CHICAGO (AP) — Butcher hogs dropped 25 to 50 cents to a new low average price since 1944 Wednesday. The top of \$13.60 was the lowest top quotation since March, 1942. Sows also lost 25 to 50 cents.
Most 250 pound butchers went at \$12.75 to \$13.00 and 180 to 220 pounders at \$13.00 to \$13.25. The \$13.60 top was paid for only a 14 head lot.
Prime steers topped at \$24.25. Most choice and prime kinds went at \$18.50 to \$20.00. Heifers topped at \$21.50 on prime while most good and choice sold for \$18.00 to \$20.50.
Good to prime woolled lambs went at \$18.00 to \$20.00.
