Tulelake Potato Growers Invite Knight To Speak

TULELAKE—Governor Goodwin J. Knight of California will be invited to be guest speaker at the annual Tulelake Potato Growers Association Banquet December 14-15-16 depending on the availability of the speaker. The governor has never visited Tulelake.

The banquet will follow the annual membership meeting set for Wednesday, December 7.

Dates for the annual meeting and banquet were set Wednesday, November 9 at a meeting of the board of directors of the association, in the growers office. The board also set up a proposed operating budget for the coming year which will be presented for approval or revision at the annual meeting; approved a loan to the Oregon-California Marketing Agreement Committee; appointed a nominating committee for 1956 officers; reviewed finances of the association during the past year and issued a statement of confidence in the future of the agricultural future of the Basin.

The Tulelake Association will

join with the Klamath Falls and Redmond, Oregon, Potato Growers Associations in extending a loan to the marketing agreement committee for the remainder of this year.

The amount needed will be determined by estimated operational costs.

Amount of the annual budget for the Tulelake association was not announced but is expected to be about the same as last year.

Past presidents of the association, Chester J. Main, Ivan Rose, Sam Anderson, Ed Duckett, Charles K. Wiese and Stanley Buckingham will make up this year's nominating committee for new officers. Nominations will be ready for the annual meeting.

Two director's seats, the second two year term for Ronald Ward and the seat held by Earl Schultz are to be filled. Schultz was appointed earlier this year to complete the unexpired term of Charles Wiese, resigned.

Holdover members of the board are Ben Reimer, Lester Turnbaugh, Lowell Kenyon and J. C. Bailey Sr.

An optimistic financial report that was issued revealed that the net worth of the association has increased from \$73,000 to \$75,000 in spite of heavy expenses incurred by the association during the past two or three fiscal years.

The organization spent during that time approximately \$25,000 on a trailer camp for transient labor; financed trips of local delegates to Washington, D.C. for conferences on potato and clover seed marketing problems; and completed remodeling of the association offices and labor camp at Newell.

The grower and associate membership record is the best in the history of the organization which "expresses confidence in the association," according to the directors.

Doctor Expresses Salk Vaccine Doubt

CHICAGO (AP) — A doctor said Friday not all public health physicians are certain the Salk Polio Vaccine program is on a "solid and secure scientific footing."

Mr. Herbert Ratner, health commissioner of suburban Oak Park and editor of the bulletin of the American Assn. of Public Health Physicians asserted that public statements have predominately favored the Salk program "to the exclusion of unfavorable items."

ARCHITECTS BLASTED

MOSCOW (AP) — Pravda blasted the Union of Soviet Architects Friday, piling upon it the responsibility for shortcomings in Soviet building. The Communist Party newspaper echoed previous denunciations of nationally known architects and warned that the flashy look in Soviet skyscrapers must go.

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Indians Seek Prohibition

NEW DELHI (AP) — Many Indians are convinced their country can accomplish successful prohibition. Politicians and newspapers, with important exceptions, are backing a prohibition inquiry committee, which has recommended that India achieve total prohibition in stages by April 1958. Its recommendation probably will be approved with little modification. The committee says prohibition can work in India for these reasons:

"The relatively small magnitude of the problem of drink; the general law-abiding nature of the people; the assured support of womenfolk; the resistance of the average family to drinks being served at home; and inhibitory teachings against drink which have prevailed for centuries."

Anticipating comparisons with foreign experiments, the committee analyzes reasons for the failure of previous attempts at curtailing

drink. Its findings on the United States said:

"The law was defective; enforcement was . . . without proper coordination and from the very inception prohibition came under persistent attacks from powerful and organized vested interests."

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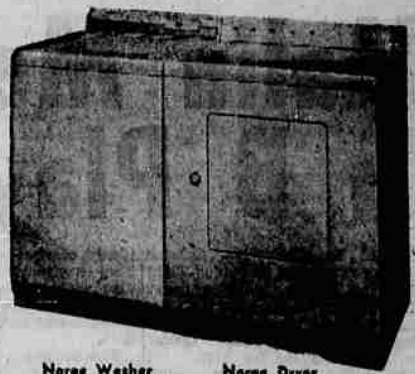
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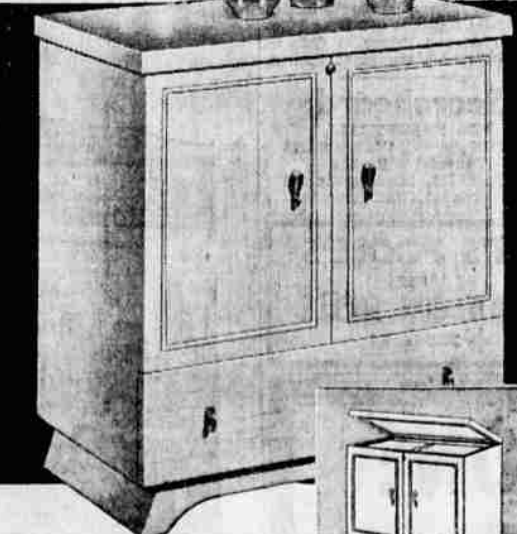
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
