Egypt Says Washington To Blame

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Egypt charges Washington's "postponement and promises" on requests for arms forced her to buy weapons from the Communists.

The government statement was Egypt's explanation of a move in the struggle between the West and the Communist bloc for leadership in the rest of the Middle East. Egypt's declaration was an effort to refute a remark by U. S. Assistant Secretary of State George Allen to the effect Cairo suddenly turned to the Communists for arms while negotiating with Washington.

In a dispatch from Washington, the New York Herald Tribune said the United States was giving top-level consideration to asking the U. N. Security Council to embargo all arms shipments to the Middle East. This was said to be one reason why Washington is reluctant to sell arms quickly to Israel to match Egyptian purchases from Czechoslovakia.

(The embargo plan was said to have been worked out in consultation with Britain and France in Geneva and the three Western capitals. The Herald Tribune said the Soviet Union likely would veto the embargo proposal in the Security Council but that such action would "expose Russia to the world as a munitions merchant bent on gambling with the lives and security of millions of people.")

Minister's Wife Freed By Reds

HONG KONG (AP) — Mrs. Laura Lau, of Broughton, Pa., the wife of a Chinese minister, crossed the border from Red China today, border guards reported.

Peiping Radio announced on Oct. 26 that she was being given an exit permit.

Mrs. Lau, the former Laura Louise Augustin of Broughton, was arrested March 2, 1951 and imprisoned until some time in the Spring of 1954 when the Reds released her. She has since lived at Canton with her husband and three children. Her mother is Mrs. Ida Augustin of Pittsburgh, Pa.

Five Children Die In Fire

HAZARD, Ky. (AP) — Five children, their ages ranging from 4 to 14, were burned to death when fire swept their home in this mountain town just before Wednesday midnight.

The dead were children and grandchildren of former Sheriff and Mrs. Justice Begley.
 A neighbor detected the blaze but was unable to arouse anyone inside the building before issuing an alarm.
 The Begleys were watching Kentucky election results in the downtown area.
 It was believed the fire started from a heating stove.

Cool Weather Chills South

 The cold air which covers most of the country from the Rockies to the Atlantic Coast chilled the Southland Wednesday.

The cool air dipped into Southern Texas and Mexico and temperatures dropped all along the Gulf Coast to Northern Florida. Readings generally were in the 40s. At Alpine, Tex., Tuesday's high was 32—freezing—compared to a high of 71 on Monday. Two inches of snow fell during the day.
 Early morning temperatures were in the 30s and 30s in other parts of the cold belt. There was some warming Tuesday in the West as a mass of mild Pacific air moved rapidly eastward across the Rockies into the Northern and Central Plains. At Rapid City, S.D., the day's high of 61 was 22 degrees higher than Monday.
 There were only a few wet spots Wednesday morning. Showers and snow flurries were reported in the Northern Plains and Great Lakes region. Scattered showers fell in extreme Southern Texas.
