Two months ago the mid-November date between Oregon State and California figured to be only another football game in the Pacific Coast Conference, but Monday it added up to the top clash on the Saturday West Coast menu.

The bolsters Beavers, riding high in the Rose Bowl race, are in undisputed possession of second place in PCC standings. And California, kicked around by everybody, looked suddenly as a possible spoiler with the sudden discovery of a twin touchdown punch. The year-long upset wave rolled higher than usual throughout the conference last Saturday to produce the unique situation in the standings.

Two favorites topped in the top-of-the-week derby — and the chief victim was proud Southern California. The Trojans, who figured to be the champion, were upstaged by UCLA. They were dumped unceremoniously by Stanford, 28-20, as the up-and-down Indians reached the peak.

Dropped also was Washington, victim of Cal's tiny Don Smith and Nat Brasill. The Huskies, once the conference darkhorse, have failed to win a game since their upset of USC five weeks ago.

Fall River To Drop Out Of FB League

DUNSMUIR — Don Peckham, coach at Fall River joint high school, has announced that Fall River will quit the Siskiyou County Football League effective in 1956. The withdrawal of Fall River will leave only four teams participating, Yreka, Weed, Mount Shasta and Dunsmuir.

Coch Peckham explained that "the general consensus seems to be that we have no business in the Siskiyou County league until we get on our feet as far as football is concerned. . . . We want to play these teams when we're able to, at least give them a good game. We won't quit football, but we don't want to be stepping stone for other more powerful teams to score at will."

He said that Fall River, which competes in the Siskiyou league in football only, will schedule some of the league teams next year, omitting the strong Yreka and Weed teams. He mentioned Mount Shasta and Dunsmuir, both in the league and Tulelake with a home-and-home arrangement. Alturas, Trinity, Central Valley and Susanville as possible opponents.

In basketball and track, Fall River teams compete in the Modoc-Lassen League. Peckham said that there was also the possibility that the Bulldogs might form a separate league with Tulelake and Alturas. The Bulldogs are winless so far this year. Last year they defeated Mount Shasta 7-6, and gave Dunsmuir and Yreka close battles. Fall River has been a member of the Siskiyou league 7 years.

Danny Giovannelli Favored Over Perez In Battle

NEW YORK (UP)—Welterweight Danny Giovannelli goes in as a substitute with only a week's rest to night against Danny Jo Perez but he is favored at 9-5 to win their television 10-rounder in St. Nicholas Arena.

It's a return bout, Giovannelli of Brooklyn stopped Perez of New York in the sixth round because of a gashed brow on March 2, 1953. That's the only kayo against Danny Jo in his 23 fights. Each is 23 years old.

Last Monday, Giovannelli won a unanimous decision over Paolo Melis of Montreal at St. Nick's. He suffered no cuts and was able to accept the invitation to substitute for Chico Vejar against Perez. Vejar suffered a split lip in training.

Giovannelli is favored not only because of his 1953 victory over Danny Joe, but because he was impressive against Melis last week and because hard-luck Danny Jo hasn't registered a victory in his last four bouts, although he had one draw.

Perez was outpointed by lightweight contender Kenny Lane on Dec. 13. This year he was held to a draw by Orlando Zubietta, and outpointed by lightweight contender Frankie Ruff and by Gene Poirier, July 25. He weighed 147 pounds for Poirier.

Giovannelli fought as a middleweight in the first three of his four fights this year. He knocked out Jimmy Martinez (5), outpointed Chris Christensen and lost to Ray Drake. Then he returned to the welterweight ranks and beat Melis last Monday. He weighed 150 1/2 lbs. His 27-5-1 record includes 12 knock outs. He was stopped once.

Perez' 16-3-1 list includes only four kayos.

The winner of tonight's bout probably will be matched with Chico Vejar at St. Nick's on Nov. 21.

Mike Higgins Named AL Manager Of Year

NEW YORK (UP)—Mike Higgins who brought about a 30-game improvement in the Boston Red Sox last season and kept them in pennant contention until the final two weeks of the season, was selected today as American League "Manager of the Year" in a United Press poll.

