Girl Nabbed For KF Jail Break-in Try

For the second time in a week an attempt to break into the county jail was reported Friday. City police arrested Phyllis Hill, 22, alias Marie Smith, outside the jail Thursday night and booked her at the city jail on a disorderly conduct charge.

Last June she was arrested with Zaida Pearson, 29, after they were alleged to have attempted to smuggle a cherry pie spiced with hack-saw blades into the county jail. At that time the jail break charge against the Hill woman was dismissed. Mrs. Pearson was placed on two years probation.

According to Sheriff Murray Britton, the Hill woman appeared at the county jail Thursday night with several men in two automobiles. The sheriff said the woman tried to climb one of the outside walls to the second floor of the jail.

Night Jailer Lloyd E. (Pappy) Newlin, who was on duty alone at the jail, called Sheriff Britton at his home. Britton told the jailer not to open the doors but to call city police.

A few minutes later police, answering a call from Newlin, arrived at the jail and arrested the Hill woman. She is scheduled to appear before Police Judge Frank Blackmer on the disorderly conduct charge Saturday morning.

Last Saturday night, an unidentified man, clad only in a T-shirt and shorts tried to break into the women's quarters of the county jail. He eluded Britton who reached the scene a few minutes after an unidentified man called the sheriff at his home and reported the jail break-in was in progress.

Britton said the scantily clad prowler pried open a window leading to the women's quarters. He used a ladder to reach the window. Near the ladder Britton found a bottle of sleeping pills.

After that date, all persons with a Modoc Point address will receive mail either on a Chilcoquin Star Route to be delivered in roadside boxes by Don Potter, mailman, or they may rent a box in Chilcoquin or use Chilcoquin general delivery. PANAMA — Former President Juan Peron says his 10-year reign left Argentina in good financial shape.

The ex-president came here from his original exile in Paraguay. He has been staying at a hotel in Colon and is reported writing a book to be tentatively entitled "Force Is the Right of Beasts."
