Larson Case Continued

A preliminary hearing for Carl Larson, 38-year-old farm worker, accused of complicity September 19 in a burglary at the Lost River Tavern in Merrill, was continued Tuesday until 9:30 Wednesday.

Joe Blansfield, 35, is now serving five years in Oregon State Prison for his part in the tavern burglary in which \$350 in cash and 10 bottles of wine were stolen.

At the time he was sentenced, Blansfield told Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg that he was alone when the drinking establishment was entered.

Deputy District Attorney P. K. Puckett, who is prosecuting Larson, called half a dozen witnesses in an attempt to show the farm worker had possession of the loot.

Among those who testified were Mrs. Mary Brophy, owner of the Lost River Tavern; Dal Reed, Merrill police chief; Mrs. Fred Reymier, manager of the Anchor Hotel Klamath Falls; Mrs. Laura Burden, manager of a cabin court in Merrill; and John D. Seymour, cab driver.

Seymour testified that he picked Larson up at the Anchor Hotel the day after the Merrill burglary and drove him to Madococ, California. He said on the way, Larson displayed a large amount of cash and also had some cloth money sacks in his possession. The money taken from the tavern was in cloth bags.

The hearing was continued when Attorney Puckett, told District Judge D. E. Van Vactor that he wanted to question another witness who was not present in court.

School Administrators Busy Preparing For Open House

With American Education Week officially in its second day, administrators and teachers were busy themselves with last minute preparations for the roles that their schools will play in Wednesday's gala "Klamath County Open House," which is slated for Klamath Union High's Pelican Court.

Exhibits and pageantry are scheduled for the open house program. Doors open at 5 p.m. for inspection of school exhibits, and a program of entertainment is scheduled at 8 p.m.

Twenty-four Klamath County schools are participating in the special six-day affair which began Sunday. Theme for American Education Week this year is: "Schools - Your Investment in America." The week is sponsored through the combined efforts of the American Legion, the National Education Association, the Oregon Education Association, the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, and the United States Office of Education.

Chairman Charles Woodhouse stated that six schools will exhibit student projects Wednesday night. Riverside School will furnish an International Exhibit. Roosevelt School will offer an art exhibit representing the work of grades one through seven. Gilchrist, most distinguished participant, will present "Hunter's Paradise." A Mexican exhibit will be Peterson School's contribution. Henley Elementary School will supply a wildlife exhibit, and Fremont School's offering will be an unnamed exhibit.

Malin High's band will begin the evening's entertainment with a rendition of "The Star Spangled Banner." Other entertainment features include: Pelican School, accordion band; Klamath Union High Latin Club, activities; Conger School, quartet; Bly School, Western ranch scene (35 voices); Fairview School, "Yellow Rose of Texas"; Ferguson School, sketch of life of Twyla Ferguson; Shasta School, flag drill (64 students from clubs and classes); Bonanza School, International Understanding and flag drill; Malin elementary and high school, Czechoslovakian dance; Fairhaven School, "Sidewalks of New York"; and Mills School, "Sidewalks of New York."

Other schools included for entertainment are: Chiloquin School, Indian pantomime; Keno School, "Memories of Old Keno School Days"; Merrill High School, Potato Festival drill; Altamont junior and high school, Swiss Dance by 12 parents; Malin High band selection; Klamath Union High, dramatic sketches; and Malin High, band finale.

As an appropriate feature of American Education Week, which was officially proclaimed last week by Judge U. E. Reeder and Mayor Paul Landry, the Freedom Shrine will be unveiled and presented as a gift to the community of Klamath Union High School by the Exchange Club and initiators of the Freedom Shrine, which has been financed mainly through fund-raising last year in a talent show in the halls of Klamath Union High for the students and public to view at any time.

Stuart Balsiger, past president of the Exchange Club and initiator of the Freedom Shrine, will make the presentation on behalf of the organization. He will be introduced by Exchange Club president W. H. Roomblid. The shrine was financed last year in a talent show. 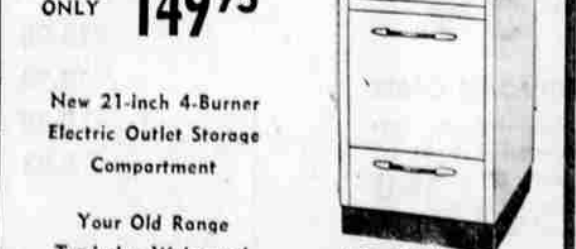