In a wide open contest in balloting by 56 baseball writers from the eight league cities, Higgins won out by two votes over Marty Marion of the Chicago White Sox. Higgins received 17 votes and Marion 15. Casey Stengel, who brought the Yankees their fifth pennant in the six seasons he has been manager, finished third with 11 votes, while Lou Boudreau of the improved Athletics at Kansas City drew 10. Al Lopez of the runner-up Cleveland Indians received two votes and Bucky Harris of the Detroit Tigers drew one.

NUMEROUS FLAUNTS
Higgins, operating under a succession of complications in his first season as a big league boss, did not elevate Boston in the standings, as it also finished fourth in 1954.

But this time the Red Sox finished only 12 games out whereas in the previous season they were 42 games behind.

Bowl Selectors Up Creek After Week's Games; Still Stumped

The bowl selectors, who should've stood in bed for all they learned last Saturday, take another look at the somewhat curdled cream of the hopefuls this Saturday as college football takes a crack at determining conference champions.

At least six major bowl berths are open, with the Cotton, Sugar and Gator Bowl committees still unsure who they'll wind up with. And after Illinois bounced Michigan from the unbeaten-untied ranks 26-6 last Saturday, the Rose Bowl can't print tickets yet, either.

Time was when it looked like Michigan vs. UCLA at Pasadena. The UCLAs still are going strong after shelling College of Pacific 24-0 in a non-league game Saturday, but now Michigan State, beaten only by Michigan, has poked into the Big 10 picture. It looks like the Big 10 choice hinges on the Nov. 19 showdown between Ohio State and Michigan.

Ohio State, the current leader, is ineligible to return to the Rose Bowl even if it repeats as Big 10 champ. With Michigan playing weak sister Indiana this weekend, Michigan State has to smack Minnesota and hope for an Ohio State victory next week since the Spartans play one less game than Michigan.

Maryland, teamed with Oklahoma and West Virginia as the last of the major unbeaten-and-untied teams, can settle a bowl and title question Saturday by beating Clemson. Actually, there's a little question the Terps, who made Louisiana State their 13th straight victim last weekend 13-0, can take the Clemsons, the Atlantic Coast Conference title and the Orange Bowl berth in one easy sweep.

Oklahoma fills the other half of the Orange Bowl bill, after being awarded the Big 7 Conference crown before the season even opened. Nebraska is the lone "threat" to the Sooners and the Huskers may be shocked by Colorado this week while Oklahoma makes Iowa State its 27th straight victim. Nebraska beat Iowa State 10-7 while Oklahoma was blanking Missouri 30-6 last Saturday.

West Virginia comes in for another look by the bowl selectors Saturday against Pitt. The Mountain State has won three straight Southern Conference crown last weekend, but may have left the selectors skeptical in their mere 13-7 decision over George Washington.

The bowl committees also make a second study of the Southeastern and Southwest Conferences this weekend.

Georgia Tech and Tennessee gave the selectors little help by playing a 7-7 tie. Auburn and Mississippi State didn't prove much either, although Auburn won 37-26. Only Kentucky provided an obvious decision — the Wildcats were whipped by Vanderbilt 34-0.

Mississippi, which walloped Memphis State 39-6, still looks to repeat as SEC champ, but almost everybody gets to stay in on the act until the Rebels play Mississippi State Nov. 25.

This week it's Tech against winless Alabama, Tennessee vs. Florida, Auburn-Georgia, Miss. State-LSU and Mississippi-Houston (a non-conference foe).

The Southwest champ is the Cotton Bowl host in a normal year, but with the present leader, Texas A&M on probation, the runner-up gets a chance if need be. Texas and Texas Christian play the big game this week. If Texas is so-so, the conference darkhorse, Baylor last Saturday, acts past TCU it could set up a title showdown between the Longhorns and Aggies Thanksgiving Day.

Elsewhere, Yale and Princeton could settle the Ivy League title this weekend. Yale larded Army 14-12 Saturday when Princeton was stunned 7-6 by Harvard.

Idaho State won the Rocky Mountain title last weekend by whipping Colorado Mines 27-13. Colorado A&M wins over Baylor for the Skyline championship Saturday.

Notre Dame, the major independent with a 6-1 record after losing with Penn last weekend 46-14, invades North Carolina this week. Navy, which shared a role among the nation's top teams with Notre Dame before being tied by Duke 7-7 last weekend, next plays Columbia—a restful reprieve after facing the Irish and Blue Devils on successive Saturdays.

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
