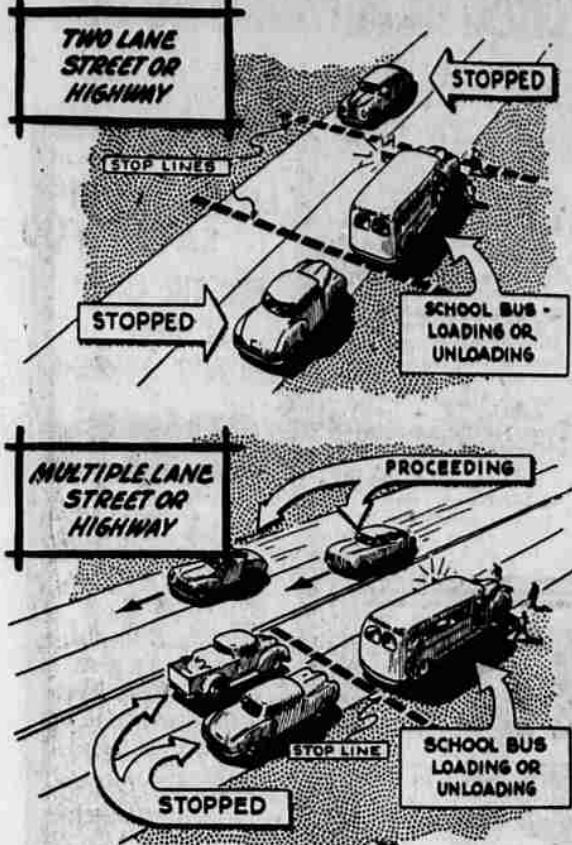


### STOP FOR SCHOOL BUSES!



**STILL CONFUSED** about Oregon's school bus stop law? Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry furnished this explanation. On a two-lane roadway, you must stop when meeting or overtaking a school bus which has halted to load or unload children. On roadways having three or more lanes, you must stop only if you are traveling in the same direction as the bus. After having stopped, you must not proceed as long as any children are leaving the bus or crossing the roadway. To assist in holding traffic while children are crossing the road, all buses are equipped with a red stop signal arm. You must stop for the bus whether or not the stop signal is displayed. Use of the signal is merely the driver's means of telling motorists that children are crossing the roadway and that they must stop. The law applies equally to city streets, rural roads and highways.

### Siskiyou Board Plans New Siren

**YREKA**—The need for an improved air warning siren was cited by O. G. Steele at this week's meeting of the Siskiyou County board of supervisors. The present one emitted "a wear, inadequate warning signal" at the time of the recent civil defense test, he said.

Jess O'Roke, county administrator and purchasing agent, was directed by the board to get details on the cost of financing a new siren and the possibility of its being connected to the sheriff's office by a switching arrangement.

### Logger Held For Grand Jury

**C. H. Parks**, 24-year-old Bend logger, accused of a brutal attack with a butcher knife on his sister-in-law, Mrs. Frances Parks, Sprague River, was ordered held for the county grand jury Thursday on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. Bond was set at \$3,500.

Mrs. Parks appeared at a preliminary hearing Thursday morning before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor and, under questioning by Deputy District Attorney P. K. Puckett, described the alleged knifing.

The woman, who was in court with her left hand heavily bandaged, said she was cut when she put her arm up to protect her throat. She declared the defendant was attempting to cut her throat. She also testified Parks was intoxicated at the time of the attack.

Sheriff Murray Britton revealed after the hearing that Parks was indicted Wednesday by the Deschutes County Grand Jury at Bend on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. Bail in that case was set at \$5,000.

### YMCA Plans Fund Drive

The Klamath Falls YMCA youth will launch "Operation Map Face" Saturday, November 12, as a fund-raising drive for their world service.

The Gray-Y Fun Club and the summer campers of the Y will conduct a door-to-door soap selling campaign to raise the \$200 they have set as their goal for their world service contribution.

The YMCA world service is an extension of the Y program in 30 foreign countries of the world with the theme "Helping People Help Themselves."

The youth group has decided on two ways to raise the money—personal giving and the sale of the soap. The drive is under the direction of Bill Cornell, Y program secretary.

Executive committee members remaining in office are Elmont Kenyon and Roy Anderson. Newly elected to the committee was Don Macken, outgoing master, who was put in charge of arrangements of installation of officers to be held jointly with Midland, Merrill and Shasta View granges.

The members voted to donate \$25 toward the acoustic tile which is now being installed in the hall. The next meeting will be a social meeting on Tuesday, November 22.

### Benson, McKay Firing Sought

**WASHINGTON** (AP)—Sen. Langer (R-ND) said Thursday the Republican Party will be badly hurt in the 1956 elections unless Secretary of Agriculture Benson and Secretary of the Interior McKay are dropped.

Referring to gains claimed by Democrats in some areas in Tuesday's elections, particularly in Indiana, Langer said the results conclusively proved warnings he has given previously in Senate floor speeches.

Discussing Tuesday's election results in an interview, Langer said: "Unless President Eisenhower gets rid of Secretary Benson and Secretary McKay, extremely popular as the President is today, in my opinion he would be defeated if he is a candidate in the next election."

Langer said that on a recent trip to the West Coast he was impressed by the "great unpopularity of the administration's attitude on REA and public power."

"Benson's unpopularity as secretary of Agriculture is resulting in a political prairie fire that will sweep numerous Republican senators and congressmen out of office," Langer said.

"Wherever I went, I found that the people personally like the President, but they simply will not stomach some of the members of the cabinet who, in the opinion of the rank and file of the people, are representing interests adverse to the general welfare of the people."

Langer has opposed the administration on its flexible crop support program and favors restoration of the 90 per cent parity for the basics. He has also opposed the administration's power policies.

### Magsaysay Leads In Election

**MANILA** (UP)—Candidates of President Ramon Magsaysay's pro-American Nacionalista Party led today in seven of the nine senatorial races at stake and Magsaysay's bitterest opponent charged he was being cheated.

The fraud charges were made by Sen. Carlo M. Recto, a renegade Nacionalista senator who appeared on the opposition Liberal Party slate as a "guest candidate" after he broke with Magsaysay in a fiery dispute over foreign policy. Recto said he was far down in the list of probable winners because pro-administration officers were putting out "misleading" partial election returns.
