Grand Jury To Receive Larson Case

Carl Larson, 38-year-old farm worker, was ordered held for the grand jury for complicity in a burglary at the Moss River Tavern, Merrill, at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing Wednesday before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor.

Judge Van Vactor took that action after a bartender identified a flashlight found in a cabin in Merrill occupied by Larson as the property of the tavern. The bartender, Mrs. Pearl Spolek, said she was able to identify the flashlight by a dent on the case.

Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattson, who brought Larson back to Klamath Falls after his arrest in Woodland, California, testified the alleged burglar made incriminating statements concerning the crime.

Joe Blansfield, 26, was sentenced to five years in Oregon State Prison after he admitted to Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg that he broke into the tavern and stole \$300 in cash and 10 bottles of wine. He said he was alone at the time.

Larson was connected with the case after it was learned he shared a cabin in Merrill with Blansfield. Larson was traced to Klamath Falls and then Woodland. He hired a cab to drive him to Medford and was supposed to have displayed a large amount of cash.

John D. Seymour, taxi driver, said Larson had canvas money bags in his possession. The tavern funds were in such bags.
