It will open as soon as details of the sale are completed and a staff retained, probably in mid-December, according to Dr. Todorovic.

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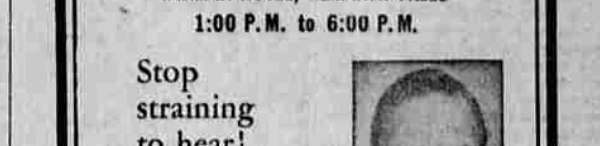
