamber director on tourist activities, presided. Last year's advertising budget was approximately \$1,000 made up by contributions from the Josephine, Jackson and Klamath county chambers, Ashland and Illinois Valley chamber at Cave Junction. Don McNeil, manager of the chamber at Medford had compiled results of the year's program. Replies to coupons which appeared in California newspapers, timed for publication alongside the Oregon State Highway Department travel information advertisements, totaled nearly 800. Literature and folders from each of the five areas were sent reply to every query. Cooperation reply was nearly one dollar less than the cost of the state advertising replies, it was pointed out. Citing figures from Grants Pass, L. C. Hansen, manager of the Josephine County Chamber of Commerce, stated that wayside industries, the segment of the community most directly benefited by tourist business, was conspicuous by its absence in support of chamber promotion of tourist and convention business. Of 152 wayside businesses—restaurants, motels, hotels, gasoline and oil companies—only 43 hold memberships in the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce, he stated. Membership records of the other four chambers showed a similar situation exists throughout the group. Hansen agreed with Ron Gaudes of the Jackson County chamber that an even greater improvement in the tourist business would result from a larger advertising budget. He said, however, he was reluctant to propose that the membership of the Grants Pass chamber vote more money to help specifically that small minority which has shown very little cooperation in the past. The group voted to submit two proposals to each of the directors of the individual chambers of commerce. Plan B would be to continue the present advertising allotment for Southern Oregon Hospitality Unlimited on the present limited basis as has been done in the past by using "hit or miss" advertising. Plan A would be a comprehensive plan, covering many metropolitan areas through both newspapers and magazines on a continuing basis, provided the wayside industries support the individual chambers in carrying on an enlarged Southern Oregon Hospitality Unlimited advertising program.
